

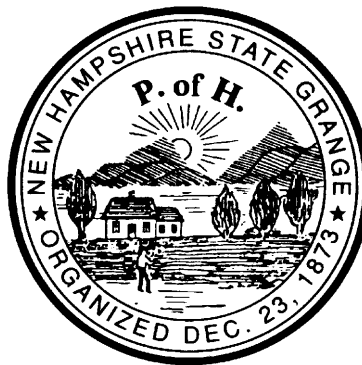

Thursday, October 29, 2009

New Hampshire State Grange Officers marched in to officially open the 136th Annual Session at 7:00 p.m.

New Hampshire State Grange 2009 Resolutions

Resolution #1 – Submitted by Hudson Grange #11

Subject: Support of New Hampshire Dairy Farmers

WHEREAS: The NH Dairy industry is the anchor of NH Agriculture, which not only supports rural communities, but enhances other sectors of agriculture, providing open space for recreation, sportsmen and women, and tourism; and

WHEREAS: The Dairy industry provides an economic impact of an estimated \$1400 per cow per year, primarily in the local economy; and

WHEREAS: The lack of stable prices, concentration of process and capacity, outdated regulations and labor shortages are creating a crisis in the industry; and

WHEREAS: a significant loss of capacity would create a dependence on foreign or out of region milk and other dairy products and reduce our food security; and

WHEREAS: The NH dairy farmer generally has smaller herds than much of the country because of geography and higher costs than some parts of the country because of the New England weather, and

WHEREAS: The 2008 Farm Bill creates a review process for Federal Milk Marketing orders;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: The Hudson Grange and the New Hampshire State Grange urge our Congressional Delegation and the Administration to acknowledge the importance of the Dairy industry to New Hampshire:

- Funding and implementing the federal milk marketing order study as outlined in the 2008 Farm Bill with regional representation from Producers and state policy makers; and
- Implementation of tariffs on foreign dairy solids; and
- Setting of regional prices to reflect accurately and realistically the cost of production; and
- Addressing the problems of labor shortages in the dairy industry by providing training and education as well as a fair and sensible approach to imported labor; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be sent to our Congressional Delegation, the Secretary of Agriculture, the Chair of the NH House and Senate Agriculture Committees, the NH Commissioner of Agriculture and the NH Farm Bureau.

Resolution #2 – Submitted by Rochester Grange #86
Subject: Associate Membership

WHEREAS: The original intent of the Associate Membership was for a person or business whose interest in the Grange was primarily financial support of that Grange, and

WHEREAS: National Grange has no distinction between individual and business Associate membership:

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that Article XII, Section 4 – Associate Membership of the By-Laws of New Hampshire Granges be deleted and replaced with:

Section 4 – Associate Membership

A person or business with an interest in the advancement of agriculture and improvement of rural life may become an Associate member. Such a member shall be entitled to receive Grange information, the *Granite State Granger*, and any other Grange services determined upon by the State Executive Committee. Application can be made to any Subordinate or Pomona Grange or directly to the State Grange if the applicant so chooses. In such cases the State Executive Committee will be empowered to act on the application.

When application is made, the application fee, \$5.00 minimum, will be collected. The Annual dues for Associate members will be \$50.00 per year (\$20.00 for the Subordinate or Pomona, \$20.00 for State, \$10.00 for National). Dues will be collected in the same manner as regular dues. At least 50 percent of the State portion of the Associate dues collected will go to support the *Granite State Granger*.

The State Secretary will provide applications for Associate memberships. Applications for Associate membership will be accepted and voted on in the same manner as regular membership. However, Associate members cannot attend any closed meetings, hold office, have voting rights, or participate in any Grange sponsored contests that are designed for Grange members only. Associate members are not allowed to receive any degrees (Subordinate, Pomona, State or National) unless they apply for regular Grange membership, which they may do at any time. An Associate member applying for membership in a Subordinate Grange shall have their application fee waived.

Associate members are subject to all laws, rules and regulations in the Constitution and Bylaws of the New Hampshire State Grange and the *Digest of Laws of the National Grange*.

Resolution #3 – Submitted by Rochester Grange #86
Subject: Subordinate Family Membership Dues

WHEREAS, the Delegates at National Grange increased the amount of Subordinate dues payable to National Grange effective January 1, 2010;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: the dollar amounts in the NH State Grange Bylaws Article XIV, Section 3 – Duties and Rights of Members, Division 1, page 12 be changed and the wording clarified to read: “The minimum regular annual dues in a Subordinate Grange shall be \$20.00 (\$20.00 paid to the State Grange of which \$12.00 goes to National Grange) paid in advance, and each Grange may otherwise regulate its own dues. The minimum dues required of a family unit membership are \$40.00 (\$40.00 paid to State Grange of which \$24.00 goes to National Grange). A family unit membership is defined as consisting of three or more Subordinate Grange members with one or two parents and their dependents, which are under the age of 23 and live in the same household or are absent due to illness, education, or military service.”

Resolution #4 – Submitted by Rochester Grange #86
Subject: NH State Grange Non-voting Members

WHEREAS, The National Grange Bylaws state in Chapter 4, Article VI, 4.6.9 (B) page 18, “Non-voting members – All Fourth Degree members in good standing of active Subordinate Granges who have received the Sixth Degree and are within the jurisdiction of a State Grange shall be non-voting members of such State Grange”, and

WHEREAS, the NH State Grange Bylaws Article III Members page 3 states “The Membership of the State Grange shall consist of the Masters and Past Masters of the Subordinate and Pomona Granges and their wives or husbands who are Patrons”, **THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the NH State Grange Bylaws Article III Members page 3 be changed to read “The Non-voting Membership of the State Grange shall consist of all Fourth Degree members in good standing of active Subordinate Granges who have received the Sixth Degree and are within the jurisdiction of the NH State Grange.”

Resolution #5 – Submitted by Park Grange #249

Subject: Return to Agriculture Awards

WHEREAS, the cost of fertilizer and transporting food is skyrocketing, and
WHEREAS, as NH can grow most of its own food according to NOFA, and
WHEREAS, landowners are more motivated to sell off land for housing developments thus losing valuable agricultural land,
THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that the NH State Grange collaborates with other agricultural organizations like NOFA-NH, NH Farm Bureau or the Extension Service to present awards in each county through the Pomona Granges to landowners who return their land to organic/sustainable agriculture.

Resolution #6 – Submitted by the NH State Grange Executive Committee

Subject: Second Delegates at National Grange

WHEREAS, the New Hampshire State Grange is entitled to two voting delegates at the National Grange, and
WHEREAS, the By-laws of the New Hampshire State Grange do not address how a second delegate should be chosen if the State Master is not married, or if the State Master’s spouse is unable to attend the National Grange Convention,
THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the New Hampshire State Grange By-laws be amended by adding Article IX, Sec. 6, “If the State Master is not married, or the State Master and/or the State Master’s spouse is unable to attend National Grange Convention, the Executive Committee will select the alternate and/or second delegate to represent New Hampshire at the National Grange Convention.”

Resolution #7 – Submitted by Antrim Grange #98

Subject: Industrial Hemp on Pine Ridge Reservation

BE IT RESOLVED: that the NH State Grange become a signatory to the following petition to be sent to US President Barack Obama, and
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that the petition be forwarded to the National Grange for its consideration: We the following groups and individuals urge you, President Obama, to support, by all means possible, the Oglala Sioux nation on the Pine Ridge Reservation in their efforts to grow, harvest and sell industrial hemp in accordance with the signed treaties of 1851 and 1868 with the U. S. Government in order to supply employment to the indigenous peoples whose current unemployment rate is upwards of 85%.

Resolution #8 – Submitted by Antrim Grange #98

Subject: Alcoholic Beverages at Grange Halls

WHEREAS the current Article 10.11.1 in the National Grange Digest states that ‘All Granges are prohibited from having alcoholic beverages either in the Grange Hall or on any Grange property during any Grange meeting, nor can any Grange lease or rent its hall or its property for functions that may include the sale or use of alcoholic beverages or for any other purposes prohibited by Grange Law; except that a State Grange may allow the use of alcoholic beverages at functions other than Grange meetings in the Grange Hall or on any Grange property by vote of the State Grange at its Annual Meeting.”
THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that Article 10.11.1 be amended to read: “All Granges are prohibited from having alcoholic beverages either in the Grange Hall or on any Grange property during any Grange meeting. Granges that meet in buildings or on property not owned by the Grange may not allow the consumption of alcoholic beverages during any Grange meeting.” and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: that the following articles be added to this section of the National Grange Digest:

Article 10.11.2 "All Granges are prohibited from having alcoholic beverages either in the Grange Hall, on any Grange property, or any other venue that the Grange has legal use of during any Grange sponsored activity; except for activities that are designed to promote the portions of agriculture that include the production of alcoholic beverages."

Article 10.11.3 "All Granges may have original-sealed containers of alcoholic beverages at Grange meetings and activities for use as demonstration aides, gifts, or fund raisers. Such containers shall remain sealed at such Grange meeting or activity.

Article 10.11.4 "No Grange shall lease or rent its hall or its property for functions that will include the sale or use of alcoholic beverages or for any other purposes prohibited by Grange Law; except that a State Grange may allow the use of alcoholic beverages at functions other than Grange meetings in the Grange Hall or on any Grange property by vote of the State Grange at its Annual Meeting, or by vote of the State Grange Executive Committee."

Article 10.11.5 "No Grange shall apply for or hold a license to sell or serve alcohol."

RESOLUTION #9 - Submitted by State Legislative Committee
Subject: Federal Food Safety Legislation

WHEREAS, the House of Representatives of the United States has passed H.R. 2749, The Food Safety Enhancement Act of 2009; and

WHEREAS, The Council of State Governments' Eastern Regional Conference (CSG/ERC), and its affiliate the Northeast States Association for Agricultural Stewardship (NSAAS), recognize that American consumers deserve the safest food possible, whether domestic or imported; and

WHEREAS, although the U.S. food production system is among the best in the world, we understand that improvement is a critical goal; and

WHEREAS, the Northeast's rural communities are made up of many small farms that have been successfully adding value and diversifying; and

WHEREAS, diversification has resulted in producers adding processing and marketing to their activities; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interest of Northeast food producers to maintain the confidence of consumers that their food is safe; and

WHEREAS, it is recognized that both state and federal fiscal resources are limited and should be utilized efficiently and wisely to ensure food safety without unduly impeding economic activity; now

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the New Hampshire State Grange urge Congress to consider the unintended consequences of a one-size-fits-all fee system on small value added producers and processors; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that existing USDA regulations on farmers continue to exempt farms from additional Food and Drug Administration regulations and inspections; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that producer operations registered with the Department of Homeland Security as facilities, specifically maple sugar and honey, should receive the same treatment as all farmers under federal food safety legislation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the inclusion of intensive record keeping in any federal regulation should include funding and technical assistance to small producers and processors for compliance; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that scale appropriate regulations, fees and penalties be included in any federal food safety legislation; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that existing state inspection programs should be given consideration in the development of any federal food safety regulations; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to all members of the U.S. Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions committee, the U.S. House Energy and Commerce Committee, all members of the U.S. Senate and U.S. House Agriculture Committees, each member of the U. S. Senate and House that represents the states that comprise CSG/ERC, the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture and Secretary of Health and Human Services and the Administrator of the Food and Drug Administration, and the chairs of the Northeast states' House and Senate Committees that oversee agricultural and rural affairs.

RESOLUTION #10 - Submitted by the State Legislative Committee
Subject: State Efforts for the Dairy Industry

WHEREAS, the consumer demand for fresh milk products in the Northeast has been sufficient to sustain a dynamic and stable industry; and

WHEREAS, the dairy industry is a keystone industry in the Northeast, providing open space for recreation, sports, tourism, water recharge and wildlife areas; and

WHEREAS, the dairy industry provides direct economic impact of an estimated \$14,000 per cow per year, serving as an anchor for all Northeastern agriculture, rural communities and economics; and

WHEREAS, outdated federal policies and the consolidation of both cooperatives and processors have resulted in an economic crisis for the nation's dairy farmers and threatens the region's food security, and

WHEREAS, the Northeast has lost more than 30% of its dairy farmers in the last decade;

WHEREAS, the farm gate price for milk has collapsed by more than 50% from one year ago, in part because of continuing flaws in federal policy; and

WHEREAS, farmers now face prices that are less than half the cost of production; and

WHEREAS, assumptions that the milk price collapse is related to a surplus of milk in the market are not supported by data that show the U.S. importing record amounts of product and increased commercial disappearance; and

WHEREAS, Northeast states have been proactive and innovative in responding to the continuing volatility in the pricing of milk with programs providing direct producer support, farmland preservation, business planning assistance; and

WHEREAS, states are facing a fiscal crisis and cannot continue to fund many of the programs needed to prevent the collapse of the dairy industry;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that The New Hampshire State Grange, urge Northeast state policy makers to work toward developing state milk pricing policies similar to Pennsylvania and Maine, that capture funding from the marketplace, rather than state general budgets, when federal policies fail; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that The New Hampshire State Grange urge Northeast state policy makers to ensure that state law identifies that ownership of milk changes when milk is comingled with milk from other farms; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that The New Hampshire State Grange urges Northeast state policy makers to review processes in which farms are charged for hauling product that they no longer own, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the chairs of the Northeast states Senate and House committees that oversee agriculture and rural communities, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Secretaries and Commissioners of Agriculture that represent the states that comprise the CSG/ERC.

Resolution #11 - Submitted by the State Legislative Committee

Subject: Federal Response to the Economic Crisis of the Dairy Industry

WHEREAS, the dairy industry is a keystone industry in the Northeast region, providing open space for recreation, sports, tourism, water recharge and wildlife areas; and

WHEREAS, the dairy industry provides a direct economic impact of an estimated \$14,000 per cow per year, serving as an economic anchor for all Northeastern agriculture, rural communities and economies; and

WHEREAS, the lack of stable prices and concentration of processing capacity are creating a crisis in the industry; and

WHEREAS, a significant loss of dairy farmers would create dependence on imported milk and other dairy products and reduce our region's and nation's food security; and

WHEREAS, there is broad public concern in the assurance of stable supplies of locally produced fluid milk for all of the Northeast; and

WHEREAS, in the year 2000, the U.S. Department of Agriculture changed the historical basis for pricing milk to one that uses Chicago Mercantile Exchange prices and National Agricultural Statistics Service surveys, neither of which is free market nor acceptable to processors or farmers from the Northeast; and

WHEREAS, there are essentially only two cooperatives operating in the region and the milk processing industry is dominated by two companies, creating unhealthy concentration in the processing of milk in the Northeast; and

WHEREAS, the Northeast has lost more than 30% of its dairy farmers in the last decade; and

WHEREAS, the farm gate price for milk has collapsed by more than 50% from one year ago; and

WHEREAS, farmers now face prices that are less than half the cost of production; and

WHEREAS, assumptions that the milk price collapse is related to a surplus of milk in the market are not supported by data that show the U.S. importing record amounts of product and increased commercial disappearance; and

WHEREAS, Northeast states have been innovative and active in responding to the continuing volatility in the pricing of milk with programs providing direct producer support, farmland preservation, and business planning assistance; and

WHEREAS, many of these efforts have been hampered by downturns in state budgets and continuing flaws in federal milk policy; now

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the New Hampshire State Grange urge the Congressional and Executive Branches of the federal government to recognize their primary responsibility of sustaining the viability of dairy farming in all regions of the United States and thereby assure consumers of an adequate, local supply of fluid milk through the economic sustainability of our nation's dairy farmers; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the New Hampshire State Grange urge Congress and the Executive Branch to ensure that all dairy producers receive, with reasonable advance notice, the information related to any referendum on the Federal Milk Marketing Orders and have the opportunity to cast individual ballots on such referendum; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the New Hampshire State Grange urge Congress and the Executive Branch to require Milk Protein Concentrates (powdered milk products), regardless of their country of origin, to meet and document the same quality, animal health, inspection and production standards as U.S. products; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the New Hampshire State Grange urge Congress and the Executive Branch to cooperatively address changes to the Federal Milk Marketing Order that returns consideration of regional costs of production in the federal milk pricing formula as provided by the 1937 Agricultural Marketing Agreement Act section 608 I as well as the actual consumer price of milk, acknowledging that this policy change would be at no cost to consumers and save taxpayers money on MILC payments, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the New Hampshire State Grange urge the Department of Justice and the Commodity Futures Trading Commission to pursue renewed inquiry into the concentration in the milk processing sectors of the Northeast industry and to determine whether anti-competitive conduct is working to the detriment of producers and consumers, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the New Hampshire State Grange urge the Attorneys General of the Northeastern states to review the concentration in the dairy industry within their state borders for possible antitrust action and provide such information to the U.S. Department of Justice, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the U.S. Department of Justice, the Commodity Futures Exchange Commission; the chairs of the Northeast states Senate and House committees that oversee agriculture and rural communities, each member of the U.S. Senate and House that represent the states that comprise the CSG/ERC and the Attorneys General that represent the states that comprise the CSG/ERC.

RESOLUTION #12 - Submitted by Cheshire County Pomona #6

Subject: Single Payer Health Care

WHEREAS, the cost of healthcare is rising 6% every year, and there are over 40 million Americans currently without health insurance, and

WHEREAS, the current system of health care in America is subsidizing insurance companies who make money by not providing health care, and

WHEREAS, the health insurance industry spends billions of dollars in political campaign contributions and in lobbying Congress and administration officials, protecting their stronghold over Congressional Committees and the testimony they are allowed to hear, and

WHEREAS, true health care reform should cover everyone and maintain fiscal integrity without subsidizing insurance and pharmaceutical companies and breaking our nation's bank,

BE IT RESOLVED: that the NH State Grange and the National Grange support legislation that would expand Medicare and create a not for profit, Single Payer System that provides affordable health care to every American.

Resolution #13 - Submitted by Cheshire County Pomona #6

Subject: Casino Gambling

WHEREAS: The State of New Hampshire is struggling financially through this recession and we have a revenue problem rather than a spending problem; and

WHEREAS: Neither the Legislature nor the Governor have the political courage to enact either a sales or income tax to ease the burden on property tax owners, and continue to enact fee increases on the general public to ease the budgetary problems; and

WHEREAS: Casino gambling or off-track betting has the potential of generating up to three hundred million dollars in revenue for the State of New Hampshire;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That the New Hampshire State Grange go on record as being in support of casino gambling and make it one of our legislative priorities for the next legislative session.

Resolution #14 - Submitted by Arlington Grange #139

Subject: Veterans Designation

WHEREAS, veterans who were disabled in the first Gulf War and the current wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, by statute RSA 261:157, do not qualify for disabled veterans' plates nor waiver of the registration fees; and

WHEREAS, Servicemen and women who have become disabled in the service of their country deserve the same rights and privileges as men and women who served in earlier conflicts and wars,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the New Hampshire State Grange support and seek a change to RSA 261:157 to include disabled veterans of the Gulf War as well as the current wars in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Resolution #15 - Submitted by Hudson Grange #11

Subject: Encourage School Districts to Participate in Agriculture in the Classroom and/or Farm to School

Whereas: NH Farms are small businesses that hire local people, pay taxes and contribute to NH's economy.

Whereas: NH Farms provide safe, fresh, good tasting, and nutritious, local foods.

Whereas: NH Farms provide open space at no cost to the taxpayers.

Whereas: NH Farms protect the environment.

Whereas: NH Children need to learn good nutrition choices.

Whereas: NH Children need to know where their food comes from.

Whereas: NH Children need to taste the difference between fresh local and other foods.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that the Hudson Grange # 11 and the NH State Grange encourage all school districts in the state of NH to adopt elements of the Agriculture in the Class Room and / or a Farm to School Program. That may include all or some of the following:

- Classes visit Farms: Dairy, Fruit, and Vegetables
- Farmers visit schools to explain what they do.
- Teach agriculture techniques, as part of the science curriculum.
- Teach healthy nutrition choices
- Learn to identify fresh foods
- Jr. Iron Chef Competition using local foods
- Cafeteria that features local foods, buy during the summer and preserve for winter use.
- An all NH Food day
- Target elementary, middle and high school ages.

The State Secretary read three resolutions that were presented to her at session.

Resolution #16 - Submitted by the State Grange Legislative Committee

Subject: Oversight of Farm Products

WHEREAS the Farm Safety Act, HR 2749 has been passed by the House of Representatives and is in Senate Committee, and

WHEREAS this bill deals with food safety for food delivered from the producer to the customer, and

WHEREAS this bill has both good and undesirable issues for both the large farms and small farms, and

WHEREAS the good points deal with large industrialized farms and the food coming from other countries and whose facilities have the manpower for the necessary record keeping, and

WHEREAS the undesirable issues concern mostly the smaller local farmer in that unannounced inspections and considerable record keeping and he / she does not have the time, the money or the facilities needed, and

WHEREAS the regulations to implement this resolution have not been clearly defined, and
WHEREAS the attending members of the Northeast Legislative & Agriculture Committees voted in the affirmative to oppose the Food Safety Act HR 2749 on September 27, 2009, and
WHEREAS the Council of State Governments – Eastern Regional Conference delivered a resolution in opposition to the Food Safety Act HR 2749 in August, 2009.
THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Policy of the NH State Grange be that all food products on the farm, at farms stands and farmer’s markets, be under the sole oversight of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and
BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED that this resolution be forwarded to the National Grange together with a recommendation for appropriate action therein.

Resolution #17 - Submitted by Hillsborough County Pomona #1
Subject: Change National Grange’s Industrial Hemp Policy

WHEREAS: numerous products made from industrial hemp, as well as the raw materials are imported, manufactured, produced and marketed in the United States and there are no laws that prevent this commerce, and
WHEREAS: locally produced hemp would be a valuable rotational crop requiring minimal pesticides while improving the soil and provide the raw material for thousands of consumer products including but not limited to fiber, textiles, paper, construction materials, plastics, cosmetics, foods, animal bedding, and biofuels,
THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that the National Grange adopt the following policy in regard to industrial hemp. “The National Grange supports research, production, processing and marketing of industrial hemp.”

Resolution #18 - Submitted by Squam Lake #258
Subject: State Grange Building

WHEREAS: for the past several years the annual income of the New Hampshire State Grange has failed to meet expenses, in turn requiring withdrawals from invested funds; and
WHEREAS: the expense of maintaining the building located in Hooksett, owned by the New Hampshire State Grange requires a disproportionate amount of the financial resources of the Grange; and
WHEREAS: that building has neither space nor facilities to hold most of the events and activities of the State Grange and its committees, provides minimal benefit to the State Grange and no benefit to the majority of members,
THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that the building in Hooksett owned by the New Hampshire State Grange be sold.

State Secretary Carolyn Ross read the Convention Rules.

Standing Rules of the 136th Annual Convention
New Hampshire State Grange of the
Order of Patrons of Husbandry

136th Annual Convention
Ashworth by the Sea Hotel
Hampton Beach, NH
October 29-31, 2009

1. All persons, except special guests, shall be registered. Nametags and programs shall be issued.
2. Admission to the meetings shall be by nametag and password only. Upon giving proper password, the meeting Deputy will provide a colored sticker for the name badge to eliminate the need for giving the password again at this Session. If you are not wearing your nametag, you will be refused admittance.
3. At least fifteen delegates shall constitute a quorum of the State Grange.
4. Every Subordinate and Pomona Grange in good standing shall be represented by the Master or his/her alternate and one other delegate from said Grange.
5. The voting body of the State Grange shall be all registered delegates.

6. Members attending as non-delegates may take part in discussion, with permission from the chair, but shall not make motions and shall not vote.
7. A member wishing to speak shall wait for recognition by the Master, and upon provision of a working microphone shall announce his/her name and Grange he/she is representing.
8. When two members rise to speak at the same time, the chair will first recognize the member seated the furthest distance from the Master's station.
9. No delegate shall speak more than two minutes on any question under discussion nor may speak a second time until all others who wish to speak have had the opportunity to do so.
10. All reports and other material for the permanent record, immediately on presentation, shall be given to the Secretary and /or the Journal of Proceedings Special Committee.
11. The rules contained in the current edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* shall govern the meeting in all cases where they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Bylaws and these Standing Rules.
12. These Standing Rules shall be presented to the members for adoption; a 2/3 vote shall be required for adoption.

Chris Heath made a motion to adopt the Standing Rules and Gloria Davis seconded it. The motion was approved.

State Treasurer Gail Turcotte was called upon to give her report.

Treasurer's Annual Report

Worthy Master, Distinguished Guests, Associate State Officers, Members of the Pink Sash Family, Delegates, Brothers and Sisters:

I am pleased to bring you my second report as State Treasurer. I will not give you complete details of our finances, as those will be printed in the Journal. These are some highlights that I would like to share with you now.

I will begin my review with our financial position as of September 30, 2008. Our beginning market value on October 1, 2008 was \$835,458.61. Income was \$31,995.48 or roughly 4% after management fees were deducted. We received contributions of \$13,127.32 and withdrew \$282,123.93 with \$200,000 being reinvested with new firms. Non-cash Changes were -\$402.15. Realized Gain/Losses were -\$6,633.58 and Unrealized Gain/Losses were \$37,641.99, resulting in a market value of invested funds with TD Wealth Management at the close of the year of \$629,063.74. The breakdown of securities at year-end with TD was 57.3% in fixed income, 35.8% in equities, and 6.9% in cash & equivalents.

We continue to carry the value of the State Grange Building at the purchase price of \$87,500.00. Our Account Receivable remains at \$1,280.00 with no changes during the year.

A quick review of the special funds shows the Education Loan Fund granting scholarships in the amount of \$5,900. The Randall Richardson Memorial Youth Fund received donations of \$62 and returned unused \$339.50. Expenses incurred for Youth Work amounted to \$600.

We received a very generous anonymous donation in the amount of \$10,000 this year towards the expenses of a new roof for our building in Hooksett. Unfortunately, our overall expenses continued to be far greater than our income and a total of \$18,000 in principal was withdrawn from our invested operating account during the year.

Recognizing that this trend could not continue the NH State Grange Executive Committee met repeatedly this year to discuss finances including a special meeting with all State Officers and Directors. The difficult decision was made to request an increase in dues at a Special State Grange Session and meetings were held with three professional financial advisors during the summer. We presently have money invested with two additional firms on a one-year trial basis. We have begun a five-year fiscal plan and a fiduciary audit file as well as implementing a conflict of interest policy and an investment and spending policy.

Fiscal year 2008 was the first year that all Subordinate and Pomona Granges were required to file the new 990-N report with the Internal Revenue Service. Most Granges were able to comply with this new rule by the deadline of February 15th although three Granges were just able to file this month due to problems with the IRS that had to be resolved. Thank you to everyone for your patience during this first

“learning” year. Filing this report is an annual requirement with each year’s report due to the IRS by February 15. I do have some of the 2008 paper version 990-EZ forms available for those few Granges that are unable to file electronically.

All NH Granges should renew their incorporation with the State of NH during 2010. This reincorporation occurs every five years and notice is usually sent to the name and address submitted on your previous report. Please check with the person most likely to have filed your Grange’s report in 2005 and ask them to forward the notice to the correct person if needed. I strongly encourage every Grange to check the incorporated name of your Grange on this paperwork to be sure you are using your full legal name and not the short version commonly used.

I would like to thank Don Ross, Chairman of the Executive Committee for serving as my “sounding board” on many occasions this year as we faced many challenges. Thanks also to Carolyn Ross for continuing to handle her part of our shared financial duties in a timely and efficient manner. Carolyn and I are always looking for sales on office supplies and we have been able to pay several bills in a timely manner thus earning a cash discount for the State Grange.

SECRETARY'S ANNUAL REPORT

Worthy State Master, National Representatives, Ed and Celia Luttrell, Associate State Officers, Committee Members, Delegates and Patrons:

At the moment everything from our last State Session seems to be a blur for me. A year ago just the day before State Session, I had to get Past State Secretary Jeanne Higgins situated into a Rehabilitation Center. Little did I know that within 1½ weeks after the close of our 2008 State Session that Jeanne would pass on to the Great Grange Above. With the passing of Jeanne I never realized how hard it was going to be for me not to just sit around and do nothing but think about the good times with Jeanne. Anyway I never accomplished all of the projects that I had intended to do through out the year. Ever since I was elected Secretary it was always my desire to show Jeanne that I was following in her footsteps as a State Officer.

This past year we have had to close Starr King and Moultonborough Granges. As of September 30, 2009 Sullivan Grange and Brookline Junior Grange were declared closed. On Saturday, October 10, 2009 we were saddened to see Sullivan County Pomona close. There are still more Granges out there that are considering or already planning on closing or consolidating with another Grange. As a member of the State Grange Executive Committee, I fully realize that such a large dues increase that was passed in August will make it necessary for perhaps even more Granges to close, as they can no longer afford to stay open.

As of June 30, 2009 there were 12 Pomona Granges in the state with a total membership of 917, of which 295 are Golden Sheaf members. The largest Pomona is Merrimack County Pomona with 139 members.

As of June 30, 2009 there were 71 Subordinate Granges with a total membership of 2287, of which 578 are Golden Sheaf members. The largest Subordinate Grange is Wingold Grange with 76 members.

As of June 30, 2009 there were only 2 Junior Granges on the rolls – Brookline Junior and Granite Junior Grange. As of September 30, 2009 there is only 1 Junior Grange in the state as Brookline Junior Grange was declared closed on September 30, 2009.

By authority of the National Grange, I have issued the following membership awards:

Silver Star certificates – 19	55 – year seals - 22

Now about the 2008 Journal of Proceedings, I have to admit that I was the one that dragged my feet the most. My enthusiasm for this project was at an all time low this past year because of losing Jeanne so unexpectedly and a few health issues of my own, but the good news is, the Journal is now completed. The Executive Committee and I have decided in order to try and save money that Mark Collins (my faithful computer guru) would put the Journal out there on the website. You can now download the 2008 Journal just by going to www.nhgrange.org. For those of you with no access to a computer or printer all you have to do is contact me and I will print and mail you a Journal. However to help defray the costs of printing, postage, etc I will be requesting \$7.00 per booklet. I have heard that I have promised to have the 2009 Journal of Proceedings finished by December 1, 2009. It's hard to believe that I accepted the challenge but it must have been one of my weak-minded days. I do need to say "thank you" to Linda Neilson of Arlington Grange for putting the Journal together, not to mention Linda having to wait for me to get parts of the Journal to her.

After the end of this State Session I have decided that I need to set some goals for myself. From time to time we all need goals in order to be more productive and hopefully have less chaos in our lives. I bet you can already figure out what my first goal will be – Yes, number 1 will be:

1. Complete the 2009 Journal of Proceedings by December 1, 2009.
2. Have the 2009 Roster ready for Leaders School in December.
3. Work with Secretaries to clean up the membership database.
4. Reorganize my office at home.
5. Start an inventory of supplies on-hand.

I don't think I want to go any further with goals, as I do not want to overwhelm myself. From my work experience you always want to have a few projects on the back burner just in case you start to run out of projects. My guess is that I will not run out projects until someone else is elected to the Secretary's Office.

We need remember that there will be another dues increase as of the March 2010 quarter. Subordinate dues paid to the State Grange will be \$7.25 per quarter and Pomona dues has increased to \$2.00 per quarter.

A very special thank you goes to the Credentials Committee, this year chaired by Patricia Izzo. Also on her team are Lucia Savage and Ken Berry. I was having a really hard time to find coverage for the Registration table. I did not want to have to use any Grangers who would be delegates. Lately both of us seem to have those senior moments when neither of us can remember what we did the year before. To the Pomona and Subordinate Secretaries- never be afraid to ask a question. If you call me, I will do my best to call you back in a timely fashion. E-mail is always good (I do read mine more than some others) and again I will respond to you just as soon as I can.

State Executive Committee Chairman Donald Ross read the minutes of the September 29th and October 25th meetings as they have not yet been sent out to Granges.

Report of the Executive Committee

Worthy Master, National Representatives, Fellow State Officers, Brothers and Sisters:

The State Executive Committee had another extremely busy year! We met 15 times beginning on October 26, 2008 through October 25, 2009. In between those dates our State Grange lost one of its long time devoted members. Past State Secretary, Jeanne Higgins passed away on November 5, 2008. Jeanne will among other things be long remembered for her excellence as an accomplished pianist/organist, she was one of the finest musicians in the state.

Subordinate Granges continue to either close or consolidate. It is a continuing education for these Granges to follow proper procedures when it has become necessary for them to close. As of today, several Subordinate Granges have either closed or consolidated this past year. Worthy State Master Beth Merrill has sent out GRIT teams to some of the weaker Granges in hopes of revitalizing them.

The State Grange Building in Hooksett now has a new metal roof at the cost of \$11,200.00. An anonymous donor gave \$10,000.00 towards the cost of the roof. A great many thanks to whomever the generous donor was for your monetary assistance given the financial crunch we have been under this past year.

Hannah West has graciously continued as the State Grange Publicist as she passes on E-mails of importance and interest to all.

With the closing of Starr King on December 31, 2008, the NH State Grange took over the upkeep of their hall. I have made several trips to Jefferson over the past several months to deal with Jefferson's town fathers as now the Starr King Grange Halls belongs to the State Grange. I have dragged my brother-in-law, Ken Berry along with me, both to keep me awake and free labor when help was needed to clean up the Starr King Grange Hall. We needed to clean the hall in order to be able to place the building in the hands of a realtor for the purpose of selling the building. Originally Northern NH Pomona had expressed interest in the hall but their money resources and manpower were lacking. A non-Grange member of Jefferson has been very helpful as a local contact and has also helped to maintain the grounds of the Starr King Grange hall at NO COST to the State Grange.

In an effort for the State Grange Executive Committee to become better educated about investment options, I had John Habig, Senior Vice President Wealth Management Financial Advisor with the Smith Barney agency come in and present us with a free talk explaining the difference between stocks, bonds, mutual funds, annuities, money markets, etc. In turn we had 3 investment firms come and present us their proposals for invested funds. We also invited the Trustees of the Trust Funds to join with us for these proposals.

We had a bequest of \$100,000.00 from the Clarence Sprague estate (FL), which has been given to the State Grange Educational Loan Fund as long as we had a 501-C-3 fund. We are currently starting to form a committee for the purpose of starting this fund. We are no longer sending our rosters, journal and other large printing jobs to a printing co. as the State Secretary is using the State Grange computer and printer to help cut on costs. This year for the first time the 2008 Journal of Proceedings can be found on-line just by visiting the NH State Grange website. For those Granges with no access to a computer you can just contact the State Secretary and she will print a Journal for your Grange. However to help cover some costs the State Secretary is asking for \$7.00 per Journal. We have saved thousands of dollars over the past two years by doing our printing in-house instead of sending all print jobs to a printing firm. Our State Master, State Treasurer and State Secretary for this year are paying for their own rooms at State Session to help with our budget crisis. The State Grange in the past has paid for their rooms as another way of thanking them for all that they do for our organization.

To our Worthy State Master Beth, we owe many thanks for her timeless efforts on behalf of the State Grange. Beth has traveled many miles, written many letters of her well-versed pearls of wisdom. Anger at times, frustrations abound but she never harbors a grudge. When in doubt she does not hesitate to ask for help. Although Beth does admit that sometimes it is lonely at the top. Beth can be found working many nights, late into the wee hours of the morning on Grange issues. But through it all Beth continues to persevere. We all should commend Beth for her brilliant idea of a fundraiser by using one of our natural beauties on the seacoast of NH. Right that's the ocean! The lucky participants (or is it stupid) have the

Patron's Plunge to look forward to later in the session, walking or running into the icy waters of the Atlantic Ocean.

To our Worthy State Treasurer Gail, you too have dedicated many countless hours to your position as keeper of our Grange funds. Gail has done double duty this year, as she is Treasurer of the Trust Funds trying to get the assets unfrozen and much time calling our Wealth Management Co. working to get the information she needs to accomplish her tasks. Gail is also working closely with the NH State Attorney General's Office, meeting with new prospective investment firms and keeping us on track at our Executive meetings. Many times the Executive Committee is thinking as the hour is getting late, what is she saying now that we have overlooked? Through all of our trials this year Gail has always had the interests of the Grange at heart.

To our Worthy State Secretary Carolyn (who just happens to be my wife), she too has worked countless hours up-dating the membership records and just keeping day to day phone calls and requests for information up-to date. Carolyn works exceptionally well with the State Treasurer, making sure that all correspondence, monies and bills are sent to Gail in a timely fashion. This way the Treasurer is able to take advantage of any discounts for some accounts that are paid within a certain number of days. I marvel of how quickly Carolyn gets orders out to Secretary's upon request, usually by the next day after an order is received. Carolyn is patient with me in deciphering my handwriting when I need an E-mail sent out. As the ritual states "the duties of your office are most arduous of all requiring judgment, promptness and efficiency. Well-done, Good and Faithful servant.

In closing, I would like to say that it has been an honor and privilege to serve as the Chairman of the Executive Committee. Although the road ahead may continue to be bumpy at times, through perseverance we will overcome our obstacles working together in unity and as a **TEAM**.

The NH State Grange Executive Committee met with the NH State Grange Officers and Directors as well as other interested State Grange Leaders at 1pm for a budget review.

We reviewed our approved proposed income and expenses for 2009 comparing both to the actual income and expenses for the first two quarters. Our proposed income budget called for 15,546.50 to be withdrawn from principal and during the first two quarters we have had to withdraw 14,000 despite receiving a very generous donation of 10,000 towards the cost of the new roof on our building. State Treasurer, Gail Turcotte explained that the value of our invested operating account has dropped by about 50% during the past five years due to principal withdrawals as well as the economic crisis our country as a whole is currently experiencing. We further learned that it is estimated our invested operating account will be depleted within 6-7 years at our present rate of principal withdrawal.

We next examined a budget proposal for 2010 that included zero withdrawal of principal. As expected this proposal called for drastic cuts in services to our members from both the state grange officers as well as our departments. After discussion by those present we determined that we would like to pursue a three-pronged solution to our current financial problems. We would like to increase our income by holding additional fund raising activities and by increasing dues and we would like to reduce our expenses wherever possible.

The Executive Committee will discuss a special state session for a dues increase vote at their next meeting on May 3.

Dairy Resolution submitted by Hudson Grange- by E-mail discussion after our February meeting the EC approved this policy. The resolution will be submitted at state session this fall.

Recess for lunch at 12:40PM. Resumed at 2:40PM following tour of facilities. Dan Bascom absent for remainder of meeting.

Youth Department- Director Chris Heath requested permission to use the small spinet piano at the State Grange building for Spotlight on NH this year. By common consent the EC approved this request. There are no concerns about tuning this piano either before or after the event.

Treasurer's Agenda

Operation Department- Gail presented updated figures based on her research on previous year's projects dating back to 2000. We reviewed proposed income amounts from Yankee Candle sales noting the need for a longer lead in time for sales, the craft fair noting more advertising is needed for this event, and the suggested golf tournament. It was suggested that a well-advertised golf tournament with sponsors for some of the holes and costing participants a \$100 entrance fee could earn up to approximately \$5,000. NH State Grange Executive Committee and Financial Planning meeting July 9, 2009 at Hooksett, NH

All EC members and Trustees of Trust Funds present.

Tim Woodhouse, Senior Portfolio Manager for TD Wealth Management gave our second financial planning presentation at 7pm. TD Wealth Management is a triple A rated financial institution and we have used their services for about 10 years. We learned they use the Smith & Poore's 500 index as one of their performance guides as this includes the top 500 US stocks. We learned we should look for a steady increase in interest from bond accounts.

Our present unitized accounting system can be changed if we choose different risk tolerance levels for different types of accounts such as escrow vs. operating fund. Tim recommends mutual funds if we choose different spending policies for our accounts. We were reminded that our present 5% total return concept can invade the principal during bad economic times such as the present recession. We can choose a different spending level other than 5% and Tim suggested 3.5 to 4.5% as a range for us to consider. If we choose to change our investments to mutual funds for greater diversity as recommended the management fees will increase to about 1.6% rather than the 1% we presently pay. There are no additional fees to change. Tim was not sure if there are any end account fees and suggested we contact Eva at TD Wealth Management for clarification.

Tim answered many questions from the members and explained briefly what Exchange Trading Fund (ETF) is. This plan invests in the entire S &P market and is considered passive management. We presently have active management for investing meaning after professional analysis certain stocks are selected for investment. ETF is considered an index approach and is often used by those with only small amounts of money to invest in the markets.

Tim recommends quarterly or at least twice annual performance evaluations. These evaluations can be done more than one way such as direct presentation to a small group such as a finance committee or they can be set up as printed reports such as we received this evening and mailed to us. We learned that we can exclude specific companies from our investment portfolio if we choose.

The Executive Committee meeting was called to order at 8:57pm. Rodney Huntoon updated us on the status of the Sprague Living Trust bequest by reading the correspondence he has received thus far. After discussion we raised the question "Is the NH Charitable Foundation an alternative to forming a 501c3 corporation for this bequest? Beth will obtain contact information for the Foundation from Terry Knowles at the AG office and Rodney will contact the Foundation for more information. We also discussed the possibility of creating a 501c3 that would have more than one purpose such as the education bequest and also funding for Grange hall renovations and restorations. We also noted that fund raising from corporate sponsors for events such as golf tournaments could be easier if we have a 501c3 corporation. We also raised a second question "Will the Sprague Living Trust lawyer and Trustee accept the NH Charitable Foundation or will they require us to form our own 501c3 corporation to receive this bequest?" We hope to have more information for our next meeting.

Secretary's Agenda

Journal of Proceedings 2008 Session

Session 2008 minutes for Saturday and Sunday were accepted as corrected. Carolyn plans to have the Journal ready for distribution by August 1.

Uncollected quarterly dues- we received an updated of list of the Granges owing dues and the number of quarters owed. We learned that Deputy Merrill has assisted in collecting dues and bonding owed from one delinquent Grange. Carolyn will mail letters to the Master and Secretary of any Grange that still owes dues as of the March 31 quarter informing them they will not be eligible to register delegates at the special session on August 22 unless those dues are paid.

Friendship Grange- their March quarterly shows that their membership has now fallen below the 13 required members and Carolyn will send them a letter reminding them of this rule. A revitalization team plans to meet with them later this month.

Chairman's Agenda

Starr King Grange Hall- Don reported that he has been advised by Northern NH Pomona that they are not able to purchase the hall at this time. Beth moved we sell Starr King Grange hall in Jefferson, NH. Paul seconded. Motion was approved. Don has volunteered to contact a local realtor that handles the Jefferson area and request mutual listing of the property. We discussed the need to obtain the current assessment of the property from the selectmen or assessor's office. We also noted that Peter Estabrook expressed interest in the property at an earlier meeting. Beth has his contact information. We noted that per National Grange bylaws the net assets from the sale of the property will go into a Defunct Grange Account. We have still not received a bill for the insurance.

Financial Planning decision- we decided to meet on Thursday July 30 at 7pm at Hooksett to discuss the three presentations and to decide if we will change our present professional investment advisors. We noted that the Trustees of the Trust Funds may want to meet at the same time to make their decision.

Treasurer's Agenda

Quarterly Report- the June 30 reports were accepted as presented.

5-year plan and Fiduciary Audit File- Gail presented initial proposals for both and requested they be reviewed and added to our ongoing project sheets.

Updated 2010 Budget- Gail asked for help with estimates for several figures in the budget. We discussed the need for more money for legal fees especially if we pursue a 501c3 corporation. It is estimated the filing fees alone will be \$850 plus any legal counsel we require. We agreed to change this figure to \$3,500. We will leave the estimated income from blueberry pie day at \$700 and hope to learn soon if we will have any days to work at the Big E. Gail will follow up with Ken Berry for banquet costs. We discussed the national session assessment figure and agreed upon \$2,000 as the projected income. Hannah suggested she could place a notice on the "grapevine" for us.

Printing costs- Gail asked for clarification of our plans for printing the 2009 Journal, Roster and Bylaws if needed. After much discussion and review of existing bylaws we agreed that all three items would be made available on the NH State Grange website and that all three plus Grange Department programs would be provided to each Grange Master and Secretary on computer disc. We will print and bind two copies of the Journal for our archives and the National Master. Any additional printed copies of the Journal will be available upon request for a fee of \$7 each. Printed copies of the Roster will be available for \$7 and the bylaws for \$3.50 upon request. We expect that all four items will be available for distribution by early December preferably for Leader's School. These cost saving measures are planned only if the requested dues increase is not passed.

Resolutions Committee/ Journal of Proceedings- our discussion of printing costs led to a discussion of how we would like to handle the minutes from session. We want to try once again to have the Journal ready for proofreading before we leave the hotel at the end of session. All resolutions should be prepared for the Journal and be ready to be forwarded to National if needed by the end of session. Please note- we will need to request all department and officer reports on computer disc and daily minutes will need to be approved the following morning including Saturday session minutes.

Project Sheets

We reviewed our ongoing projects noting that several were completed and can be listed as closed. We also added new items as needed.

Meeting adjourned at 10:50pm.

NH State Grange Executive Committee – Hooksett, NH July 16, 2009

Financial Planning presentation by Chris Hooper Financial Advisor with Edward Jones Agency in Rochester, NH. Trustees of Trust Funds were also invited to attend the presentation. We learned that Edward Jones is the largest privately held Investment Company in the US and that Chris has owned his own agency in Rochester for 13 years. He does not offer any proprietary products and has prepared a mostly advisory investment plan for us rather than the managed plan we presently use. He prepared his proposal with long-term investments in mind as they are less volatile and he has used a conservative approach. Parts of the proposal are based on incomplete analysis and are intended to serve as an example of the type of service he can provide. This is a mutual fund proposal and the management costs for the advisory accounts are 1.15% on a monthly basis less the MF 12B1 fees that are rebated and any revenue sharing fees are also rebated. We would receive monthly statements for any account that had activity otherwise quarterly statements are prepared. Individualized advisory statements are also prepared quarterly. He does offer on-line account viewing that is password protected etc. Chris recommends quarterly performance reviews, which could be handled by phone and full board in person reviews two times each year. Our smaller accounts that need to be handled separately would be placed into a non-advisory mutual fund program with management costs of .25% and sales charges to purchase. There are no charges to sell. These include the defunct grange accounts, both trust funds and the Randy Richardson Fund.

Chairman Ross called the EC meeting to order at 8:35pm with all members present. Rodney Huntoon updated us on the Sprague Living Trust bequest. He read another e-mail communication from Florida and reported on his contact with the NH Charitable Foundation. The Foundation is

concerned about the rules for a trust governed by Florida law and they also advised us the IRS would not accept such a small group of applicants as we presently receive for our existing Education Loan Fund. All fees charged by the Foundation are deducted before income is allocated. They will file the required annual report. The spending policy would be 4 ½ %. Rodney's Foundation contact has offered to meet with us if requested to further explain their program. Beth reported she has sent an e-mail to Attorney Frazier outlining our situation and is awaiting a reply.

Secretary's Agenda

Journal of Proceedings, Roster and By-laws- Carolyn requested we discuss this issue again. She asked the question "Is our present policy decision to change to computer disc format in the best interest of our members and for the good of the order?" We discussed in more detail how the Mass State Grange prepares their Journal and questioned if and how we could use similar procedures for our own. We decided that the decision to print paper copies or not would be held until after special session when we will know if we will have a dues increase or not.

We also discussed the need for more correct and thorough preparation of the results of action on resolutions during sessions. Carolyn would like to have a meeting with the Resolutions Committee before session. She has been instructed to prepare written guidelines for the purpose of instructing the Resolutions Director what the State Secretary needs from him before his report at State Session can be accepted.

Carolyn also noted that she needs a new state grange seal for her office and we decided this would be an expense from our printing/postage/supply account.

Chairman's Agenda

Starr King Grange Hall- we have received both the policy and the bill for the insurance since our last meeting. We reviewed our plans to sell the hall and noted that Beth will write a letter to Mr. Estabrook. Don has obtained a copy of the assessors office report noting there is no well, no septic system, there is a furnace, it has a dirt cellar with one foundation wall crumbling, the roof is sagging and the land is basically just what the building sits on with room for 2 or 3 cars to park in front. We also noted the abutters should be contacted and perhaps the realtor can handle that for us. Dan moved that Don Ross, Chairman be empowered to act as agent for the NH State Grange Executive Committee to sell the building known as Starr King Grange Hall in Jefferson, NH. Beth seconded the motion. Motion was approved.

Master's Agenda

Moultonborough Grange- Beth reported that Paul went with her to their last meeting and that a quorum was not present. State Master Beth Merrill has revoked their charter as of July 13, 2009. Mt Livermore Grange has voted to accept the former members of Moultonborough Grange. There are no known assets and their dues were only collected through June 30, 2009. Their quarterly report to the State Grange for the June 30 quarter has been filed. We noted that the closure of this Grange now leaves Carroll County Pomona with only two Granges in their district.

National Session in 2013- Beth reported that we are one step closer to having session in NH as the National EC recently voted to hold session here in 2013. Contracts have not been signed yet.

Dorchester Grange- is planning an event on August 8 or 9 and anyone interested may attend. Beth has been asked to present an award.

State Session locations- Beth suggested we keep larger, possibly newly-built church halls in mind when planning future sessions, as there are some that might be suitable for our needs.

Next Meeting- Gail requested that everyone not only review the material we have received from our three financial presentations but to also make notes about both the positive and negative items from each for more efficient discussion on July 30. She noted we also need to review our spending policy and hopes we can decide on both our investment plan and spending policy that night as both will impact the amount of invested income included in the proposed budget to be discussed and voted on at special session. She also noted that our proposed expenses have been reduced as much as possible and suggested we need to consider fundraising proposals next to balance the proposed budgets. We will meet on July 30 at 7pm at Hooksett and the Trustees of the Trust Funds are invited to meet then also.

Jim gave each member present an updated copy of our project sheets noting we now have more closed items than open ones.

Meeting adjourned at 9:55pm.

The property is about .75 acres and the town values it at \$29,300 land and \$94,500 building for a total of \$123,800. Don would like an offer from Mr. Estabrook. The property is not listed at this time.

We began at 7:10 PM by reviewing our ongoing project sheets updating notes, reassigning some tasks and closing those that were completed.

Chairman Don Ross called the meeting to order at 7:28 PM with all members present.

We began by discussing the need for a written **investment policy** statement and members shared samples and information they had obtained since our last meeting. We also noted that it is recommended that this policy be prepared with the assistance of a financial professional. Gail reported she is unable to determine our actual present earning rate with TD Wealth Management as Tim Woodhouse is out of the office this week.

We also reviewed the need for a written **conflict of interest policy** and disclaimer statement for all Executive Committee members. We again examined samples members had obtained and determined that some seem very complex while others seem fairly basic. We feel we would like to begin with a basic style and Mark Collins volunteered to prepare a sample policy and disclaimer based on the samples and information collected. Once we have examined Mark's samples the forms will be sent to our legal counsel for approval before we begin using them. We noted the

IRS 990 form we file each year asks if we have such a policy in existence. The IRS and NH State AG Office both strongly recommend that all non-profit organizations have this policy.

We decided what our procedures for handling these forms would be.

- All Executive Committee members will sign the policy each year at the first EC meeting following Installation of Officers.
- The State Secretary will keep the blank policies on hand and provide them when needed.
- The signed originals will be stored in the fire proof storage box at the State Grange building with photocopies on file with the State Master, Secretary and EC Chairman for easy reference if needed.

Treasurer's Agenda-

Mark Collins made a motion that we reopen the **discussion of financial advisors** based on new suggestions Gail has received since our last meeting. Dan Bascom seconded the motion. Motion was approved with a vote of five yes and two no.

Gail explained in further detail the e-mail notice she had sent just after our last meeting. Both financial advisors contacted her by phone after our last meeting and expressed deep disappointment that they were not selected as our financial advisors. Gail Turcotte, Treasurer will contact both firms to establish the new accounts.

Treasurer's contact information for the Roster- Gail asked if we should begin asking for this information to be included as there could be a need to contact the Subordinate or Pomona Treasurers for assistance with the 990-N IRS reports and possibly also if Grange Charters are suspended. We decided after discussion that the State Secretary would add space for the information to the Roster update sheets but we would not actually print the listings in the Roster. The Treasurer contact information will be provided as needed and requested.

Junior Grange Department bank account update- Gail noted that she had been requested to contact the bank where our existing Youth Department account is held and ask if we could add the Junior Director, Rhonda Lambert as an authorized signer and if we could change the title of the account to include the word Junior. Dan Bascom moved that we approve the account name change and adding Rhonda Lambert, Junior Director as a third authorized signer to the existing bank account. Paul Davis seconded the motion. They will not be preparing any paperwork in advance; rather it will be prepared at our scheduled meeting on Wednesday August 26 at 1 PM. Gail & Don Plan to attend the meeting. Beth is unable to attend due to a previous commitment. Hannah West moved the Treasurer and Executive Committee Chairman be authorized to sign any necessary paperwork for Edward Jones. Paul Davis seconded the motion. The motion was approved by a vote of 7 yes and 0 no.

We reviewed the need for the new **501c3 foundation directors to have funding** for filing the paperwork necessary to create the foundation. Mark Collins moved that the NH State Grange pay all filing fees associated with the creation of the 501c3 foundation. Hannah West seconded the

motion. The motion was approved by a vote of 7 yes and 0 no. We noted that the directors need a check today if possible for the incorporation fee with the NH Secretary's of State Office.

Mark has been working on our proposed **conflict of interest policy** and hopes to have a draft for us to examine at our next meeting. We noted that it would be helpful if someone could prepare a sample draft of an **investment/spending policy** for us to examine at the same time.

Our next meeting will be September 29 at 7:30 PM at Hooksett.

We offered one correction and noted that comments from our professional financial advisors should be requested. We noted that this policy would not affect the two charitable trust funds as the Trustees govern both funds. Mark Collins moved we accept the policy as amended pending approval by our financial

advisors. Paul Davis seconded the motion. Motion carried by vote of 7-yes 0-no. Gail will follow up with our financial advisors.

Spending Policy- we decided to handle this issue separately even though it is part of the Investment Policy. We noted that our investments with TD Wealth Management have earned an average rate of 3.87% after fees are deducted since the account was opened about 11 years ago. We have been spending at a rate of 5% for that same length of time. All three financial advisors have recommended we select a rate between 3% and 4% of our annual market value and no higher than 5%. After discussion, Beth Merrill moved we select 3 ½% for fiscal year 2009-2010. Mark Collins seconded the motion. The motion carried by vote of 7-yes and 0-no. Gail will notify our financial advisors of our decision.

Treasurer's Agenda

Trust Funds – Gail reported that she has been waiting 7 days for a requested check from TD Wealth Management to be delivered by mail from Vermont. She will follow up with our contact for a third time and if necessary ask for a duplicate check to be issued. She also noted that the new contracts are still being signed by the Trustees.

New Investment Accounts- Gail reported that both new accounts have been opened and statements for the last few days in August have been received as well as trade confirmations and prospectus information.

Secretary's Agenda

June Quarterly Report- As we reviewed Carolyn's report we learned that Ashuelot Grange is in the process of consolidating with Prentice Hill Grange. We noted that Sullivan Grange would be reported as closed by revocation of charter on September 30. Jim Tetreault plans to attend Sullivan County Pomona's final meeting on October 3 and pick up their charter. They will be reported as closed as of that date. We noted this means they will need to file a final quarterly report for the September 30 quarter. The two remaining Subordinate Granges will be assigned to new Pomonas. Park Grange will go to Mascoma Valley and Sunapee Lake to Merrimack County Pomona effective October 30, 2009. Beth Merrill moved we accept the Secretary's report as presented. Dan Bascom seconded the motion. The motion carried by a vote of 6-yes 0-no.

Special Session Minutes- we reviewed the corrected minutes and found no further corrections needed. Mark Collins moved we accept the minutes as corrected. Hannah West seconded the motion. The motion carried by a vote of 6-yes 0-no.

2008 Journal of Proceedings – We noted that the projected budget for FY 2010 does not balance at this time and additional cost saving measures would be welcome. We decided to use our plan outlined at our July 9 meeting for the 2008 Journal. The 2008 Journal will be made available on the NH State Grange Website and we will print and bind 4 copies and distribute one each to the National Master, State Secretary, State Historian, and State Grange archives. Any additional printed copies of the 2008 Journal will be available upon request to the State Secretary for a fee of \$7 each.

Chairman's Agenda

Hudson/Wattannick Granges – Deputy Don Ross reported that he and the State Master have received a letter from Hudson Grange notifying the State Grange they are inviting Wattannick Grange to consider consolidation with them.

Starr King Grange Hall- Don reported Peter Estabrook has mowed the lawn several times for us as well as cut back brush near the building. At Don's request Mr. Estabrook has placed a new hasp and padlock on both doors to the building. Don has contacted a new realtor who seems enthusiastic about the listing. Aureore Hood, Realtor in Lancaster has noted that we have several antique benches and stoves in the building and suggests we consider selling them. She knows a local antique dealer she will contact for us. A new appraisal from the Town of Jefferson has been requested and once we have that figure Ms. Hood will send Don her estimate of what price we should ask for the property. Don plans a workday this Saturday October 3 at the building and has arranged for electricity to be turned back on by PSNH. He noted the reconnect fee is \$35 with no disconnect fee and the base rate for service is estimated at \$11.13 per month. This was a more reasonable choice than renting a generator. Don noted there might be an

antique stage curtain in the hall and he will look for it this weekend. Beth Merrill moved we do not sell the curtain at this time if it is found. Dan Bascom seconded the motion. The motion carried by a vote of 7-yes 0-no. We noted that as the curtain may be quite large we might be able to store it temporarily with Ann Leger.

State Session Coordinator- Don reported that Ken Berry has received the contract from the Best Western in Keene for 2010 State Session. The contract needs quite a few revisions and Ken is working on them. Ken expects to work on the location for 2011 in early 2010.

NH Grange Foundation – Gail reported that the incorporation application has now been approved and the Directors notified.

State Grange building use by the Pansy Rebekahs and storage space was discussed.

Project Sheets - we reviewed the sheets noting what items could be closed, progress on the open items and adding new as needed. Jim will update the sheets and distribute them to members.

Banquet Ticket Deadline- Dan Bascom noted that the earlier than usual deadline this year may make it difficult for the Department Directors to notify their award winners and receive payment for any tickets requested by the award recipients. We noted that award winners would need to be contacted as soon as possible.

Our next meeting will be Sunday October 25 at Hooksett following rehearsal. Rehearsal begins at 1PM and the books of the Secretary, Treasurer, Trust Funds and Education Loan Fund will be audited at this meeting.

Meeting adjourned at 10:09 PM.

Conflict of Interest Policy for the New Hampshire State Grange of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry

The purpose of the following policy and procedures is to complement the New Hampshire State Grange of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry bylaws to prevent the personal interest of Executive Committee members and designated individuals from interfering with the performance of their duties to, or result in personal financial, professional, or political gain on the part of such persons at the expense of the New Hampshire State Grange of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry organization.

Definitions: Conflict of Interest (also Conflict) means a conflict, or the appearance of a conflict, between private interests and official responsibilities of a person in a position of trust. Persons in a position of trust include State Officers, Executive Committee members and others designated by the State Master or Executive Committee.

POLICY AND PRACTICES

1. Full disclosure, by notice in writing, shall be made by the interested parties to the full Executive Committee in all conflicts of interest, including but not limited to the following:
 - a. An Executive Committee member or designated individual is related to another member by blood marriage or domestic partnership.
 - b. An Executive Committee member or designated individual or their organization stands to benefit from a transaction such as receiving payment for any subcontract, goods, or services other than as part of her/his regular job responsibilities.
 - c. An Executive Committee member or designated individual is working on behalf of any who meets any of the situations or criteria listed above.
2. Anyone in a position to make decisions about spending resources who also stands to benefit from that decision – has a duty to disclose that conflict as soon as it arises (or becomes apparent): s/he should not participate in any final decisions.
3. Following full disclosure of a possible conflict of interest or any condition listed above, the Executive Committee shall determine whether a conflict of interest exists and, if so the

Executive Committee shall vote to authorize or reject the transaction or take any other action deemed necessary to address the conflict and protect all involved parties best interests. Both votes shall be by a majority vote without counting the vote of any interested Executive Committee member.

4. Transactions with parties whom a conflicting interest exists may be undertaken only if all of the following are observed:
5.
 - A. The conflicting interest is fully disclosed;
 - B. The person with the conflict is excluded from the approval of such transaction;
 - C. A competitive bid or comparable valuation exists; and
 - D. The Executive Committee has determined that the transaction is in the best interest of the organization.
6. An interested Executive Committee member or designated individual shall not participate in any discussion or debate of the Executive Committee, or of any committee or subcommittee thereof in which the subject of discussion is a conflict, transaction, or situation in which there may be a perceived or actual conflict of interest. However, they may be present to provide clarifying information in such a discussion or debate unless objected to by any present board or committee member.
7. Each Executive Committee member or designated individual shall exercise care not to disclose confidential information acquired in connection with disclosures of conflicts of interest or potential conflicts which might be adverse to the interests of the New Hampshire State Grange of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry. Furthermore they shall not disclose or use information relating to the business of the New Hampshire State Grange of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry for their personal profit or advantage or the personal profit or advantage of their family member(s).
8. Monetary transactions shall be governed by New Hampshire law (RSA 7:19-a).
9. Board compositions shall be governed by New Hampshire law (RSA 292:6-a).
10. A copy of this policy shall be given to all Executive Committee members or other designated individuals upon commencement of such person's relationship with or at the official adoption of stated policy. Each Executive Committee member and designated individual shall sign and date the policy at the beginning of her/his term of service and each year thereafter. Failure to sign does not nullify the policy.
11. This policy and disclosure form must be filed annually by all specified parties.

**INVESTMENT AND SPENDING POLICY
NH STATE GRANGE OF THE ORDER OF PATRONS OF HUSBANDRY**

I. INVESTMENT AUTHORITY AND RESPONSIBILITY

As stated in the New Hampshire State Grange By-laws Article IX Section 3 the Executive Committee shall "supervise the investment and disbursement of money's belonging to the State Grange."

II. PURPOSE

The purposes of the following investment guidelines, which are to be reviewed annually by the Executive Committee, are to:

Establish the investment objectives, policies, guidelines and eligible securities relating to any investments owned or controlled by the NH State Grange.

- Identify the criteria against which the investment performance of the organization's investments will be measured.
- Communicate the objectives to the Executive Committee, Treasurer, investment managers and funding sources that may have involvement.
- Serve as a review document to guide the ongoing oversight of the management of the organization's investments.

III. GUIDELINES FOR INVESTING:

The investment goal of the total fund is to achieve a total return (income and appreciation) of 5% after inflation, over a full market cycle (3-5 years). The following guidelines apply to the three main investment asset classes:

Equities: Allowable Range- Minimum 60%; Maximum 70% of total assets

The equity component of the portfolio will consist of high quality equity securities traded on the New York, NASDAQ, or American Stock exchanges. The securities must be screened for their above average financial characteristics such as price-to-earnings, return-on-equity, debt-to-capital ratios, etc.

It is acceptable to invest in an equity mutual fund(s) adhering to the investment characteristics identified above, as long as it is a no-load fund, which maintains an expense ratio consistent with those other funds of similar investment styles as measured by the Lipper and/or Morningstar rating services.

Prohibited equity investments include: initial public offerings, restricted securities, private placements, derivatives, options, futures and margined transactions.

EXCEPTIONS TO THE PROHIBITED INVESTMENT POLICY MAY BE MADE ONLY WHEN ASSETS ARE INVESTED IN A MUTUAL FUND (S), THAT PERIODICALLY UTILIZES PROHIBITED STRATEGIES TO MITIGATE RISK AND ENHANCE RETURN.

Fixed Income: Allowable Range- Minimum 30%; Maximum 40% of total assets

Bond investments will consist solely of taxable, fixed income securities that have an investment-grade rating (Baa or higher) that possess a liquid secondary market.

No more than 5% of the fixed income portfolio will be invested in corporate bonds of the same issuer. As well, not more than 20% of the fixed income portfolio will be invested in bonds of issuers in the same industry.

Prohibited securities include: private placements, derivatives, (other than floating-rate coupon bonds), and margined transactions.

EXCEPTIONS TO THE PROHIBITED INVESTMENT POLICY MAY BE MADE ONLY WHEN ASSETS ARE INVESTED IN A MUTUAL FUND (S), THAT PERIODICALLY UTILIZES PROHIBITED STRATEGIES TO MITIGATE RISK AND ENHANCE RETURN.

Cash and equivalents: Allowable Range- Maximum 5% of total assets

Cash and equivalents will be utilized for the liquidity needs of the portfolio whose objective is to seek as high a current income as is consistent with liquidity and stability of principal.

IV. PERFORMANCE AND MEASUREMENT STANDARDS

The benchmarks to be used in evaluating the performance of the two main asset classes will be:

- Equities: S & P 500 Index- Goal: exceed the average annual return of the index over a full market cycle (3-5 years).
- Fixed Income: Lehman Brothers Government/Corporate Index- Goal: exceed the average annual return of the index over a full market cycle (3-5 years).

V. REPORTING

Financial statements shall be issued at least quarterly and may be issued more frequently if needed or desired. Statements shall list current investments, their costs, current values and transaction history.

Performance reviews will be provided at least once annually and maybe more frequent if desired by a representative of each investment service to the Executive Committee.

VI. SPENDING POLICY

The spending policy should support the level of current spending while growing the size of current investments to keep pace with inflation and support future obligations.

Each year, the Treasurer is authorized to withdraw **up to 3-½ %** of the total market value of the invested funds (market value to be determined as of the last business day of the preceding fiscal year) for the organization's operating purposes. The dollar amount and timing of any distribution(s) from the investment account will be left up to the discretion of the Executive Committee Chairman and Treasurer. All withdrawals are subject to the rules and guidelines presently in effect for each current investment account.

Any withdrawals of principal require the approval of the NH State Grange Executive Committee.

Adopted by the NH State Grange Executive Committee on September 29, 2009 pending approval by financial advisors.

NH State Grange Executive Committee Minutes October 25, 2009- Hooksett, NH

Meeting called to order at 3:29PM with all members present. Prior to the meeting the Executive Committee audited the financial records of the Treasurer, Secretary, Trustees of Trust Funds and Education Loan Fund.

Executive Committee Secretary Agenda

Minutes of September 29, 2009. After brief discussion we decided the minutes would be accepted as written.

Election of two Trustees of Trust Funds- Carolyn made a motion to elect Rodney Huntoon and C. Ann Leger as Trustees of the Trust Funds for three-year terms. Mark Collins seconded the motion. State Master Beth Merrill confirmed she had spoken with both trustees and they have agreed to serve if re-elected. Motion approved 7-yes 0-no.

Chairman's Agenda

Proposed Budget for 2009-2010- all members reviewed the proposal prepared by the Treasurer and discussed several line items in detail.

Carolyn Ross made a motion to accept the proposed budget as amended for presentation to the Delegates. Dan Bascom seconded the motion. Motion approved 7-yes 0-no.

Fidelity Grange- Deputy Don Ross has met with them again and answered further questions about consolidation of Granges procedures. He instructed them they must send a written letter to the State Master as soon as possible.

Wattannick/Hudson- Deputy Don Ross reported that the proposed consolidation is on hold for now.

Starr King Grange Hall- Don reported that the planned clean up day did take place and the building is clean now. Don took pictures of the building including the backdrop curtain. He plans to have the pictures available by State Session. He has received a new appraisal from the Town of Jefferson on the property of \$65,600, which is reduced from the former amount of \$108,000. Aura Hood, Realtor from Lancaster will list the property in mutual listings for \$59,500 for 30 days. If no interest is shown after 30 days the listing price will be reduced. Our contract with her firm is for one year. We have not received any bill from PSNH yet. A realtor for sale sign will be placed on the property.

State Sessions- the contract for 2010 in Keene still needs corrections. The due date for signing the contract is November 12, 2009 to hold a block of rooms for individual members. It was noted the \$850 deposit already paid is to hold the meeting room only. Ken Berry, session coordinator has requested approval from the Executive Committee to pursue plans for 2011 session at the Town & Country Motor Inn in Shelburne. Beth Merrill moved Ken Berry pursue plans for the T & C in 2011 for session. Hannah West seconded the motion. Motion approved 7-yes 0-no.

Treasurer's Agenda

Fourth Quarter Reports- After reviewing the reports Carolyn Ross moved the reports be accepted as presented. Dan Bascom seconded the motion. Motion approved 7-yes 0-no.

Randall Richardson Memorial Youth Fund- After discussion two portions of the proposed guidelines presented by Jim Tetreault were amended. Hannah West moved to accept the guidelines as amended. Paul Davis seconded the motion. Motion approved 7-yes 0-no.

Jim Tetreault reviewed our ongoing **project sheets** noting he had started a new sheet for the new EC year. We closed several items and reopened two that need additional work.

The **Patron's Plunge** was discussed by E-mail since our last meeting. Dan Bascom moved we authorize State Master Beth Merrill to solicit donations for the Patron's Plunge in support of National Master Ed Luttrell and any funds raised by Ed's participation will be donated to the National Grange Trademark Protection Fund. Carolyn seconded the motion. Motion approved 7-yes 0-no.

State Master Beth Merrill gave **local Grange issues** updates.

RANDALL RICHARDSON MEMORIAL YOUTH FUND GUIDELINES

The Randall Richardson Memorial Youth Fund was established in memory of Randall Richardson, who served the NH State Grange in several capacities. At the request of the Richardson family a memorial fund was established in 1968 to be used for Youth Work, especially to help send the Youth to National Grange.

- Individual Granges are encouraged to send donations on a yearly basis to the State Youth Director.

- The NH State Grange Youth Director will transfer annually by September 20th all Randall Richardson Memorial Youth Fund donations to the NH State Grange Treasurer for investment into principal of the fund.
- The accrued income from the fund will be used to assist with travel expenses for Youth Ambassadors, Young Couple, National Officer Corps, and contest winners such as Sign-a-Song and Public Speaking.
- Income may be accrued on a five-year cumulative basis. If any first year income is unspent at the beginning of the sixth fiscal year that portion of income will revert to the principal of the fund.
- The distribution of funds shall be at the discretion of the Youth Director. The NH State Grange Treasurer will assist the Youth Director by determining that sufficient accrued income is available for use in those years that National Session is held furthest from NH and anticipated travel expenses will be the greatest.
- These guidelines may be amended by a majority vote of the NH State Grange Executive Committee.

Adopted October 25, 2009 NH State Grange Executive Committee

Report of the Legislative Department

Worthy Master, Honored Guests and Brother and Sister Patrons:

It is a pleasure to deliver my annual report of the New Hampshire State Grange Legislative Department.

The New Year started out with the annual Northeast Leader's Conference, hosted by the Massachusetts State Grange. This conference is an opportunity for the Legislative Directors of the other six northeast states to gather and discuss common policy issues.

In February the Legislative Committee had the opportunity to meet during the Winter Youth rally to discuss the upcoming legislative session. One of the major initiatives we have worked on this spring is helping to save the NH Department of Agriculture. The governor proposed that the department be combined with several others. The Grange and the Farm Bureau worked together on this. I want to thank all of you who contacted NH House members to spread the Grange's opposition on this important issue. With your help we were able to play a part in attracting over 200 people to attend the hearing; the issue was deemed ITL (inexpedient to legislate).

I was pleased to have had the opportunity to host Connecticut State Grange Legislative Director, Gordon Gibson at the Spring Fling, where he conducted an informative workshop on working in coalition with other organizations. Thank you, Brother Gordon for your assistance.

We have also been focusing on dairy issues; I have written to members of Congress as well as the Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsac on these issues. We are greatly concerned with the conditions of dairy farms in the state of New Hampshire. Thanks to Rep. Bob Haefner, the Grange was represented at a meeting with Secretary Vilsac when he visited NH this spring.

The Worthy State Master, the State Assistant Steward, and I attended the 2009 Legislative Fly-In held at the National Grange headquarters in Washington, DC. What an extraordinary conference this year! Our schedule was very busy. We started on Sunday with a tour of the Seawall/Belmont House and Suffragist Movement Museum. What an interesting tour about a part of history that I was not fully informed on. Our evening ended with a speaker, Megan Keneally, a student at Georgetown University who recently wrote a paper on "How Successful was the Early Grange in Meeting its Founders' Objectives?"

Monday we were presented with a series of issues-oriented workshops:

Issue #1: Developing a National Broadband Strategy that includes Rural America, presented by Bruce Mehlman, Co-Chair of the Internet Innovation Alliance.

Issue #2: Retirement Security Challenges Facing Family Farmers and Rural Americans in an uncertain Economic Environment, presented by Al Coors, Director of Government Affairs for Retire Safe.org.

Issue #3: Expanding of Wireless, “Lifeline Telephone service” for low income Rural Americans presented by Maureen Thompson – senior partner of the Hastings Group.

Issue #4: Digital Television Update: “Less than 30 days to go, are we ready?” presented by Mike Diserio, Director of Public Affairs for DTV Transition

Issue #5: Health Care Reform: “Bridging the Health Care Gap in Farming and Rural Communities” presented by Jeff Oldham, Deputy Vice President of Pharma.

Issue #6: Impact of the Financial Crisis on Financing for Family Farms and Rural Homeowners presented by Tom D. Stenson, Executive Vice President of Agriculture Finance.

Issue #7: Renewable Energy and Climate Change presented by Tom Buis, President of Growth Energy.

As you can see, we had to take in a lot of information in one day. All of the workshops were excellent and very worthwhile.

The “big day” is always Tuesday, the day we spend on Capitol Hill. We were fortunate to have the opportunity to meet someone from every congressional office that represents the citizens from NH. I truly believe that everyone is working very hard on our behalf. Our day ended with a nice dinner with lots of conversation about what happened during the day. We also had the opportunity to have our picture taken with Rep. Carol Shea-Porter, who knew that NH Grangers were in the area and actually tracked us down to, say ‘hi’ and pose for a quick picture.

This fall we had our annual Northeast Masters and Legislative Meeting at Eastern States. I was unable to attend this year as my own Grange was having Deputy Inspection that day so Bob Haefner represented me. Discussions centered on the hemp issue with our own State Master providing resource material. Other discussion focused on opposition to legislation that is currently before congress that would place difficult regulation on small family farmers.

This year’s Legislative Awards are being presented as follows Outstanding Legislator-Tara Sad of Walpole for all her work on behalf of Dairy Farmers, the Clesson “Junie” Blaisdell Awards to Dr. Stephen Crawford, NH State Veterinarian and the Robert M. Bodwell Award to Bob Haefner again for his outstanding work on behalf of Dairy issues.

I want to take the opportunity to thank all of my committee members who assisted me this year, with special thanks to Mary West who proofed our resolutions as well as several documents and letters this year. This is such a valuable service especially when you are word-and-grammar-challenged.

State Membership Chairman Stephen Tracy was called upon to give the Membership Development report.

2009 Membership Development Report

The year started off with a presentation at Leadership School on what Mark Collins and I learned from Rusty Hunt in New Jersey on building and rebuilding Granges. Feedback was positive and we learned that our presentation was too short to feed the interest.

Again this year we had more GRIT teams trained and put into service. GRIT means "Granges Really in Trouble." Throughout the year we have learned that there are more GRIT Granges than there are trained team members. Rather than accidentally snub anyone this year, I will ask if you are a trained team member, please stand. Thank you for your efforts.

On June 27, a team went to Aurora Grange for Degree Day; there were six Aurora candidates and one from Winthrop. Good job, Aurora and Winthrop. These are two strong and active Granges, and if you miss the ritual like I do, I suggest a visit to these Granges. They have pianists and they do the floor work in grand style.

During one of our leadership meetings, general conversation turned toward Granges bringing in new members. Numbers tossed around were quite positive. It appears that we are on an upward swing. Good work, Grangers!

One thing I spoke of last year was improving our Grange image. From what I am hearing across the state, this is happening in a positive manner. In order to grow, we need to make sure that the community knows we are there and are a positive member of our community.

Some examples of community activities are Granite Grange suppers, Meriden Grange movie and speaker nights, Park Grange fair booth, Halloween Night Open House and breakfasts. Blow-Me-Down Grange has suppers, brunches, flea markets and rummage sales, Christmas bazaar and July 4th activities. The community talk has changed; it is no longer "I thought the Grange was dead."

Inspired by the loss of Cornish Grange, three struggling nearby Granges (Park, Blow-Me-Down and Meriden) combined efforts and started a summer agriculture series with speakers and activities held once a month at the three different halls. About ten people were expected but fifty showed up at the first meeting!! Talk about fishes and loaves! True to the Grange image, everyone got something to eat.

In my travels to meetings, I hear excuses why a Grange can't do something. I spoke of this last year as one of our biggest deterrents to growth and activity. Little Park Grange and Blow-Me-Down Grange have proven what a positive outlook can do even with a small and somewhat elderly membership, and Park Grange doesn't even have a full kitchen! This has increased activity among members of Park to the point where more members come out to the breakfasts than to meetings, so the meetings have been changed to follow the breakfasts. For the winter they will have soup and sandwiches with board and card games, and general socializing one Saturday a month.

Due to the number of GRIT Granges in comparison to GRIT team members and requests from other Grangers, I am planning a training frenzy next year. Realizing that we cannot afford Rusty again, the plan is to utilize our capably trained team members at several locations across the state. Our trained members are hardworking and dedicated, but it is too big a job for them. We need more workers in the field. These trainings will be one-day sessions with either a bring-your-own lunch or possibly a meal served by the host Grange. Remember, it is the duty of all members to be good membership stewards.

With all the newly trained GRIT team members, I would like to express Worthy National Master's challenge of growth for next year. Growth can be the number of new members or it can be the revitalizing of old Granges, or starting a whole new Grange, Subordinate or Pomona. Remember the joy when Peterborough Grange came into our midst? I challenge you to at least two new or revitalized Subordinate Granges, and I double challenge you to rebuild a Pomona with the new Subordinate. MAKE MY DAY!!!!

I want to honor some Granges for two different aspects of Grange growth. A positive Grange image in the community is important to Grange growth; a Grange which has 'stepped out of the box' of 'we can't do that' attitude to being an active Grange within its community. Honorable Mention goes to Park Grange; job well done. But the Good Grange Image Award goes to Blow-Me-Down.

Another aspect of Grange growth is new members. A struggling Grange that can work to increase its membership deserves recognition and honor. Although Walpole Grange took in 17 new members, they are a strong Grange. I give them Honorable Mention. I also give Honorable Mention to Aurora Grange. But the Phoenix Award goes to Riverhill Grange; once a struggling-to-meet Grange, they have taken in 14 new members. Riverhill and Blow-Me-Down Granges will each receive \$250 for their efforts.

There may be other Granges who have done well, but I did not hear of their work or read it in the *Granite State Granger*. I want to thank all Grangers for another successful year, and I look forward to the opportunity to serve you again next year.

Report of the Trustees of Trust Funds

Worthy Master, Distinguished Guests, Brothers and Sisters all:

The past year can be described as one of tremendous turmoil for the Trustees. We have been trying to get in compliance with the new rules and regulations with the Attorney General's office. We had to set a historical value for both the Trust and the Blaisdell Funds at \$40,000.00 and \$9,000.00 respectively. A spending policy of 3½ % was also established rather than the previous 5%.

Our funds fell below the historic values due to the stock market valuations; therefore the Attorney General's office forced us to halt our assistance program for our fellow Grangers. We realize the great need out there, but our hands were tied. We are now above the historic figures and have been able to assist one recipient, who will receive payment in the 2009-2010 year. One applicant received funds in the early part of this year.

We are not being allowed to co-mingle our funds with the larger pool of the State Grange Accounts. In reviewing the investment opportunities for the Grange Funds, the Executive Committee invited the Trustees to meet with our present investor and two other investors. Some of our members were able to attend and then we met to make our final decision. The vote was to stay with the present investment service.

At this time, we are in the process of signing a contract with TD Wealth Management to set up our account separate from the other State Grange Funds. This will also change the type of investments we are allowed.

This past year has been one of frustration and anxiety for your trustees. We are hopeful that when we have our new accounts set up, we will be able to fulfill the mission of assisting our fellow Grangers in their time of need.

Treasurer - Upon approval of at least 3 trustees the treasurer will send a copy of the donation letter and voting record to the chairman. To be responsible for submitting financial Trust Fund records of all Trust funds for annual audit by the NH state grange and financial reports to the Internal Revenue Service and the NH Attorney General- Charitable Trust Unit.

Other Business;

The NH State Grange Ex. Committee audited the Trust fund records.

Donations for immediate needs total \$225.50. A check of \$225.50 was given to the individual who was voted on at the previous meeting, the rest of the \$300.00 allocated for the person will be sent later when we may use our funds.

Worthy Master Beth Merrill updated us on the search for other wealth managers that we may invite in to show us their portfolio management. Brayshaw Financial, Ben Brayshaw, owner, invests using annuities, not mutual funds and the Worthy Master thinks that it would be very beneficial if we would come to a meeting with them. Potential meeting date of December 6th was set up, Jim Tetreault will be in contact with us in a few days to verify the date and time.

Also during the past year, the seal and the toilet valve assembly were replaced in the women's bathroom. The men's room toilet had been replaced the year before. Assorted ballasts and light bulbs were changed during the year as well as the batteries in the smoke detectors. The light switches in the box in the back of the hall were relabeled to hopefully lower confusion about "which switch is which."

Paul and Rhoda Davis continue to do summer lawn maintenance and the Bascoms continue to maintain the plantings around the building. Claire Gagne continues to clean the building on a regular basis and report any issues to the building manager. The furnace was cleaned this fall.

Hannah West has been taking reservations for the use of the building and arranging for the pick-up and drop-off of keys. So far in 2009, ten groups have used the building for baby showers, birthday parties, and other such gatherings (2008 data not available). Upcoming/ongoing projects include renewing the assembly permit with the Hooksett Fire Department, fixing the inside damage caused by the old roof leaking, and tracking down keys to the building held by people who no longer are in need of them.

When it comes to contracting a hotel you really have two contracts, not just one. It has been a learning experience and a lot to learn. State Master's Address

Distinguished Guests, Officers of the NH State Grange, Delegates and Patrons:
It is with honor I present to you now my third Annual Address.

Travelogue

I'd like to open my Address with a quick travelogue and highlights from the past year while serving as your State Master. I wrote details about these in my columns in the *Granite State Granger*, so I won't elaborate here, but would just like to acknowledge my attendance at these events for the record:

National convention in Cromwell, CT; Northeast Leaders' Conference in MA; Farm & Forest Expo; Winter Youth Rally; State Masters' Conference in Fayetteville, AR; Spring Fling Grange Month Kickoff; two meetings of the Grange Building Trustees and the Northeast Connection at the New England Grange Building; National Grange Legislative Fly-In; New England Go To Church Sunday; Family Weekend; Northeast Youth Conference; first meeting of the NH Grange Foundation; Northeast Lecturer's Conference; Summer Deputy School; the Big "E" Grange store volunteer; National Representative to the Illinois and Connecticut State Granges; Dorchester Grange's Curtain Celebration.

2008 National Grange

What a blast we had in Cromwell, CT at the 142nd Annual Convention of the National Grange. More than fifty NH Grangers attended at least a portion of the convention, including talent winner, Kathy Yardley of Walpole Grange, sign-a-song winner, Marie Hall of Gilman Grange, Allissa Estes of Somersworth Grange who served as Flora for the youth opening, and Sarah Leclerc of Hudson Grange who was the scepter bearer for the Trumpet Girl March during the Seventh Degree. They all did New Hampshire proud! I enjoyed the duties of the Lady Assistant Steward and also served as Attendant #1 for the Seventh Degree. I appreciated the opportunity to see the conferral from behind the curtain. This year, I'm looking forward to sharing the stage with Dan Bascom, Priest Archon, and Arthur Merrill, who will be Priest Conductor. Many thanks to Hannah West, Allissa Estes, Mark Collins, Tricia Taylor, Jim Tetreault, and Gloria Davis for volunteering to help out on NH's day to host the convention.

National Grange 2013

It was announced this summer that indeed, New Hampshire is to host the 2013 National Grange Convention, which will be held at the Radisson Hotel and Center of NH in Manchester. Much work lies before us all, as we will want to show off the admirable qualities of our state and our people. Plans will be starting very soon, as we want to make a memorable convention for everyone involved just in case it's another 100 years before National Grange comes to our state for their annual convention. You will be notified soon of an upcoming "start-up" dreaming session where anyone interested in sharing some ideas for tour stops, table favors, notable speakers, etc. should plan to come and share their ideas!

Tyson Foods\Name Protection

Well, the threat from Tyson Foods to take our Grange name for their own commercial purposes seems to have subsided. Truly, was this not a modern-day David vs. Goliath story? I want to profusely express my gratitude to the NH Granges that supported the efforts of the National Grange by sending donations to offset the legal costs, and to congratulate our National Master for the first-class leadership he provided in guiding our organization through the maze of lawyers, legal action, and public relations.

While Tyson may now be out of the picture, the issue of protecting our trademark logo and name is morphing into a new campaign to defend us from a number of other business entities who are using the Grange name. Your National Executive committee has a 4-point plan to deal with this issue and our National Grange staff is working hard to put this in motion.

1. At the National Grange convention next month, it is expected that the delegates will adopt a new section in the Digest to set rules on how to gain use of the Grange trademark and who may use it.
2. Continue defending our name against those filing to take it and those infringing on it.

3. National Grange is collecting more information on specific goods and services that the Grange provides. This information will help to enhance the trademark protection and to file additional subcategories under our general trademarks. Your help is crucial to success.

4. Seek federal legislation to protect the Grange name at the same level as the Red Cross, Scouts, Olympic Committee and about 34 others. The National Grange will need your help as in the near future federal legislation will be introduced to provide additional protection that will virtually eliminate the chances of a large deep-pocket company filing against us again. This will be a congressional effort that will require the help and participation of every member.

Five Priorities

The Five Priorities of the National Grange are to:

- * Increase active membership and participation at each Community Grange
- * Develop new leaders and give them opportunities at each Community Grange
- * Revitalization of Community Granges as a State Grange Priority
- * Organize New Community Granges
- * Re-emphasize and strengthen the family structure through the Junior and Youth programs

Our State Grange Leadership Team in January 2008 adopted only four of these priorities at that time, rejecting the idea of forming new Granges as a main concern for growth within our State Grange. In a twist of irony, just three months later, Peterborough Grange #35 dropped out of the sky and into our laps.

There have been several small expressions of interest in starting Granges in several areas of the state, and providing that we can assemble some trained members willing to pursue such a lofty goal it would be great to see what can be developed in those little pockets of interest throughout the state.

Therefore, I recommend that our State Grange reconsider adopting a fifth priority set forth by our National Master that we didn't think applied to our state when first presented with the program in January 2008 and add organizing new community Granges as the fifth priority of focus for 2010.

Youth

The last of the National Master's Five Priorities of the Grange is to re-emphasize and strengthen the family structure through the Junior & Youth programs. The Youth Department in NH has a high degree of excellence in everything they do – except, it seems in gathering large numbers of youth members to youth events. I hope we all can support the Youth and Junior Directors in finding solutions and new ideas to encourage a higher percentage of participation by youth at State Grange functions. We especially need contacts for parents of children who would like to join a Jr. Grange. The Jr. Director has been authorized to organize a State Jr. Grange, but it's going to take a team to assist her in getting it up and running. We are also in serious need of Grange members who are willing to serve as Junior Leaders so that we can take the opportunity to organize several Jr. Granges over the next few years. Please do what you can to support this important investment into the future of the Grange.

As for the youth program, I would encourage the Granges who are in communities where their high school has an active FFA chapter, please contact them and invite them to make a presentation at your meeting. Learning more about their organization, whose roots of origin are deeply intertwined with the Grange, can plant the seed for future membership in the Grange, especially once their FFA membership expires by the age of twenty-two.

State Grange Foundation

Despite the delegate's approval to start forming the groundwork for establishing a NH Grange Foundation at last year's session, plans to do so were soon abandoned, by vote of the Executive Committee, when we learned that Granges could use the National Grange Foundation to fundraise for certain approved projects. This seemed an easier route to take until we learned later in the year that the State Grange is set to receive a substantial bequest from a deceased member who had benefited years ago when he was

awarded a Grange scholarship. The provision of the bequest is that it be received by a 501c3, and since our State Grange is a 501c8, we were not yet entitled to receive it. So consequently, we have restarted plans to organize our own Foundation and five Directors have been elected by the Executive Committee to work on its creation. You will hear a report from the Chairman of the Foundation, Jean Abbott at another time during this session. We will keep you informed as to whether or not we do receive the scholarship money that Clarence C. Sprague intended us to receive from his estate.

Pomona Granges

The new system of Pomona committee chairmen serving on State Committees got off to a rough start, especially with the 2008 ice storm interfering with our plans to hold an all-inclusive Deputy and Departments School, but I hope things are beginning to get on track. I appreciate the efforts of the few Pomona Masters who are truly making an effort to reach out to the Granges within their district. If any member would like to provide me with feedback as to how the plan of making the Pomona Grange an important link of communication between the State and Community Granges is progressing, I would like to receive it. We plan to continue working out the bugs so that the intent of this program is still intact allowing the Directors to have the assistance they need to carry out their duties.

Industrial Hemp

This spring I attended the hemp bill hearing in the NH House of Representatives. It was a disappointing year to say the least, as the bill did not even make it out of the House Environment and Agriculture committee. Instead, said committee indicated that this year they will draft a resolution to be sent to Congress stating their support for the federal government to legalize growing of hemp. Last year I challenged every Grange to develop and present programs during their meetings about the historical usage, stigma, manufactured products, environmental benefits, and/or economical impact of industrial hemp that will provide education on the issue in their own communities. Thanks to East Rockingham Pomona for their kind invitation to present a program at a meeting this year. I also have an invitation to speak at Rockingham Grange as soon as we can set a date to do so. **Again, this year, I challenge your Grange to present an educational industrial hemp program.**

Spring Fling

The second annual Spring Fling Grange Month Kickoff Event was held in April and featured a number of workshops on topics varying from sewing a quilt square to sustainable living to code book reading. The comments on the evaluation sheets that day were favorable, some even bemoaning the fact that there weren't more Grangers there to enjoy the multiple learning opportunities provided by the varying workshop topics and speakers. We were honored to have Lorraine Merrill, NH Commissioner of Agriculture as our featured speaker and she generously stayed and answered many questions that our members asked. If there is a topic that you would like to know more about, let me know and we will do our best to make sure that it is included in the 2010 Spring Fling program.

The Big "E"

Last year, I recommended that a committee be formed to visit the New Hampshire room in the New England Grange Building and evaluate the site, propose a redecorating scheme, initiate fundraising for this purpose, and complete the necessary work in a timely manner. Since no members came forth with an indication of interest in serving on the committee, and since fellow NH Grange Building trustees Jim Tetreault and Matthew Clark seemed willing to take on the task, the three of us did some minor renovations of the room, mostly by adding a fresh coat of paint. Our efforts were rewarded by many favorable comments from Grangers and fairgoers alike. Brother Clark will give a more detailed report later and outline some ideas of other things we'd like to add in order to do a better job showcasing New Hampshire attractions and products. An updated map was created for this year's expo, which shows where our current Granges are located. It is available for your viewing in the display room and you will note that the pins are color-coded by Pomona.

Painted Curtains

Many of you may remember the presentation that Chris Hadsel of the Vermont Painted Curtain project gave at a recent state convention at Nashua. She showed slides and explained the necessity and process on how to restore and care for the historic painted curtains and backdrops found at many Granges and Town Halls. Her research and restoration efforts in Vermont are mostly complete, so she is also talking about possibly making this a national project and was disappointed Worthy National Master to not be available to come and speak to you in person about her proposal.

In 2008, "Curtains Without Borders" and the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance began a survey to locate and document New Hampshire's collection of historic scenery. As of June 2009, 105 pieces have

been located and about 30 have been visited. The goal of the project is to raise awareness of New Hampshire's historic scenery and encourage conservation wherever possible. The NH Preservation Alliance is also interested in the condition and preservation needs of the town halls, granges, and other community buildings that traditionally house historic painted scenery. Compliance to Digest and By-laws

One thing I'm learning is that our organization, small and struggling though it may be, needs to be updated and learn to exist in the modern world. Because of our early culture of being an organization that is "secret", we have learned to carry out our business and activities in our quiet little meeting places, doing our service to communities with very little notice or fanfare. We don't ask much from our communities and they often don't think to ask much of us. We assume that this is how it will always be – the Grange carrying out its good works in the community with no interference or hindrance from outside sources, but I see evidence to the contrary. When government struggles to meet its budget, they start looking for sources of revenue everywhere they can think of, even our Granges. You might be saying, "Well, my Grange doesn't have any money or a building, so I don't have to worry about **that**," but can you be sure? Will there be any issues of noncompliance found in the search as government looks for loose change amongst the cushions of the community organization "sofa"? Is your Grange incorporated with the State of NH and are you current with your filings with the Secretary of State's office? Have you filed your 990-N report to the IRS, or has someone done this for you? If an audit of your financial records were requested, would you be ready with clear and accurate accounts? When was the last time that your Executive Committee audited your accounts? Does your Grange have a quorum at your meetings? Do you meet at least once every month? All monies received by a Grange should be given to the Secretary, who then records the receipt before handing it over to the Treasurer. Since it then falls upon the Treasurer to give the Secretary a receipt for the money received before making a deposit, isn't it obvious that the Secretary and Treasurer must not be the same person? This prevents the check and balance system of Grange bookkeeping to function properly. And whether your Grange elects a full slate of officers or if you consider yours to be an "action Grange", this is the standard procedure for operating a Grange. These are just a couple examples of things I'm learning that we should be aware of as potential hazards to our continued good standing in the community.

Closing Granges

This is truly one of the worst parts of the job of State Master, especially when I am told that a Grange has already closed, without any prior notification to the State Master or Executive Committee. Brothers and Sisters, I refer back to my earlier comments about being compliant with state and federal regulations. This also applies to the by-laws of the State Grange, which specifically outlines how to close a Grange, the first item of which is to notify the State Master that you are just **considering the possibility** of closing. It is a violation of Grange by-laws to disperse any funds once the idea of closing has been introduced, but something happens to our psyche during this process that makes us feel the need to have the final say on the dispersal of assets to the point where we forget, or ignore the pledges we made throughout the process of initiation to abide by the Constitution, rules and regulations of the Grange at all levels. Members in these Granges often adopt an attitude of "they" when feeling frustrated or threatened by the specified process. "How can 'they' tell us what to do?" "How can 'they' tell us what to do with our money?" "Who do 'they' think they are?" Along the same line, a recent letter I received made the statement, we "do not understand why National should be able to tell us how many members we need in order to keep our charter."

In an effort to refresh our memories and gain a better understanding of the inner workings of our Order, I recommend that every Subordinate Grange have a portion of the by-laws read and clarified at each meeting under the order of business "Grange Services".

Closings and Consolidations

I am sad to report that Charlestown, Starr King, Moultonborough, Sullivan and Brookline/Wilton Jr. Granges have consolidated or closed and currently, two others are in the process of consolidating. As a result of the loss of Sullivan Grange, Sullivan County Pomona was reduced to just two Granges, so consequently has been closed by the State Grange, per Article XIII, Section 1, Division 3 of the New Hampshire State Grange by-laws. This is definitely my least favorite part of being your State Master, especially since I am often notified long after said Grange has begun the process on its own. When procedures are not followed, when our own governing by-laws and Digest are cast aside, chaos and disorder reign supreme, often with the possibility of fraud in the mix. In this time of great scrutiny from

outside governmental agencies we must be diligent in observing and practicing the very same rules that we have created for ourselves. The existence of our Grange depends upon it!

Compensation

While visiting at the Connecticut State Grange session earlier this month, I noted that one of the resolutions adopted was for their State Grange to match the compensation money offered by the National Grange to new and reorganized Granges, (providing they meet certain criteria) up to \$400 for new Granges and up to \$200 for reorganizations. **I would recommend also that our State Grange consider offering a similar reward for new and reorganized Granges in New Hampshire.**

State Master's Award for Excellence in Teamwork Rochester Grange

I commend Rochester Grange for taking to heart this same challenge that I first issued last year. No other Grange has reported to me that they did, indeed, study parts of our By-laws at their meetings. As a result of those studies, they found some areas that needed clarification and followed through the process by submitting resolutions to make appropriate changes. The State Master issued the challenge and the Grange addressed the issue. I'd say that is a great example of Teamwork for the improvement of the organization, so I honor Rochester Grange's spirit of Teamwork with the State Master's Award for Excellence in Teamwork.

Executive Committee

Each year it seems, the Executive Committee has more and more work to do requiring us to meet with increasing regularity. We met three times just in July! This year we handled many complicated issues, number one being the state of our invested funds. This required several sessions with invited financial advisers who made proposals to us and answered all our "Investing for Dummies" questions. While at times it seemed as though we were meeting often with nothing getting accomplished, we can now refer to our worksheets, designed by your Worthy Overseer, Jim Tetreault. At a quick glance I am able to look at the worksheets and be amazed at how much we did accomplish in just one year.

Because the Executive Committee has met so often and worked so long and arduously this year, they have proven their worthiness to be recognized as an Outstanding Team of the NH State Grange for 2009 and I would like to recognize each one of them with a special Master's Outstanding Teamwork Award at this time.

Anne & Marty Boisvert

Anne and Marty designed a brilliant booth for our Grange exhibit at the Farm & Forest Expo in February. It was attractive, it carried out the theme of the expo with great clarity, and it gave booth workers great opportunities to interact with the public, especially by way of the unique, handmade gifts that were distributed. Those handouts created a need for the recipient to follow through from their visit and log onto the State Grange website to get directions on how to plant their Grange logo which was printed on a special copy paper embedded with flower seeds. So clever was this exhibit that the judges there awarded the State Grange booth with the best Educational Exhibit Award, which entitles us to a free booth space at next year's expo. Undeniably, Anne and Marty Boisvert are receiving the Master's Outstanding Teamwork Award!

Gilman Grange

In this year when our financial standing has been under great scrutiny, Gilman Grange #1 stepped up to the plate and offered to fund the expenses of the Sixth Degree. With declining numbers of candidates who come to take the degree, the expense of putting it on is often one of the first lines in the budget to be questioned as to its cost vs. necessity. Having this Grange sponsor our Sixth Degree later this evening was a great example of "teaming up" to get an important job done. On behalf of the State Grange I thank you for your support of the Sixth Degree. I now award them with this Master's Outstanding Teamwork Award.

Ralph Russell

This was the third year that I assigned a deputy the task of supervising the Degree of the Year at State Session. Each year I have challenged the deputy to fill the offices with as many Grangers as possible that have not ever had the opportunity to be on a degree team at State Grange. From what I could casually observe, I think that last night's Third Degree team was the closest so far in trying to achieve that high standard and they certainly received very high marks from me for their limited reliance upon the manual in presenting their charge. Brother Russell exemplified a great show of teamwork in assembling the team

and in executing some excellent ritual, so I now present him with this Master's Outstanding Teamwork Award.

New Growth

There is lots of buzz around the state with promises of new growth and regeneration. Walpole Grange is growing and transforming as it tries to meet the needs of its growing membership. They have taken in over fifteen new members this year, not counting the membership transfer from Charlestown Grange when it closed. Peterborough has had a net gain in membership in their first year of existence. A slew of new members have joined Riverhill Grange with a focus on preserving their historic building.

The Membership Director is overseeing several revitalization teams and one reorganizing team that are working with five Granges. Success in these areas is essential: for each Grange, for the morale of the team members, and for the successful completion of the goal that I, as your State Master at the National Session, made toward growing Grange across the country in 2009. I pledged NH to organize one new Grange, reorganize one new Grange, revitalize three Granges and organize one new Jr. Grange. The National Grange has presented a series of Grange Growth Summits around the country to provide training and support to help us achieve our goals. All we have to do is ask for it.

I have faith in the dedication and skill of our members and know that although lofty, this is indeed a doable goal. I look forward to working with you all as we create the successful TEAM that will ignore the negatives and take all the positives and GROW the GRANGE in 2010.

Report of the State Historian 2009

Worthy State Master, State Officers, Honored Guests and Patrons all!

It is a pleasure to present my report as your State Historian. I enjoy this position so much because of the information I find every time I read a Journal. I am in the process of updating or writing a different version of our important history. There is so much in our history that many people will never learn about. I am pleased with the telephone calls, email messages or letters from people asking for information about members of their families who held Grange membership. I have been asked about former Granges, and the dates they were in existence. How many of your Granges have a written, recorded history? We hear updated versions read at special meetings such as anniversary nights, open house or award nights, but where does it go after it is read? Is it compiled, with the possibility of a book in its future? I would be happy to assist any Grange to write their history and help get it printed, regardless of whether it is a Junior, Subordinate or Pomona Grange. I enjoy hearing people say they never knew the Grange did so much in their community.

Once again we have lost members of our organization to the Great Grange Above. They wrote so much history in their Subordinate or Pomona Granges, as well as Junior Granges. I wonder if they realize the contributions they were giving to their Grange. Many of our members were appointed to a position on the State level along with serving their Subordinate and Pomona Granges and were concerned that they do the best job they could. They weren't concerned with having their names printed or getting well-deserved recognition. In addition, they were there for their brothers and sisters in good and bad times, despite personal differences. They wanted to show the community that this was an organization in which it was an honor to be a member. They wrote so much history without knowing it, by: fixing the Grange hall roof, raising funds for furnace repair, holding countless public suppers to raise funds for Grange projects or to help a family in need, or to help build a fire station or help buy equipment for the police department. Who were these members who left us to work in the Great Grange above? We can't name them all, but some who will be missed are:

Jeanne Higgins, who served as State Pianist, State Secretary, Special Deputy and a committee member. She and her late husband John were well known on the seacoast; first in Ocean Side Grange and then Gilman Grange. She was an active member in several other organizations and in church. She was faithful to her fellow Grange friends and was not afraid to voice her opinion.

Donna Gray served on the State Youth Committee and her travels throughout the most northern sector of the state were most appreciated. She and her late husband Bob traveled miles to represent the Grange at Subordinate, Pomona and State events. I remember when Aurora Grange was having their 100th anniversary, and Donna participated in a very funny dance routine.

Jim Rice never served on the state level, but that didn't stop him from attending and supporting Grange events throughout the state. He and his family worked tirelessly in keeping Wattannick Grange an active organization in Hudson.

Hazel Drown was a member of Pineconia Grange; she always projected a quiet influence. She didn't hold any offices in her Subordinate Grange, but she would come to State Grange and help wherever needed. She might help to sell different goods to raise money for one of the causes selected by Marion Jones. Many in the Concord area didn't realize that Hazel graduated from NH Technical Institute at the age of 75.

Anbarth Andersen served the State Grange as a member of the Deputy Force from the Plymouth area. It was nothing for him to have 15 Subordinate Granges in his district to visit for spring instruction and then return for fall inspection. He and his family were very much involved in Grange work.

Phyllis Howard was another Grange member who traveled many miles as a member of the State Home Economics Committee. She traveled to Granges in her district representing the director at special meetings. Phyllis and her daughter entered canned food, sewing and knitting in many of the county fairs. It's important to remind ourselves how we would like to be remembered when our days are completed on Earth and it's time to join that Great Grange Above.

As I bring my report to a close, I would like to thank our State Master for the honor of serving as State Historian. It is a position that I enjoy very much. I am working on a new type of history book for the State Grange. I look forward to talking with many of you as I compile my history book. I am writing this from 1966 - 2009, offering a different version of our history, including some fun times as well as convention notes and people who made such a difference during those years. I was not asked to do this, but felt that it would be an enjoyable project.

In closing, I would like to thank everyone who has helped me through the difficult times during the past two years. Many times, it was difficult to reach out to someone, not knowing if they understood what was going on. Many thanks to our State Master for the honor of serving as Historian; it is a position I enjoy so much.

Family and Community Services Department

Worthy State Master, State Officers, National Representatives and Grangers all:

It has been our pleasure to serve as your Family and Community Directors this year. With the State Master's decision to make the Pomona Chairs the State Committee, we have some new faces this year along with those that have served previously. It helped us have a new outlook on the entire program and to come up with some new ideas as well as modifying some of our older programs. Our current list of active members include the following; Linda Neilson, Joann Brandt, Joan Garland, Rachel Bailey, Connie Carr, Richard Patten, Edythe Craig, Ann Leger, Dale MacDonald, Norma Neary, and Lena Falconer.

We did not attend as many Home Economics nights as we had hoped to because of Janie's knee replacement in January, and the extended recuperation period. I want to personally thank my son Chris for acting as chauffer while we were unable to drive.

This year we again made Christmas Baggies of trinkets and goodies for 109 residents at Glencliff Home in Warren, and also gave items for the stockings of 12 children at the Philbrook Center in Concord. These were for children that could not go home at Christmas time.

Linens and other miscellaneous items for the NH Coalition Against Rape and Domestic Violence may be placed in the exhibit room. Please sign the name of your Grange on the sheet on the table as you leave your items so that we may send the list with the items when we turn these over to the local group out of Portsmouth. Staff from the Portsmouth shelter, A Safe Place, will pick up the donations on Saturday afternoon. This is a very worthy cause that helps clients start over when they are victims of violence and need a new start at a new home. We gave last year to a shelter in Nashua and hope to continue this at each community where we hold our State Session.

There were over 344 craft items from 12 Granges donated to the Grange Building at the Eastern States Exhibition. Our best sellers are always our scrubbies and mittens and they love them there.

The end of the year Home Economics report form asked for the number of toys, mittens and Eastern States items, rather than just a yes/no. Based on the numbers listed on the report forms, there were over 466 mittens donated from Subordinate Granges to schools, shelters, nursing homes, etc. Our mountain of mittens, which has currently 114 hats, and mittens, will add to this overall total giving us almost 500 items donated throughout the state.

We commend the Granges that are involved in the Dictionary Project and the number that is going out to many schools throughout New Hampshire. For those of you that are involved in this, we challenge you to spread out to other communities and give what you can. There are other organizations and businesses that are willing to make donations to help pay for the dictionaries, all you need to do is ask. Some day it is hoped to cover most of the state with these dictionaries.

This year we encouraged all Granges to turn in a Community Service report form. There were 39 Granges that did send in reports, which qualified us to receive award money from National Grange. The top four Community Service winners were;

1st Place – Joe English # 53

2nd Place – Pine Grove #298

3rd Place – Watatic #36

4th Place – Hudson #11

As a result of community service throughout the state, there were contributions to nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and other locations. These donations included calendars, unused occasion cards, gifts, favors, baked goods, slippers, shawls, and lap robes among many other items. Homeless shelters received sleeping bags, mittens, scarves, and hats. Granges also sent hats and socks over to our military personnel serving in the Mideast.

In the needlework area we had 61 items sent in for judging. Our judges this year were Donna Kay, needlework designer and teacher, Katrina Rhodes, quilting instructor and owner operator of the Fabric Garden, and John Andrade, owner operator of New England woodwork. The top ten blue ribbon winners were sent to Eastern States Exposition where we had three entries that won ribbons. We had two red ribbons, one white ribbon and one honorable mention.

Report of the General Deputy

Worthy Master, National Representatives, Honored Guests, State Officers, Delegates, Brother and Sister Patrons:

As you have already heard this has been yet another year of ups and downs with some Granges closing and others taking in large numbers of new members. It's always heartening to hear that there are those people out there who want to join the Grange. The other day the State Master and I were talking and one of the topics of conversation was an email she received from a gentleman in Bristol, NH who said he had an application but needed to know how much the application fee was. He also said he had asked around and found out that there wasn't a Grange in his town and asked what it would take to start one. Later that evening I emailed him letting him know that Danbury was near by with an active Grange and we would welcome him. He is planning to attend our November 5th meeting and I believe we will be gaining a new member. Now, some of you should be wondering how this all came about. It seems that he was at the Big E and picked up an application while he was there. Kudos to those hosting at the NH room! To me this reiterates the point that there are people out there who just need to be asked and offered an application.

However, in order to make sure there is a Grange for people to join we need to step up to the plate. In the past two years I have talked about auditing the books, paying quarterly dues in a timely manner, following the bylaws and the need for liability insurance for all Granges. We've heard tell of Granges with less than 13 members, Granges that are no longer meeting, and Granges that are giving all their money away in preparation for closing. We all know about Granges that can't get a quorum together for their meetings but working just as hard as they can for their community. But given the state of the economy and the various ways in which our government at each level is attempting to increase their income all of our Granges need to get back on track. We stopped the scoring process quite a number of years ago and it seems that may have been a mistake. It's easier for a Grange to avoid making time for these things when they are not being held accountable. It's kind of like knowing it's time to balance your checkbook and household budget when you get the second phone call from the bank saying your mortgage is overdue. And unfortunately there is a lot of that going around these days.

Have we seen some improvement? Yes. Last year only 17 Granges were reported as having been audited. At last count (this morning) 28 community Granges reported that they had been audited this year. Of course that still leaves about two-thirds of our Granges that haven't been. Only four of our Pomonas reported being audited. There are fourteen Community Granges that checked 'No' on the liability insurance questions and well as 4 Pomona Granges. Of course there are a number of Granges at both levels who didn't check anything. Both of these issues are very important to our wellbeing. If someone gets hurt at a meeting and decides to sue the Grange hosting the meeting there will be considerable fallout. I know, most of you say well the Subordinate Grange has insurance so we use theirs, or the Town if you meet in a Town Hall, or the library or whoever owns the building you meet in. That's not good enough. We have a lawsuit happy society and when the lawyers get involved and start a lawsuit they sue everyone involved at every level. That includes the Grange; Community level or Pomona level! Liability Insurance is very necessary. And if this happens and you don't have liability insurance can you imagine the results if you haven't been auditing your books? Talk about a mess.

Okay, you get my drift, let's move on. When I was reviewing the reports I started looking at the average attendance at meetings. A few Pomonas are averaging attendance between 17 and 20. Others are struggling with the quorum but no Pomona average is below seven. Fifteen of the Community Granges reporting have an average attendance below the quorum but I can tell you that most of them meet at least eight times a year and are active in their communities. Including the Granges that have not reported we have six that are not meeting. The State Master, the Executive Committee, the Deputies and GRIT Teams have all been involved with these Granges with varying degrees of success. Some want to be helped, some don't. Two other granges have only met three times this year. One of these, plus another has been reported by their deputies as wanting a GRIT team to visit them. Other calls have come in this year asking for GRIT teams. We could double the number of people we have trained and still not have enough teams. Of all the Community Granges that have reported there is a handful with a membership between 13 and 20. Only one Grange has reported a membership below 13. This Grange is one of the ones being worked with. Of course I know that membership numbers don't usually agree so maybe this isn't entirely accurate but one Grange below the thirteen is enough for me.

I really don't enjoy being the voice of doom and gloom up here. We are making progress – people are joining the Grange, some Granges that were in really bad shape are now reported by their deputies as doing well, being active in their communities, etc. At least two deputies reported Granges where members who have been inactive for a long time are coming back. There are brand new members becoming secretaries and masters. More power to them. Let's support them to the best of our ability. It's always scary when new blood comes in and appears to be taking over. If that's the way you feel step up and work with them so they can learn what Grange is really all about – teamwork.

Eastern States Grange Trustees Report

As a trustee to the New England Grange Building I thought it might be a good idea to let you know what is going on at your building on the grounds of the Eastern States Expo. I brought the idea to the other New Hampshire trustees and they said it would be a good idea and since I brought up the idea I should deliver the report. The New Hampshire trustees took a good long hard look at the New Hampshire Room and decided it was time to update the room. Taking some of the pictures and paintings off the wall we discovered that most everything was placed there in the 1960's. We decided that the room needed to be painted, the map showing the location of current granges, which was over the window that looks out at the stairs, needed to come down and be replaced with a smaller and more current map. The idea of having some talented grange painters paint scenes depicting the seasons or the heritage of the Granite State was considered. We all left that day with some good ideas. Paint chips were selected for our next workday and after looking closely at the choices it was decided to go with the 'rhapsody lilac' color for the walls and a cream color for the trim. The three trustees spent the morning painting the walls and then had a meeting in the afternoon. I would like to thank the crew that traveled down just days before the fair started to finish the painting. I would encourage all of you to visit your New Hampshire Room and would look forward to hearing your ideas of what could be done.

As many of you know there is a country store located on the main floor of the building, which sells jams, jellies, crafts and other items. Due to the popularity of the jams, and jellies the trustees decided to increase the order by 10% over last year. As for the handmade crafts, we saw seven full totes in storage before the fair started after the display was set. At the end of the fair only three totes remained. The hats and mittens were popular this year thanks to the help of Mother Nature who provided chilly weather. When the final deposit was made we saw \$27,276.19 put in the bank. Thanks to the help of the country store the New England Grange Building is for the most part self-supported.

A few projects that are being worked on currently are an Internet connection to the building that is reasonably priced. This last year we purchased a laptop computer and along with the Internet we would have access to the National Grange web site and then we could link the other states so if anyone had an

interest in the grange we could provide them with local contacts. We are also looking to make a slide show of grange activities throughout the New England region, so if you have any pictures that could be used that would be great. You may email them to Matthew Clark or put them on a cd and get that to me. There is a wish list for the building that is included in the complete report or I have it here to view. If there is anything you notice that should be changed, or done to better the building please let one of the trustees know and we will bring it to the next meeting.

Report of Director
October 8, 2009**

2009 Fair:

Well the weather didn't really cooperate (well the cold weather did help to sell hats and mittens this year). I spent 2 days getting ready and 12 days down at the Big E this year. There were 6 days with record breaking attendance. Jeanne Giauque of "Things by Jeanne" spun wool 2 Saturdays and 1 Sunday. She interacted with the customers very well and many photos were taken of her. Sue Rottoline again set up and had crafts for children for 3 days. Children painted or glued their choice of a craft with Sue's assistance. On the second Saturday Eva Capalli (Watershops Band-- just getting started) performed and will be back next year as the customers really enjoyed them. Linda Chase suggested that Mr. Jim Lasalle provide plants for the stage. Mr. Lasalle actually only brought 4 potted palms so I filled in with a few mums. Again only Connecticut's room was hosted every day of the fair.

Building:

The new set of doors on the Avenue work great except when it's rained a lot and very humid then the left door sticks on the bottom some. The doors look really nice and add to the avenue side of the building. People are still tripping coming in from the Avenue when it's really bright out, but most are not looking where they are going. I saw no one actually fall down this year, but a few dozen or so caught them before they did. On those rainy days the kitchen still floods, so several mop so others don't slip. All of the emergency lights had to be replaced as they had all blown out at the same time. The big professional coffee maker died this year so two Mr. Coffee's were purchased, one for hot water and one for coffee.

Matt Clark brought the new computer down, but after checking with the Big E for net service, the cost was \$300 for installation and \$200 for one year of service. Matt took the computer home and several staffers suggested that a power point program run and as well as the 50 anniversary of National Grange CD and the CD that was made of the Northeast states that was used for the 2008 National session in CT.

Grange Day:

The Contra Banditos played for the day and the hall was packed when they were playing. Our Grange Breakfast consisted of donuts, Danish and muffins, coffee, tea, and apple cider. I estimate that 120-135 passed through the line and several used the chairs that had been set out as it was a cold windy morning. Again we ended up serving less than last year. I want to thank Jim Owens and the Maine crew for pre setting the tables the night before. I did not march in the parade but several states had given out tickets so members could march, it was misty out and actually was raining at the end of the parade. This was one of several shorter parades due to weather.

This and that:

Again the Junior exhibit was not an attractive display. Plans are in the works to move the display area and make a new exhibit stand.

There was no set Ambassador Day but several states came down to help also several Trustees came and spent a day, and asked the staff questions on how to improve things. Thank you.

Jim Tetreault changed out old light bulbs for energy efficient ones in the main hall ceiling lights and also found a surprise in one light. When cleaning in 2010 the glass globes need to be taken down and cleaned.

Several Grangers have asked about the broken window, and I tell them it has been reported at several trustee meetings.

We once again hosted the FFA on the first Sat. of the fair. They have interviews in the State rooms, using 5 of them this year. The Grange provided coffee, juice and cider and they bring donuts, Danish and bagels. FFA's time only takes about 1 to 1 ½ hours out of a regular morning sales that first Saturday.

Crafts:

At the start of the fair there were 7 extra tubs of homemade articles put aside until table space could be made for them. At the end of the fair we packed away 3 tubs for next year. A Big Thank You goes out to all our hand crafters for keeping us supplied for this years fair. Your knitted, crocheted, sewed, glued, weaved, etc. articles that you donated helps keep the building in good repair. It was great to have so many rainy cold nights; they helped to sell many hats and mittens.

An estimated 750 scrubbies were made for the Big E and we did not sell out this year. Again big sellers are the cotton dish cloths, hanging towels, aprons, scrubbies, hats & mittens and baby sweaters, hats and booties. The profit from the sale of crafts was about \$13,000. Betty Jane Gardiner will let the State Home Ec committees know (at N E Leaders Conf. in VT this year) what she will need for the 2010 fair.

Our loyal customers continue to come back year after year for our home made articles and jellies and jams. They even put in request for certain items and we try our best to make or get them.

Country Store:

Staffing for the evening has improved with the enticement of a hotel room if you work the evening shift and live a greater distance from the fair. The hotel was used 9 out of the 16 nights that were booked. At the start of the fair there were only 5 shifts that hadn't been filled. Jack Cottrell had ordered more products so we only took down one self this year and spread out product on the others. We did run out of many of the items but you can only guess what people will be interested in from year to year. New products were pickles, corn relish, sweet pepper relish, jalapeno mustard and a few different dressings. Customers are still looking for the pepper jelly. About 10 more cases of sugar free jam was ordered but we are finding out the people want the spreadable, that's sweetened with concentrate with no added sugar, over the preserves (that add sugar) and sugar free. Again with new cashiers working there were a few mistakes on the register tapes, but with Dawn Percoski's help she found most of them. This year the store receipts were \$14,000 plus. I want to thank Dawn for coming in after working her day job and counting money and making the bank deposits while I was back in Vermont working during the first week of the fair. My mind can be at ease when I know Dawn is there taking my place. Thank you Dawn!

The note cards with the New England building on them were sold 6 for \$5.00. They look really nice and we used them for the invitations for the Grange Breakfast. Betty Jane will be selling them at the Northeast Leaders Conf. if anyone wants to purchase some.

Total deposit from store and crafts was \$27,276.19

Quilt Raffle:

Again big kudos goes to Charles Martin for making the Retro Butterflies quilt which raised \$3,889.00 for the Vermont Veterans Hospital for their Rehab through Recreation project. We had one man who wouldn't make a donation as the free apples we usually have on the table didn't get to the fair until the 27th. Beth Merrill presented the check about 4:15 p.m. on Oct 4th the last day of the fair. Bonny Krawiec of Manchester, CT won the quilt. New Hampshire will be the recipient of the 2010 raffle.

Scott Davis is the representative at the Big E Avenue of States meetings and Jim Owens takes care of the building Insurance. I would like to see one of the Trustees take over Programs and one the Parade. The New England Grange building needs to be represented in the parade everyday so people know we are on the grounds.

I want to thank all who come and help to clean and fix up the building during the year. We get many nice comments from people when they visit the building, with 40% visiting for the first time and 85% say they will be back next year.

Resolutions Committee

Worthy Master, Distinguished Guests, Brother and Sister Patrons;
This is the report of the Resolutions and Bylaws committee. We have considered 18 resolutions and make the following recommendations:

RESOLUTION #1 – Submitted by Hudson Grange #11

Subject: Support of New Hampshire Dairy Farmers

Whereas: The NH Dairy industry is the anchor of NH Agriculture, which not only supports rural communities, but enhances other sectors of agriculture, providing open space for recreation, sportsmen and women, and tourism; and

Whereas: The Dairy industry provides an economic impact of an estimated \$14,000 per cow per year, primarily in the local economy; and

Whereas: The lack of stable prices, concentration of process and capacity, outdated regulations and labor shortages are creating a crisis in the industry; and

Whereas: a significant loss of capacity would create a dependence on foreign or out of region milk and other dairy products and reduce our food security; and

Whereas: The NH Dairy farmer generally has smaller herds than much of the country because of geography and higher costs than some parts of the country because of the New England weather.

Whereas: The 2008 Farm Bill creates a review process for Federal Milk Marketing orders;

Now therefore be it resolved: The Hudson Grange and the New Hampshire State Grange urge our Congressional Delegation and the Administration to acknowledge the importance of the Dairy industry to New Hampshire:

Funding and implementing the federal milk marketing order study as outlined in the 2008 Farm Bill with regional representation from Producers and state policy makers; and

Implementation of tariffs on foreign dairy solids; and

Setting of regional prices to reflect accurately and realistically the cost of production; and

Addressing the problems of labor shortages in the dairy industry by providing training and education as well as a fair and sensible approach to imported labor; and

Be it further resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to our Congressional Delegation, the Secretary of Agriculture, the Chair of the NH House and Senate Agriculture Committees, the NH Commissioner of Agriculture and the NH Farm Bureau; and

Be it further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the chairs of the Northeast states Senate and House committees that oversee agriculture and rural communities; and

Be it further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Secretaries and Commissioners of Agriculture that represent the states that comprise the CSG/ERC.

Resolution # 10 and 1 are essentially the same and should be considered together.

We recommend the value in the second whereas be changed to \$14,000 and that the last two resolves in resolution #10 be added to this resolution. The committee recommends the combined resolution then be adopted.

This resolution passed as amended.

RESOLUTION #2 – Submitted by Rochester Grange #86

Subject: Associate Membership

The committee recommends adoption.

The resolution passed as written.

RESOLUTION #3 – Submitted by Rochester Grange #86

Subject: Subordinate Family Membership Dues

WHEREAS, the Delegates at National Grange increased the amount of Subordinate dues payable to National Grange effective January 1, 2010; therefore be it

RESOLVED, the dollar amounts in the NH State Grange Bylaws Article XIV, Section 3 – Duties and Rights of Members, Division 1, page 12 be changed and the wording clarified to read: "The minimum regular annual dues in a Subordinate Grange shall be \$29.00 (~~\$29.00~~ paid to the State Grange of which \$12.00 goes to National Grange) paid in advance, and each Grange may otherwise regulate its own dues. The minimum dues required of a family unit membership are \$58.00 (~~\$58.00~~) paid to State Grange of which \$24.00 goes to National Grange). A family unit membership is defined as consisting of three or more Subordinate Grange members with one or two parents and their dependents, which are under the age of 23 and live in the same household or are absent due to illness, education, or military service."

We recommend that the value in line 3 of the resolved be changed to \$29.00 and the value in line 6 be changed to \$58.00. The changes are needed due to the changes as a result of the special session held in Aug. With these changes we recommend adoption.

The resolution was amended as suggested by common consent.

RESOLUTION #4 – Submitted by Rochester Grange #86

Subject: NH State Grange Non-voting Members

The committee recommends adoption.

The resolution passed as written.

RESOLUTION #5 – Submitted by Park Grange #249

Subject: Return to Agriculture Awards

Whereas the cost of fertilizer and transporting food is skyrocketing, and

Whereas as NH can grow most of its own food according to NOFA, and

Whereas landowners are more motivated to sell off land for housing developments thus losing valuable agricultural land,

Be It Resolved that the NH State Grange investigates the possibility of collaboration with other agricultural organizations like NOFA-NH, NH Farm Bureau or the Extension Service to present awards in each county through the Pomona Granges to landowners who return their land to organic/sustainable agriculture.

The committee recommends that the words “investigates the possibility of collaboration” be substituted for the word “collaborates” in the resolved section. With that change the committee recommends adoption.

The resolution was amended as recommended by common consent.

The resolution passed as amended.

RESOLUTION #6 – Submitted by the NH State Grange Executive Committee

Subject: Second Delegates at National Grange

The committee recommends adoption.

The resolution passed as written.

RESOLUTION #7 – Submitted by Antrim Grange #98

Subject: Industrial Hemp on Pine Ridge Reservation

The committee makes no recommendation for this resolution.

The resolution passed as written.

RESOLUTION #8 – Submitted by Antrim Grange #98

Subject: Alcoholic Beverages at Grange Halls

Whereas the current Article 10.11.1 in the National Grange Digest states that ‘All Granges are prohibited from having alcoholic beverages either in the Grange Hall or on any Grange property during any Grange meeting, nor can any Grange lease or rent its hall or its property for functions that may include the sale or use of alcoholic beverages or for any other purposes prohibited by Grange Law; except that a State Grange may allow the use of alcoholic beverages at functions other than Grange meetings in the Grange Hall or on any Grange property by vote of the State Grange at its Annual Meeting.’

Therefore be it resolved that Article 10.11.1 be amended to read: “All Granges are prohibited from having alcoholic beverages either in the Grange Hall or on any Grange property during any Grange meeting.

Granges that meet in buildings or on property not owned by the Grange may not allow the consumption of alcoholic beverages during any Grange meeting.” and

Be it further resolved that the following articles be added to this section of the National Grange Digest:

Article 10.11.2 “All Granges are prohibited from having alcoholic beverages either in the Grange Hall, on any Grange property, or any other venue that the Grange has legal use of during any Grange sponsored activity; except for activities that are designed to promote the portions of agriculture that include the production of alcoholic beverages.”

Article 10.11.3 “All Granges may have original-sealed containers of alcoholic beverages at Grange meetings and activities for use as demonstration aides, gifts, or fund raisers. Such containers shall remain sealed at such Grange meeting or activity.

Article 10.11.4 “No Grange shall lease or rent its hall or its property for functions that will include the sale or use of alcoholic beverages or for any other purposes prohibited by Grange Law; except that a State Grange may allow the use of alcoholic beverages at functions other than Grange meetings in the Grange Hall or on any Grange property by vote of the State Grange at its Annual Meeting, or by vote of the State Grange Executive Committee.”

Article 10.11.5 “No Grange shall apply for or hold a license to sell or serve alcohol.”

The committee recommends adoption. Amended by common consent by omitting gifts, or fundraisers from second line Article 10.11.3. The resolution was tabled.

RESOLUTION #9 - Submitted by State Legislative Committee

Subject: Federal Food Safety Legislation

The committee recommends adoption.

RESOLUTION #12 - Submitted by Cheshire County Pomona #6

Subject: Single Payer Health Care

The committee does not recommend adoption.

The resolution was defeated.

RESOLUTION #13 - Submitted by Cheshire County Pomona #6

Subject: Casino Gambling

WHEREAS: The State of New Hampshire is struggling financially through this recession and we have a revenue problem rather than a spending problem; and

WHEREAS: Neither the Legislature nor the Governor have the political courage to enact either a sales or income tax to ease the burden on property tax owners, and continue to enact fee increases on the general public to ease the budgetary problems; and

WHEREAS: Casino gambling or off-track betting has the potential of generating up to three hundred million dollars in revenue for the State of New Hampshire;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

That the New Hampshire State Grange goes on record as being in support of **legalized** casino gambling, **and make it one of our legislative priorities for the next legislative session.**

The committee recommends that the word “legalized” be added to the first line of the resolved section after “in support of” and that the entire sentence after “gambling” be deleted. With those changes we recommend adoption.

The recommended changes were made by common consent.

The resolution was defeated.

RESOLUTION #14 - Submitted by Arlington Grange #139

Subject: Veterans Designation

State Master Beth Merrill called upon Norman Brandt, Chairman of the Master's Address Committee to give his report.

Report of Master's Address Committee

Worthy Master, Distinguished Guests, Officers of the NH State Grange, Delegates and Patrons:

We present the following response to the address of the NH State Grange Master, Sister Beth Merrill. Upon reading the Travelogue, we commend the Worthy Master on all of her time and commitment spent to let the rest of the Grange nation know that NH is here and we are strong.

The Committee also adds our joys in knowing that, even though the National Grange was not held in New Hampshire, New Hampshire Grange was so well represented by our members. We are quite sure that when National Grange falls upon our shoulders in 2013, our hard-working Grange members will have come up with some great ideas of tour stops, table favors, notable speakers and whatever else is asked of them.

We as a committee are relieved that the Tyson Food threat was finally worked out to our benefit. We also understand that the National Grange still has many steps to make, to be certain that any loopholes allowing this situation to occur in the first place will be closed or at least properly plugged. We urge the New Hampshire State Grange and all members to help the National Grange while they do this.

We urge the State Grange, along with the Master, to adopt the fifth priority set forth by the National Master. With so many of our Granges struggling, the time may have come to try to re-organize or even organize Junior Granges. Sadly, the committee members have noticed a lack of any Junior information making its way to the community Granges. Without updates from the Junior Deputy, how can the members know what is needed to bring new Junior Granges about?

As for the youth, we recognize that bringing FFA into the Grange for programs or even to see what Grange is like would help more than it could ever hurt, but we as a committee believe that we cannot just stop at the FFA. Scouting groups, 4H, and many other youth organizations could be just as helpful in building the Grange. Therefore we urge not just the FFA be approached about coming to Grange meetings, but all youth organizations. After all, most of these organizations do have age limits that fit nicely within the Grange Youth membership years.

The Worthy Master also spoke on the fact that a 501c3 foundation was recently formed. The committee applauds this action and feels that it is a very positive milestone in allowing us to accept donations that will help the Grange over time.

The committee is glad to hear that the State Grange is working on getting the "bugs" out of the new Pomona Grange set-ups. It is our pleasure to give some encouraging news that quite a few Pomonas show signs that this new set-up is truly helping.

As saddened as we were that the hemp bill did not make it out of the House Environment and Agriculture Committee, we are happy to hear that they will draft a resolution to be sent to Congress stating their support for the Federal Government to legalize the growing of hemp. We hope that most of the Granges now know all the positive benefits that legalizing US-grown hemp would make for our economy, both locally and nationally.

The Spring Fling is still one of the most useful tools that the New Hampshire State Grange and the Worthy Master have given us New Hampshire Grangers. We urge any member of the Grange who has not attended the Spring Fling to do so.

We commend the Worthy Master for addressing the Painted Curtains Project. We feel it is a great project and hope that the visiting State Representatives and the National Master would bring it into their states to look into, thus furthering the preservation of these historic sceneries.

Closing Granges is a very hard and sad thing to do. This definitely seems harder to do when the Granges are not keeping to the bylaws. We hope that by reading the bylaws during the Grange Services section of the Grange meeting, the Grange members will be better informed on how this should be done properly.

New growth is a great thing for our state, and it shows that with good faith, hope and dedication we can and will persevere. We urge everybody to see that growth is a good thing for not only the local Granges, but also for the State and National Grange. We understand that some growth is desirable, but we remind members that, with growth, some change may be needed; approaching this change with understanding is needed also.

WHEREAS, yearly withdrawals of principal to balance the budget combined with the present economic crisis have caused the Market Value of our Operating Account Invested Fund to drop by 50% in the last five years; and

WHEREAS, this drop in Market Value has caused our income to decrease; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the following NH State Grange Bylaws changes take effect with the quarter ending March 31, 2010:

1. Article XIV Subordinate Granges, Section 1, Division 2, Line 3, page 11 be changed to read "They should remit dues to the State Grange as follows: **\$7.25** for each member at the close of the previous quarter, including all who have taken one or more degrees, and **\$1.00** for each person initiated during the quarter and **\$1.00** for each person affiliated during the quarter.
2. Article XIII Pomona Granges, Section 5, Division 2, Line 1, page 10 be changed to read "Pomona Granges shall pay **\$1.00** per quarter to the State Grange for each member".

Approved by the NH State Grange Executive Committee on May 3, 2009.

Lester Gibbs, Grafton Star Grange made a motion to address the resolution in two parts. Wilber Heath, Centennial Grange, seconded the motion. The delegates approved this motion.
