Thursday, October 28, 2010

All dignitaries were asked for their greetings.

State Master Beth Merrill announced the Master's Address Committee: Shelley Huntoon, Lucy Woodes, Carol Dumont and Ed Ford. The members of the Credentials Committee are: Pat Izzo, Chairman and Lucia Savage. The members of the Resolutions Committee are: Rick Bailey, Chairman, Wayne Turcotte, Anne Boisvert and Bob Trombi. Our Parliamentarian is Donald Ross.

The State Secretary read three additional resolutions that were presented to her.

NH STATE GRANGE SESSION 2010 RESOLUTIONS

Resolution #1 – Submitted by Rochester Grange #86
Subject: Alcoholic Beverages in Grange Halls by Non-Grange Groups

WHEREAS, The National Grange Bylaws state in Chapter 10. 11. 4 that "A State Grange may allow the use of alcoholics beverages at functions sponsored by non-Granger groups that rent or lease Grange property by adoption of a policy in the State Grange By-Laws. Such renters shall provide proof of host liquor or liquor liability coverage."; and

WHEREAS, some of our Grange halls are currently used by religious organizations that regularly use wine during communion service; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the NH State Grange By-laws Article XII General Provisions, Section I, be changed by adding:

Division 10. NH State Grange policy shall permit religious organizations meeting in Grange halls in NH to use wine during religious ceremonies such as communion.

Resolution #2 – Submitted by Rochester Grange #86 Subject: Alcoholic Beverages in Grange Halls

WHEREAS, The National Grange By-laws state in Chapter 10. 11. 2 that "A State Grange may allow the use of alcoholic beverages at Grange sponsored activities by adoption of a policy in the State Grange By-laws. The individual Grange shall obtain host liquor or liquor liability coverage if it sponsors any events where alcohol will be served."; and

WHEREAS, some of our Granges are using alcoholic beverages in fundraisers, have winemaking demonstrations or give it as a gift; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the NH State Grange By-laws Article XII General Provisions, Section 1, be changed by adding:

Division 11. NH State Grange policy shall permit the use of alcoholic beverages in fundraisers, in demonstrations or as gifts. Such containers shall remain sealed at such Grange meeting or activity.

Resolution #3 – Submitted by Chichester Grange #132
Subject: Respect for the United States Flag and the National Anthem

WHEREAS, presenting the United States flag and singing the National Anthem are customary activities at Grange meetings and events; and

WHEREAS, Grangers have noticed that many citizens seem to be unaware that a civilian salute is the proper way to show respect during singing the National Anthem at public events; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the National Grange be requested to develop a poster or other simple means of drawing attention to proper flag etiquette. Local Granges could then purchase such material and donate it to schools and sports teams or display it in appropriate locations to raise awareness of the way to show proper respect to the United States Flag.

Resolution #4 – Submitted by Sunapee Lake Grange #112 Subject: Reinstitute the Agriculture Committee

WHEREAS, the Grange is based on agriculture and we are here for farmers; and

WHEREAS, more people are returning to agriculture thus making them prospective members; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the National and State Granges reinstitute the Agriculture committee and this committee should be for education and legislation purposes.

Resolution #5 – Submitted by Blow-Me-Down Grange #234 Subject: Grange Hall Building Insurance

WHEREAS, building insurance for Granges is skyrocketing; and

WHEREAS, most Granges cannot afford the rise in premiums; and

WHEREAS, Grange Halls are our identity in a community and we should try to keep them; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the State Grange contact insurance companies about group rates for Granges in the state.

Resolution #6 – Submitted by Antrim Grange #98
Subject: National Grange Executive Committee Sashes

WHEREAS, National Grange Executive Committee members are no longer elected to a four year term; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that Article 11.6.2 of the National Grange Digest be amended by eliminating the sentence "Executive Committee sashes to be embroidered as above..."

Resolution #7 – Submitted by Antrim Grange #98

Subject: National Grange Term Limits

BE IT RESOLVED, that Article 4.10.2(E) of the National Grange Digest be amended to read "National Grange - In the National Grange, officers shall be elected and installed biennially at the annual meeting. No member shall serve more than three consecutive terms in the same office, with the exception of the office of Master. No officer shall hold two elected offices concurrently.

Resolution #8 – Submitted by Antrim Grange #98 Subject: Executive Committee 4.10.1 (c) (1)

WHEREAS, the Master, Treasurer, or Secretary of the Junior, Subordinate, Pomona, and State Granges should not also serve as elected members of the Executive Committee; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that Article 4.10.1 (c) (1) of the National Grange Digest be amended by adding the words "except the Master, Treasurer, and Secretary" of the Junior, Subordinate, Pomona and State Granges may also be elected to the Executive Committee of said Granges.

Resolution #9 - Submitted by Antrim Grange #98 Subject: Master, Treasurer, Secretary

WHEREAS, the Master, Treasurer, or Secretary of a Grange should not also serve as one of these other officers concurrently in that Grange; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the By-laws of the NH State Grange be amended by changing the following Articles: (1) Article XII (General Provisions) Div. 4. Add to the end of the Division "The members holding the offices of Master, Treasurer, or Secretary may not also hold another of these three offices at the same time." (2) Article XIV, Section 4. Add Division 14 to read, "The members holding the offices of Master, Treasurer, or Secretary may not also hold another of these three offices at the same time."

(3) Article XIII, Section 2. Add Division 5 to read, "The members holding the offices of Master, Treasurer, or Secretary may not also hold another of these three offices at the same time."

Resolution #10 - Submitted by Antrim Grange #98 Subject: Sale of Grange Halls

WHEREAS, the line of communication between a Grange that wishes to sell its hall and the State Grange Executive Committee needs to be clear, concise, and certain; and

WHEREAS, some Granges believe they have followed Grange law when going through the process of a sale or transfer of real property, but neglected to get final written approval from the State Grange Executive Committee, which down the road, can result in serious legal problems; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that Article XI, Chapter 4.11.1 (B) be amended by adding the following sentence at the end of the Division. "The written consent shall be in the form of a letter or document and must be signed by the State Grange Master, Secretary and Chairman of the Executive Committee."

Resolution #11 - Submitted by Antrim Grange #98 Subject: Industrial HEMP

BE IT RESOLVED, That the New Hampshire State Grange rescinds Resolution #7, Industrial Hemp on Pine Ridge Reservation, adopted at the 2009 New Hampshire State Grange session. The wording of the resolution is as follows;

'BE IT RESOLVED, that the NH State Grange become a signatory to the following petition to be sent to U. S. President Barack Obama; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, THAT THE PETITION BE FORWARDED TO The National Grange for its consideration: We the following groups and individuals urge you, President Obama, to support, by all means possible, the Oglala Sioux nation on the Pine Ridge Reservation in their efforts to grow, harvest and sell industrial hemp in accordance with the signed treaties of 1851 and 1868 with the U. S. Government in order to supply employment to the indigenous peoples whose current unemployment rate is upwards of 85%."

Resolution #12 - Submitted by Arlington Grange #139 Subject: Late Quarterly Reports

WHEREAS, the New Hampshire State Grange is required to submit quarterly reports and make dues payments to the National Grange; and

WHEREAS, the New Hampshire State Grange makes its quarterly reports and payments to National grange based on the most current information available; and

WHEREAS, the Granges that do not report on time often times report a loss of membership and therefore pay less to the State Grange than what was already reported and paid to National Grange; therefore be it

RESOLVED, Article XIV Section 1 be amended by adding Division 6 to read: "Subordinate Granges that are late in filing reports to the State Grange be required to pay any back dues to cover the amount already paid to the National Grange."

Resolution #13 - Submitted by State Grange Executive Committee Subject: New England Grange Building

WHEREAS, the New England Grange Building is owned by the six New England States; and

WHEREAS, this ownership makes this a unique Grange Building not under the jurisdiction or control of anyone of the six (6) State Granges; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the New England Grange Building, consisting of three (3) members from each State, is responsible for the oversight and management of the Building; and

WHEREAS, the Board has Bylaws and rules controlling the oversight and use of the building; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that each of the New England State Granges by copy of this Resolution affirm that the New England Grange Building Trustees comply with the National Grange Bylaws concerning the presence of alcohol in Grange Buildings and it not be the responsibility of any one of the State Granges.

Resolution #14 – Submitted by Walpole Grange # 125 Subject: Tuttle Farm in Dover, NH

WHEREAS, the farm in Dover, NH known as The Tuttle Farm has been owned by the Tuttle family for eleven generations, since 1632; and

WHEREAS, records indicate no other farm in the United States has been in the ownership of a same family for so many consecutive years; and

WHEREAS, it is in the national interest to honor and preserve such sites for their historical value; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that we urge the National Grange to:

- (a) Proclaim its interest in seeing that the deed for the Tuttle Farm remains in the possession of the Tuttle family; and
- (b) Take steps to organize support on a National level to achieve this goal.

Resolution # 15 – Submitted by Park Grange # 249 Subject: Food Stamp Regulation Change

WHEREAS, food stamp use is climbing; and

WHEREAS, obesity is pandemic in America; and

WHEREAS, present food stamp regulations do not allow the choice of healthier deli prepared foods, both hot or cold, that are generally cheaper and healthier; and

WHEREAS, some food stamp recipients do not have time to prepare a healthy meal at home; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Grange supports legislation changing food stamp regulations to allow deli prepared foods; and be it further

RESOLVED, that food stamp issuing agencies educate food stamp recipients to make healthier food choices.

Resolution # 16 – Submitted by Park Grange # 249 Subject: Labeling of Household Cleaners

WHEREAS, household cleaner makers are presently not required to print the ingredients on its containers as in food; and

WHEREAS, a lot of chemicals are now being found to be harmful to the environment, animals and humans; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Grange support legislation requiring labeling of ingredients on household cleaners so consumers can make educated decisions when purchasing cleaning products.

State Secretary Carolyn Ross read the Convention Rules.

Standing Rules of the 137th Annual Convention New Hampshire State Grange of the Order of Patrons of Husbandry Best Western Sovereign Hotel Keene, NH

October 28 – 31, 2010

- 1. All persons, except special guests, shall be registered. Nametags and programs shall be issued.
- Admission to the meetings shall be by nametag and password only. Upon giving proper password, the meeting Deputy will provide a colored sticker for the name badge to eliminate the need for giving the password again at this Session. If you are not wearing your nametag, you will be refused admittance.
- 3. As a common courtesy to all members, cell phones are to be turned off, or set on vibrate.
- 4. At least fifteen delegates shall constitute a quorum of the State Grange.
- 5. Every Subordinate and Pomona Grange in good standing shall be represented by the Master or his/her alternate and one other delegate from said Grange.
- 6. The voting body of the State Grange shall be all registered delegates.

- 7. Members attending as non-delegates may take part in discussion, with permission from the chair, but shall not make motions and shall not vote.
- 8. A member wishing to speak shall wait for recognition by the Master, and upon provision of a working microphone shall announce his/her name and Grange he/she is representing.
- When two members rise to speak at the same time, the chair will first recognize the member seated the furthest distance from the Master's station.
- 10. No delegate shall speak more than two minutes on any question under discussion nor may speak a second time until all others who wish to speak have had the opportunity to do so.
- 11. All reports and other material for the permanent record, immediately on presentation, shall be given to the State Secretary, via a Scan Disk which the State Secretary will provide and a paper copy of any report.
- 12. The rules contained in the current edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the meeting in all cases where they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with the Bylaws and these Standing Rules.
- 13. These Standing Rules shall be presented to the members for adoption; a 2/3 vote shall be required for adoption.

Acting Steward, Bob Varnum announced that Jeff Holmes, President of the NH Farm Bureau was in waiting. Jeff then addressed the delegate body.

State Treasurer Gail Turcotte was called upon to give her report.

Treasurer's Annual Report

Worthy Master, Distinguished Guests, Associate State Officers, Members of the Pink Sash Family, Delegates, Brothers and Sisters:

I am pleased to bring you my third report as State Treasurer. I will not give you complete details of our finances, as those will be printed in the Journal. These are some highlights of our past year that I would like to share with you now.

The NH State Grange Executive Committee concluded a yearlong comparison study of three financial advisory firms in August. After careful consideration a new firm Morgan Stanley Smith Barney was selected and all invested funds are in the process of being transferred to this new firm. The money is now in mutual funds and is currently allocated with 60 % in equities, 38% fixed income and 2% cash and equivalents with combined goals of growth and income.

The NH State Grange Executive Committee also adopted an investment and spending policy earlier this year. The new policy provides for a 3.5%

spending rate based on a 3 year rolling average of the market value as of September 30 annually for all of our accounts.

We continue to carry the value of the State Grange Building at the purchase price of \$87,500.00. Our Account Receivable is at \$1,280.00 with no changes during the year.

A quick review of the special funds shows the Education Loan Fund granting scholarships in the amount of \$4,400. The Randall Richardson Memorial Youth Fund received donations of \$125 and expenses incurred for Youth Work amounted to \$200.

Fiscal year 2009 was the second year that all Subordinate and Pomona Granges were required to file the 990-N report with the Internal Revenue Service. Filing this report is an annual requirement with each year's report due to the IRS by February 15. I do have some of the 2009 paper version 990-EZ forms available for those few Granges that are unable to file electronically.

All NH Granges should renew their incorporation with the State of NH before December 31, 2010. This renewal of incorporation occurs every five years and if your Grange has not yet filed this report with the State of NH Secretary of State's Office I urge you to do so as soon as possible. I mailed complete details on how to file this report to each Grange Master last January. You may file on line and pay an extra fee or you may go online and print a paper version of your Grange's unique report form and file by regular mail. The fee is \$25 by mail and failure to file will cause your Grange to lose your non-profit status with the State of NH. If any Grange needs assistance printing their unique report form I will be glad to help them.

I would like to thank Don Ross, Chairman of the Executive Committee for his continuing assistance during this past year. Don has attended meetings with our new financial advisor with me and he is always willing to listen to my questions and concerns offering sound advice whenever I consult with him.

Thanks also to Carolyn Ross, State Secretary for continuing to handle her part of our shared financial duties in a timely and efficient manner. We have not paid any late fees or service charges in the past two years thanks to her efficiency. Carolyn was also able to use several discount coupons from Staples during the past year that resulted in significant savings to the NH State Grange.

State Executive Committee Chairman Donald Ross gave his report as Chairman of the State Grange Executive Committee. Donald also read the minutes of the August 12, 2010 Executive Committee meeting.

Report of the Executive Committee

Worthy Master, National Representatives, Fellow State Officers, Delegates, Brothers and Sisters:

The State Executive Committee had another busy year. We have met six times beginning November 27, 2009 to our last meeting on October 24, 2010.

Subordinate Granges continue to either close or consolidate in spite of our State Master, Beth Merrill's best efforts to keep them afloat. At least with consolidation our Golden Sheaf members will not lose their continuous years of membership.

The Patron's Plunge at last year's State Session yielded a fantastic return of \$2698.00 which greatly helped the State Grange checking account. We can only hope that this year's project – "Kiss the Pig" will be just as successful.

The State Grange Building in Hooksett continues to receive upgrades per orders from the Hooksett Fire Marshall. We have had to install emergency lights and exit signs. Recently it was brought to our attention that the State Grange Building has carpenter ants in the walls. Orkin Pest Control has been contracted to eradicate the pests.

The State Grange currently has charge of selling two Grange Halls (Contoocook and Starr King in Jefferson). The Starr King Grange Hall has been shown

several times to prospective buyers but with a soft real estate market it's a slow process as the prospective buyers all want something for nothing. On that note a local non-Grange resident, Peter Estabrooks continues to keep the Starr King lawn mowed at no cost to the State Grange. Peter has a great respect for our organization and feels that this is the least that he can do for the town of Jefferson.

The 501C-3 fund is still being formed and is nearing completion. It has been a very complex procedure to establish this fund. The committee that was set up to work out the details for the 501C-3 has spent many hours working and many hours on the road to get together for meetings. More details from the committee chairman will be heard later on in Session.

At our August 12, 2010 Executive Committee meeting, Rodney Huntoon of the Trustees of the Trust Funds brought to our attention the continued liability of loaning out durable medical equipment that we have stored at the State Grange Building. The State Grange Executive Committee made a recommendation to the Trustees of the Trust Funds, to discontinue loaning out any medical equipment because of liability issues and because much of the equipment is antiquated.

The State Grange continues to grapple with legal issues concerning our Subordinate Grange halls such as boundary disputes or Grange halls sitting on privately owned land including privately owned sources of water. At the turn of the century these sometimes loosely worded documents, although legal at the time can change dramatically when ownership of said parcels change hands.

Hannah West continues to do an excellent job at the Editor of the *Granite State Granger*. Hannah passes on numerous e-mails of importance to our members which enable those of us with electronic capabilities to know what's happening in the state.

Investment Firms: We have had a trial period from August 2009 to August 2010 to consider changing the State Grange invested funds. The firms we approached were: Morgan Stanley/Smith Barney (largest publically traded firm in the US), Edward Jones (largest privately owned firm in the US and TD Bank Wealth Management. All of the investment firms were all given the same parameters of investing and tolerance risk. TD Bank Wealth Management returned a yield of 4%; Morgan Stanley/Smith Barney and Edward Jones both returned a yield of 8%. Morgan Stanley/Smith Barney was chosen by the State Grange Executive Committee as our new investment firm as they offered more bookkeeping services that we needed at NO extra cost. I will say that it was a tough decision as both firms were excellent to deal with.

To our Worthy Master, Beth Merrill, we owe you many thanks of appreciation for all that you do for our order. Beth works tirelessly into the wee hours of the night on numerous Grange matters. Beth is always constantly on the go, traveling far and wide across NH and also to our neighboring states. Beth is extremely tactful in her pearls of wisdom in her many letters to struggling Granges and so much writing regarding legal issues in our state. Although Beth is well versed in Grange law, she is not averse to seeking out a second opinion on a particular touchy subject or concern.

To our Worthy State Treasurer, Gail Turcotte, you as well work countless hours in dealing with the prospective investment firms and preparing our financial end of the year documents for our accounting firm. Gail works tirelessly in dealing with the IRS concerning the 990-N form and helping out Granges who need her expertise in dealing with the IRS and the State of NH with the Incorporation forms. In my travels across the state many a Patron has spoken to me in length about Gail's excellent sources of information for them concerning any financial questions they might have.

To our Worthy State Secretary, Carolyn Ross, she has spent numerous hours updating membership records, filling orders from Secretary's and answering questions in a timely manner thus keeping the lines of communication open. Carolyn continues to work very closely with our State Treasurer, Gail Turcotte on keeping the flow of dues money for deposit and sending approved bills to be paid to Gail so that they can be paid in a timely fashion. Since Gail gets bills as soon as possible, Gail is able to take advantage of any discounts that can be had. Carolyn also takes advantage of a Staples Rewards card and always tries to buy what she needs on SALE. Carolyn has been able to save the State Grange hundreds of dollars from the Supply Account (a Thrifty New Englander!).

I, of course owe many thanks to Carolyn for deciphering my handwriting in sending out my e-mails of correspondence to various State Officers and Department Heads. Carolyn's forte is the computer, while mine is the TELEPHONE. Carolyn's nickname for me is "Chatty Cathy", however the State Master, State Treasurer and others know that they can call me at any hour of the day or night for consultation or just simply to "vent".

In closing, I would like to say that it has been an honor and privilege to serve as the Chairman of the State Grange Executive Committee. The Executive Committee is comprised of members from all walks of life and is much diversified. However, we all work together as a team for the best interests of the Grange.

Additional copies may be downloaded from the State Grange website or purchased from the State Secretary.

On behalf of Rochester Grange Dan Bascom asked for permission from the State Executive Committee to allow the use of alcohol in their Grange Hall by the Episcopal Church, which rents it. Permission was granted on a temporary basis. A state by-laws change is necessary if alcohol will be used in the hall

A state by-laws change is necessary if alcohol will be used in the hall permanently.

It was moved by Mark Collins and seconded by Beth Merrill to have a licensed electrician do the wiring of emergency lights and exit signs required by the

Hooksett Fire Marshall in the State Grange Building. The motion passed. Marty Boisvert will hire an electrician and submit the bill for the work to the State Secretary. Marty has already purchased the emergency lights and exit signs. State Treasurer Gail Turcotte reported that Grafton Star Grange has not filed with the IRS according to their Treasurer. Gail advised her to seek professional help and to file as soon as possible.

The new mutual funds for the State Grange Trust have been set up. The old accounts have been valued. Paperwork is still in progress.

A new Junior Director is coming on board soon. Bank accounts will need to be adjusted.

It was moved by Dan Bascom and seconded by Bob Haefner to assess Pomona Granges one dollar per subordinate Grange member for future national session's fund. The motion passed. State Secretary will bill the Pomona Secretaries. State Master will send a letter to the Pomona Masters. Beth reported that this is a five-year plan.

Minor changes were made in the wording of the NH State Grange Investment Policy.

Starr King Grange Hall is being aggressively marketed by the realtor, who hopes it will sell as soon as January, 2010. The contents of the hall need to be moved. Chris Hadsel should be contacted to look at the stage curtain and advise how to move it.

Fidelity Grange will vote to close on December 16, 2009. Wingold Grange will take the Fidelity members. All the paperwork has not yet been done. Dan Bascom and Don Ross will represent the State Grange on December 16. Mark Collins will collect the roll book of Sullivan County Pomona.

The Pansy Rebekah Lodge will be charged \$25.00 per month to use their storeroom at the State Grange Building as they no longer meet regularly at the building.

Donald Ross brought up the topic of what should be done about Granges who are not holding meetings. No decision was reached.

The latest count for the proceeds of the Patron's Plunge was \$2,695. Fifty dollars of that was requested by the donor to go to the Dictionary Project. Forty-five dollars was earmarked for the National Master, and Beth has \$390 more for National Grange.

Jim Tetreault has the evaluation forms from State Session. They were passed round the room for members to glance at.

Beth Merrill gave an update on Granges:

Ashuelot – Date to close is December 4th. They will consolidate with Prentice Hill. Charlestown – Gwen Yardley has gone to Charlestown Town Hall and brought home one load of Grange stuff. She will go back again for another load in the near future.

Contoocook – electricity has been turned off in their hall and they have been dispersing furniture and other items; will send info about realty listing to Don Ross or Hannah West

Londonderry – have held meetings; working on their building fund; applied for LChip funding and still waiting to hear; not sure when next meeting will be, but will let us know

Riverhill – changing officers in January; yard sale was a success; aware of bonding bill and working on figuring out how to pay quarterlies; goal to raise \$5000 to fix up kitchen downstairs

Warren Pond – second follow-up meeting had one or two people come. Now have a local contact to help get things going. He's working with Bob & Jane Trombi as they are members of WPG.

Wicwas Lake – latest attempt to follow up with them was postponed due to hospitalization of Master.

Jim Tetreault updated the project report form.

Meeting adjourned at 10:37 p.m.

Meeting called to order at 7:40 p.m. in the State Grange Building. Minutes of Nov. 27 meeting and Conference Call were approved.

Question by Bob Haefner about how often income is received.

A. Invested fund income is paid quarterly. The State Grange does not have the use of all invested funds as some belong to individual Granges. Granges pay dues quarterly.

State Treasurer's issues:

State Treasurer gave Quarterly Income & Expenses Report, State Session Financial Report and Dues and Bonding Owed Report. She passed out an invested funds comparison sheet update. It was moved by Carolyn and seconded by Hannah to accept these reports.

Bonding and Dues: There needs to be policy on recovering dues and bonding arrears from Granges which have closed if they have any funds left after closing. There was considerable discussion about how to collect back dues from Granges who owe them. Mark, Carolyn, and Gail were appointed to come up with a Past Due notice which could be sent out by the State Secretary as a reminder. It was suggested that the notice be copied to the Deputy for that Grange.

TD Wealth Management has assigned a new portfolio manager for the NH State Grange. Her name is Maryse "Maggie" Pelletier and she works out of Manchester, NH.

State Treasurer has mailed a letter about renewal of incorporation to each Subordinate and Pomona Grange. It was also printed in the *Granite State Granger*. A copy is on file with these minutes.

The NH State Grange Trust Funds have approval from the NH Attorney General's office and historical dollar values have been set on the funds. They are now in business.

Sullivan County Pomona will send a check for the money in their treasury when their CD's come due. Sullivan County Pomona gave a check for the September Quarterly Dues when they closed. Members were reassigned to Merrimack County and Mascoma Valley Pomonas.

The Youth Department will be handling the funds for the Junior Department. Jaffrey Grange sent in a check for \$771.93 from their treasury. Since they are not officially closed, the money cannot be put in the Defunct Grange account and is currently in the general fund. It was decided to put the Jaffrey money in a CD at Federal Savings Bank for a period of 18 months with no penalty for early withdrawal.

It was decided to invite representatives from the investment firms to report briefly to the Executive Committee at the 6th month mark, which would be our next meeting.

State Secretary's issues:

The Saturday minutes of the NH State Grange Annual Session were approved with "whatever changes the State Master wants to make."

The State Secretary's quarterly report was accepted.

It was moved by Beth and seconded by Mark to distribute the 2009 Journal of Proceedings as we did the 2008 Journal, i.e. electronically with paper copies available from the State Secretary at a cost of \$7.00 each. The motion passed.

State Master's Issues:

Attorney Don Whittum is now in practice for himself. He is currently working on letters about Rockingham Grange business for which the State Grange will pay and a letter to the Jaffrey Town Attorney about Jaffrey Grange, and affidavits for Grafton Star Grange.

Beth reported on the National Master's Conference in Orlando. The Grange Trademark Defense Fund fell far short of expectations and continuing donations are needed.

A committee needs to be appointed to look into possible sale of the State Grange Building as was voted at the 2009 State Session.

Executive Committee Chairman's issues:

A prospective buyer is currently bidding on the Starr King Grange Building. Peter Estabrooks has offered to rent the building if it doesn't sell.

The State Grange Building Occupancy Permit has been renewed. The original copy of the fire retardant paint can label has been placed in the frame behind the permit. The Knox Box still needs to be attached.

Jim Tetreault went over the project sheet.

Next meeting will be Thursday, May 13; at 7:30 p.m. Don will schedule the financial advisors at half hour intervals to make their reports. Meeting adjourned at 10:37 p.m.

NH State Grange Executive Committee Minutes for May 13, 2010

State Grange Building

Meeting was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Chairman Don Ross.

Maggie Pelletier from TD Bank was present to give an update on State Grange investments. She has been with TD Bank for 14 years and Citizens Bank for 10 years. She usually works with individuals and groups who have over a million dollars invested. She likes our spending and investment policies, although she feels that a return of 5% after inflation and fees is an aggressive goal. She had an Investment Objective Authorization Change Form, which Gail Turcotte and Don Ross signed as Treasurer and EC Chairman. They also signed the actual investment and spending policies. The next performance review will be six months from now.

Don and Gail had met with representatives of Edward Jones and Morgan, Stanley, Smith & Barney prior to this meeting. Grange funds at both firms show a higher rate of return than at TD Bank. For future planning Edward Jones does not offer sub-accounting. MSSB does offer sub-accounting service. A Comparison Sheet for the invested funds at all three institutions was handed out by Gail Turcotte.

Gail Turcotte presented the Treasurer's Report. Dues are not coming in as well as Gail had expected when she made budget plans. The money raised by the Patron's Plunge has kept the Grange going so far this year. It may be necessary to dip into principal soon. Mark Collins moved and Dan Bascom seconded a motion to adopt the Treasurer's Report. The motion passed.

Gail has been dealing with the Internal Revenue Service. She tried in January, 2009, to change the fiscal year for all Granges to October 1 - September 30. She received confirmation in March, 2009, that the change had been made, but apparently it hadn't. Gail was informed by the IRS Office in Ogden, Utah, that there is a Tax Payer Advocate Office in Portsmouth, NH, and she is now working with them. The State Grange has two tax ID numbers – one for departments and one for everything else. Gail has filed a report to the IRS for the number that applies to departments.

There was discussion of a website (www.grangehemppolicy.info) done by an Antrim Grange member which is not sanctioned by Antrim Grange or by the NH State Grange. It was moved by Mark Collins and seconded by Dan Bascom that "This Grange hemp policy website has not been officially approved by the NH State Grange." The motion passed. Don Ross will send a letter to the person responsible for the website with a copy to Beth Merrill as State Master and a copy to National Grange.

Bob Haefner described the work of the Pease Greeters and asked if helping them could be made an official State Grange project. This matter would need to be brought up at the annual State Session or taken on as part of the work of a State Grange committee.

Beth Merrill moved and Mark Collins seconded a motion to give \$250 of the money raised by the Patron's Plunge to the NH Dictionary Project to be spent on dictionaries for NH third graders. The motion passed.

The Town of Hooksett will be having a Farmers Market on Riverside Drive each Wednesday from 4-7 p.m. from July 14 into October. The road will be closed to traffic during Market hours. No one is currently using the State Grange Building on Wednesday afternoon or evening.

The question arose about supervision for Youth Rally, an overnight event. How many supervisory adults have been screened? Beth will speak to Chris Heath and Lynn Clark about this matter. It was moved by Bob Haefner and seconded by Mark Collins to authorize the Youth Director to provide a list of screened adults attending this event and to request that a brief training for this event be provided. The motion passed.

The bus trip to Washington, DC, has been cancelled. Refunds will be issued. The New Hampshire Grange Foundation is looking for suggestions of names for additional trustees.

Beth Merrill has appointed a committee with David Boynton as chair to study the feasibility of selling the State Grange Building. Ida Hutchins and Claire Gagne are also on the committee.

Dan Bascom moved and Bob Haefner seconded a motion to allow Marie Hall to use the spinet from the State Grange Building for Spotlight NH if there is no piano at Camp Spaulding. The motion passed.

It was moved by Dan Bascom and seconded by Hannah West to accept a contract with the Town & Country in Shelburne, NH, for the 2011 annual session. The motion passed.

Acton Fair in Maine is looking for participants from New Hampshire. Beth Merrill gave them the names of some contacts.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:20 p.m.

Treasurer will prepare a preliminary budget for discussion at August 12 meeting. Funds held by Departments at end of year will pass to the next director.

New directors will receive half of the current budget at the beginning of their term. They will be expected to keep books and have them ready for audit at the end of the year. They should also submit a budget for the ensuing year.

The Departments will remain the same.

Spring Fling will continue.

Add a budget line for "training." This will cover in-state training sessions and some costs for people attending training offered by National Grange.

By-laws addendum – What needs to be included? Gail Turcotte will work on this project with Rodney Huntoon and Hannah West as a committee.

Affordable insurance for Grange Halls: National Grange Mutual (NGM) seems to be the best possibility. Individual Granges will have to find a local agent who carries NGM.

Carolyn had a newspaper article about a supper for "Benefit of Grange" in a town which does not have a Grange but has a former Grange Hall for which the supper proceeds were intended. Beth will check with National Master to see what to do about this matter.

Arthur Merrill was elected to serve as the second NH delegate to National Grange Convention in November.

The Town of Hooksett will be holding a Farmer's Market on Riverside Drive, the street where the State Grange Building is located. The Market will run on Wednesdays from 4 to 7 p.m. from mid-July into October, and Riverside Drive will be closed to traffic during those hours. The vendor area may spill over onto State Grange Building property, depending on how many vendors there are. The Grange is welcome to participate in the Market if they wish. Products sold are to be locally grown or handmade. Questions were raised about insurance liability. Hannah West will follow up.

There is a contract with the Town and Country in Shelburne for the 2011 State Grange convention. State Secretary will sign it, and State Treasurer will send a check for the required deposit.

There are carpenter ants in the wall of the State Grange Building. It was moved by Mark Collins and seconded by Carolyn Ross to hire Orkin Pest Control to rid the State Grange Building of carpenter ants and other pests. The necessary money will come from the State Grange Building Fund. Motion passed.

Jim Tetreault reported that during his visit to the National Grange Building in Washington, DC at the time of its rededication he noticed in the Saunders Library a portrait of James Farmer, a National Lecturer from NH, which had no identifying nameplate. It was moved by Dan Bascom and seconded by Carolyn Ross to have Jim Tetreault ask the National Grange to have a nameplate made for the picture and send the bill to the NH State Grange. Motion passed.

Starr King Grange Hall – Beth Merrill and Christine Hadsel will go there on July 2 to remove the stage curtain. The curtain will be stored at Antrim Grange Hall with the hope that it will eventually go to the NE Grange Building at the Big E. The hall has not sold yet.

Jim Tetreault went over the project sheet.

A Motion to Adjourn was made by Bob Haefner and seconded by Mark Collins. The meeting adjourned at 10:58 p.m.

Next meeting will be held on August 12th at the State Grange Building.

NH State Grange Executive Committee Minutes August 12, 2010

Present: State Master Beth Merrill, State Overseer James Tetreault, State Secretary Carolyn Ross, State Treasurer Gail Turcotte, Executive Committee Chairman Donald Ross, Executive Committee members Mark Collins, Robert Haefner, Daniel Bascom, and Hannah West.

Meeting called to order by Chairman Donald Ross at 7:30 p.m. in the State Grange Building.

Moved by Bob Haefner, seconded by Dan Bascom to accept the minutes of the July 1, 2010, meeting. Motion passed.

State Secretary Carolyn Ross presented her report for the quarter ending June 30, 2010. Moved by Dan Bascom, seconded by Mark Collins to accept the quarterly report. Motion passed.

State Treasurer Gail Turcotte gave a summary of how the invested funds have done during the past year. The Morgan Stanley Smith Barney account and the Edward Jones account have been earning about eight per cent. The TD account has been closer to four percent. Gail also presented information gleaned from questions to the financial advisors about sub-accounting and about how the many smaller accounts would be invested.

Morgan Stanley Smith Barney offers sub-accounting and will waive the fees for doing it. Edward Jones does not offer sub-accounting.

If the accounts are moved from TD Bank there will be closure fees.

It was moved by Bob Haefner and seconded by Mark Collins to select Morgan Stanley Smith Barney to manage the invested funds under the jurisdiction of the Executive Committee. The motion passed by unanimous vote (7 yes, 0 no) at 8:15 p.m.

The signatories (Beth Merrill, Gail Turcotte, and Donald Ross) will remain the same for now.

It was moved by Mark Collins and seconded by Bob Haefner that funds that are controlled by the Executive Committee which do not have existing special rules should follow the same guidelines as the State Grange Operating Fund. The motion passed by unanimous vote (7 yes, 0 no) at 8:45 p.m.

A question was raised about Granges with escrow accounts. They have been receiving a five percent yearly income according to past spending policy. The next check they receive (April, 2011) will reflect the new spending policy of 3.5 percent, a lower figure. Will this lower figure be enough for those Granges, which count on the escrow check to meet some of their expenses? It was decided to have the State Treasurer write a letter to the Granges with escrow accounts informing them of the change in spending policy. If they do need additional funds they may request them, subject to the regulations set up in the by-laws. State Grange Treasurer Gail Turcotte presented a proposed budget. It was decided to raise the budget line for donations to \$4,000 to give a goal to work toward.

Mark Collins moved and Carolyn Ross seconded a motion to accept the proposed budget as written with the one change to increase the line for donations to \$4,000 on the income section. The motion passed. It was moved by Beth Merrill and seconded by Don Ross to re-elect Diane Collins to the Trustees of Trust Funds for three years. The motion passed. Hannah West spoke about the Hooksett Farmer's Market to the agent from Eames Insurance, which carries the policy on the State Grange Building. The State Grange liability will cover claims for accidents, which might happen on the property that goes with the building.

The Northeast Connection is a group composed of the State Masters and Overseers in the seven states, which comprise the Northeast Region (New England States plus New York). They are currently meeting to plan the 2013 National Grange Session. It is customary for the State Master of the host state to be the Session's Director and for the State Treasurer of the host state to serve as Treasurer of the group. New Hampshire is the host state for 2013. That means that the NH State Grange tax ID number, Financial Policy, and the like would be impacted. A bank account needs to be established soon to handle assessment and fund-raising money and ten thousand dollars left over in Connecticut after the 2008 conference.

Mark Collins moved and Dan Bascom seconded that the NH State Grange take the responsibility for handling the money of the NE Connection for the 2013 National Grange Convention and authorize the forwarding of NH's investment/spending policies to the board of the NE Connection. The motion passed.

Bills for the 2013 session would be sent to the Session's Director who would forward them to the Treasurer for payment.

Beth Merrill distributed the schedule for the 2010 State Session in Keene for the EC to look over. There was considerable discussion about when to close the Silent Auction at State Session. No vote was taken, but the prevailing attitude was to leave it up, if space allows, until the Banquet in hopes of attracting more bidders.

A report of the Grange Foundation sent by Jean Abbott was read aloud by EC Chairman Donald Ross. No mention was made of a Tax ID number. Bob Haefner stated that he is now on the Foundation Board of Directors, which currently consists of six Grange members and five non-Grange members. Recent additions on the non-Grange side include NH Commission of Agriculture Lorraine Merrill, Gail McWilliam-Jelley, and John Porter – all of whom are important figures on the NH agricultural scene.

Gail Turcotte feels that a majority of Grange members on the Foundation Board would best serve Grange interests. The Foundation Board feels that individuals representing a broader spectrum of interests would help with fund raising. It was also mentioned that, if Grange interests are prominent in the by-laws and mission statement, then the Board is pledged to protect such interests.

Illegal Hemp Website- Don Ross has sent a letter to the member involved saying that the site was illegal and requesting her to take it down. She has ignored the request. Don will send another, more specific letter.

A question was brought from Rodney Huntoon of the Trustees of Trust Funds concerning possible liability from lending out durable medical equipment. The durable medical equipment loaned by the NH State Grange is the responsibility of the Trustees of Trust Funds rather than the Grange Services Committee. The equipment is not necessarily in good working order or in sanitary condition, and the Grange is really not equipped to evaluate it or to repair it.

It was moved by Mark Collins and seconded by Bob Haefner to make a recommendation to the Trustees of Trust Funds that the Grange should discontinue loaning durable medical equipment because of liability and lack of means for proper oversight. The motion passed.

Individual Grange Matters-

Hannah West gave a report on the visit of a GRIT team to Lake Shore Grange on August 9.

Wicwas Lake had a public meeting on August 9. After a desperation article in the local paper, 38 people showed up and 15 filled out applications. They were mainly folks who had attended events in the hall and were interested to see it remain in the community as a place to hold functions.

The charter application for Croydon Grange has been submitted to National Grange.

Beth and Arthur Merrill went to Starr King Grange Hall and removed the stage curtain and two "ears." The other two ears were too badly damaged to be of use. The curtain is currently stored at Antrim Grange Hall. It probably will not be suitable for the NE Grange Building at the Big E because it is too long for the back of the stage and not wide enough for the front.

Sullivan County Pomona – It was moved by Carolyn Ross and seconded by Beth Merrill to give \$200 each to Merrimack County Pomona and Mascoma Valley Pomona from the funds of Sullivan County Pomona to help defray dues costs for the transferred members. The rest of the money is to be placed in a defunct Grange account. The motion passed.

The next meeting will be held on Sunday, October 24, at 1 p.m. in conjunction with the State Officers Sixth Degree rehearsal. Books of the State Secretary and Treasurer, the Trustees of Trust Funds, and the Educational Loan Fund need to be audited at that meeting.

NH State Grange Executive Committee Minutes October 24, 2010

Present: Donald Ross, James Tetreault, Beth Merrill, Carolyn Ross, Gail Turcotte, Mark Collins, Robert Haefner, Daniel Bascom and Hannah West. Meeting at the State Grange Building was called to order by Chairman Donald Ross at 4:04 p.m.

Prior to the meeting the State Secretary's and Treasurer's books were audited as well as the Trustees of the Trust Funds and the Education Loan Fund books. The minutes of the August 12 meeting were approved.

A resolution from Rhode Island about the display of Junior Grange items at the New England Grange Building during the Big E was discussed. It was felt that the matter should be handled by the New England Grange Building Trustees. The resolution will be given to the NH Trustees of the New England Grange Building to bring up at the next meeting of the NEGB Trustees.

Dan Bascom inquired if individual Granges could open an escrow account with the State Grange for their particular Grange investments. The matter was discussed but no answer was reached. Some concerns raised were: Should Granges be charged a fee for the paperwork involved? Should there be a minimum amount required to open an account? What about rules for withdrawing the money?

Jim Tetreault passed out a list of the priorities he would like the State Grange to follow if he is elected State Master. Beth Merrill questioned how these priorities would fit in with the National Grange priorities, which the NH State Grange has adopted. Jim would also like to see a Grange Growth Team for Pomonas. He plans to appoint Stephen Tracy as an Organizing Deputy. If Stephen were to spend time in an area trying to organize or revitalize a Grange, Grangers there would have to feed and house him as their contribution to his efforts on their behalf.

The Quarterly Reports of the Secretary and Treasurer were accepted. Treasurer Gail Turcotte reported that the Trust Fund annual report to the Attorney General's office has been filed. The 990-N electronic report for the Department's TID has been filed with the IRS. Gail has also submitted the required material for preparing the IRS paper return to the accountants.

The proposed budget for 2010-2011 was presented and discussed. It was moved by Carolyn Ross and seconded by Dan Bascom that the budget be presented to the delegate body at State Session with the amount under fund raising changed to \$4,000. The motion passed.

Beth Merrill suggested that NH update its Membership Benefits information. National Grange has already done this and put out a brochure. NH could add their benefits to the National list.

There will be a brief meeting of the Executive Committee at State Session to elect new officers.

Members will meet on Friday, November 26, for a 5 p.m. supper, auditing of the department books and a business meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 6:10 p.m.

2010 Legislative Department Report

Worth Master, Honored Guests and Brother and Sister Patrons: It gives me great pleasure to deliver my final report as Legislative Director of the New Hampshire State Grange. I have been your Legislative Director for 10 years, and have enjoyed every moment of the job.

Rather than give just an update of what we did during the last year, I want to share with you what I consider some of our accomplishments over the past 10 years.

- We have established contact with our Congressional Representatives in Washington DC bringing the Grange position to them and letting them know how Grange members feel about different issues concerning our State and Country. Some of the tools we have employed are our own Legislative Policy booklet, the National Grange "Blue Print for Rural America", and participation in the Legislative Fly-In on a yearly basis hosted by the National Grange
- We have consolidated our positions into a "New Hampshire State Grange Legislative Policy booklet" which can be found on our State Grange website
- We have worked in coalition with other organizations such as the Farm Bureau on important issues like the value of having a Commissioner of Agriculture in the State of New Hampshire; we have worked with the other Northeast State Granges on the Northeast Dairy compact.
- We have established an awards program recognizing outstanding members of the NH House and Senate and established an Award in Memory of Longtime State Senator from Keene, Clesson "Junie" Blaisdell in recognition of outstanding service to the citizens of NH. We also established an award in memory of Robert "Bob" Bodwell for Granges and Grange members who excel in the legislative field.
- We have also re-established a lobbying program in Concord, lobbying the Legislature on issues that are once again important to us. One of the comments we heard was that it was great that the Grange was active in Concord again.
- We have worked with other State Granges in the region to build corresponding policies so when we are in DC we work together, we have the ability to tag team and let Members of Congress know that the

- members of the Grange in NH believe in this as well as the member of the Granges in the other states.
- We also hosted two Legislative Fly-Ins here in NH focused on the NH Primary. Participants had the opportunity to participate in an educational portion of the program, and then volunteer on an actual Presidential campaign, and share the experience. We have had people come all the way from Ohio. Ask Lisa Tharpe from Ohio how cold it can really be when you can toss your cup of coffee in the air and the coffee freezes.

We as an organization have had some great successes; I don't believe that the Grange is just a social organization. We are an organization that stands for important issues and we have to be willing to use that authority that comes from the Grassroots and the delegate body of this State Grange. I want to thank you all for your support over the last 10 years. In closing I want to remember some of my past committee members who have passed away my dear friends Bob Bodwell, and George Everard both of these men served with me during most my of tenure as your Legislative Director. I also want to thank Barbara Frangione and Dee Joslyn who are past members of the committee and served the State Grange long and faithfully.

I also want to thank my legislative mentor, Past National Grange Legislative Director Leroy Watson, who encouraged me, taught me, and is a close friend whom I admire, respect and appreciate.

I also want to thank Past State Masters, Dan Bascom, John West and our current State Master Beth Merrill for having placed their confidence in me to serve as your Legislative Director.

State Historian Report 2010

Worthy State Master, State Officers, Honored Guests, and Patrons all: It is a pleasure to present my report as your State Historian. It is amazing that time after time when I pick up a State Grange Journal, I find bits and pieces of information that shows this organization being so remarkable. What a force this organization was through the years!

We think that Grange members would never become involved in this or that, but we did. This year has been a busy year as your State Historian. I have been pleased to help several individuals who were looking for information about former

Granges that have closed. One gentleman was from the Orford area who was trying to find information about Mt. Cube Grange. Another gentleman was looking for information about the Rural Electrification Committee, which was a Standing Committee in the State Grange during the 1930's to mid1940's. He came to my home to read the Journals and make copies of reports made by the committee.

I had the pleasure of helping a gentleman find information about his relatives who belonged to Highland Lake Grange in East Andover. This was a case with another individual who held the office of Master for Colebrook Grange. This person wondered how many Granges there were in Colebrook at one time.

Then I had another young man who is a student at the University of New Hampshire in Manchester. He came to my home several times to read the sessions of the State Grange in the early 1920's to 1930's. He had been to the State Library and asked if he could do some more research. He told me he would send me a copy of his report when completed. To date, I haven't seen it but I do have his name and will follow up at some point.

I was pleased when our State Membership Director asked me to research Croydon Grange. After much research, I found that this Grange lasted two years before it closed. He also recently asked me for information about any Grange in Grantham. The only Grange I could find in Grantham was Blue Mountain Grange. This unit also closed during the mid1970's. I am always very happy when asked to do research on a particular unit or town having a Grange.

I have continued to update a new version of our State Grange history. However, I also started a new version focusing on my recollections when I joined as a child in 1957 in the Juvenile Grange until it closed two years later. I then resumed by becoming a member at 14 years of age in 1966. I tentatively titled this one, "Seeing the Grange through the eyes of a baby boomer" talking about the history from the time I joined until now. Remembering the old days from the visits of the Deputy for Instruction and Inspection, or reliving the days of Youth Nights or other specialty nights that we no longer celebrate. I also hope to interview members whom I met during those years or those who have since left the Grange.

I am also compiling a history for Pineconia Grange who will be celebrating its 100th Anniversary in a few years. I would be very happy to assist any Grange regardless if it is a Junior, Subordinate, or Pomona Grange to write their history and help get it printed. I enjoy hearing people say they never knew that Grange did so much in their community.

Once again, the Great Master of the universe rapped his gavel and called many members of our great organization to his Grange Above. I wonder if they realized how much history they were writing for their organization while they were here.

Some members were never appointed to serve on the State or National Grange level; mostly they contributed their time and talents to their home Grange. In addition, they were there for their brothers and sisters in good and bad times despite personal differences. They wanted to show the community this was an organization that it was an honor to be called a member of.

This year we said a sad farewell to a few of those dedicated Patrons: George Everard, a gentle giant whose deep voice could be heard at many meetings. He served on the State Legislative Committee, as well as an active member of Somersworth Grange. He and his wife, Fran knew how important family was. They supported their children and grandchildren as much as possible. George was a member of other organizations as well.

Unless you lived in Concord or attended Bow Grange in the late 60's to early 70's, you probably didn't meet Edwin Grenier. However, he was the husband of Past Master Phyllis Grenier, whose children were active members. Ed and Phyllis, along with her late sister Louise Chapman provided many rides for the youth of Bow Grange to participate in degree team rehearsals or other youth events. Ed worked for John L. Saturley at Concord Lumber, but made time to get his kids to Grange functions.

Dorothy Harper left us this summer to join her many friends and her late husband Harold in the Great Grange Above. Dorothy was a quiet lady, but if she had an opinion you could be sure to hear it. She remembered the Grange of old marching on the floor when she and Harold were Assistant Steward and Lady Assistant Steward for Degree Teams and assisted Barbara Briggs on the Installation Team. She and Harold would always square those corners when they were marching in degree work. I will never forget the teddy bears she collected when I was State Lecturer and we had the teddy bear march. I am sure she and Harold, along with Barbara Briggs are planning Grange events in the Great Grange Above.

Dorothy Noyes served on the State Youth Committee in the 1970's and 1980'. She and her husband Albert (known as Snooks by many) were honored as the Grange Young Couple of the Year. They belonged to different Subordinate Granges.

Ruth Bassingwaite was a lady who could provide comic relief to any place she traveled to. She held her regular membership in Massachusetts, but became an affiliate member in Jaffrey Grange. She could be counted on to do skits not only in Jaffrey Grange but at New England Lecturer's Conference.

Lila Heath was another Granger who served as secretary for Lower Intervale Grange for many years. She also assisted the late Marjorie Hayes with Lower Invervale Junior Grange helping boys and girls to attend state meetings or Junior Grange camp.

Jacqueline Jennings was a member of Hooksett Grange who didn't attend many meetings but she was a driving force for the senior citizens in the Concord area. She was constantly serving on committees or speaking out on issues facing our elder citizens.

I could continue on as I look at the list of departed members this year. Each of them has their own stories they could share with us. It is important to remember how you would like to be remembered when your days are complete on earth and it's time to join the Great Grange Above.

As I bring my report to a close, I would like to thank our State Master for the honor of serving as State Historian. It is a position that I enjoy very much and I look forward to completing my writings. I would like to wish everyone a very happy and successful 2011.

MASTER'S ADDRESS

Distinguished Guests, Officers of the NH State Grange, Delegates and Patrons: It is with pleasure that I present to you now my fourth and final Master's Address.

Travelogue

I'd like to open my Address with a quick travelogue and highlights from the past year while serving as your State Master and Lady Assistant Steward of the National Grange. I wrote details about these in my columns in the *Granite State Granger*, so I won't elaborate here, but would just like to highlight my attendance at the following events for the record:

National Convention in Grand Rapids, MI; Northeast Leaders' Conference in VT; Farm & Forest Expo; Winter Youth Rally; State Masters' Conference in Ocala, FL; Bowling Tournament; National Master's Media Tour meeting; Spring Fling Grange Month Kickoff; the Great Lakes Lecturer's Conference in IN; three meetings of the Grange Building Trustees, five meetings of the Northeast Connection; June Youth Rally, National Grange Building's 50th Anniversary Rededication festivities; Northeast Youth Conference; annual meeting of the NH Grange Foundation; Northeast Lecturer's Conference; the Big "E" Grange building volunteer (7 days); seven Executive Committee meetings, National Rep to the Vermont State Grange; visited at Connecticut State Grange Session, West Thornton's Awards Night, Pembroke's 125th anniversary, Wicwas Lake Grange Obligation ceremony on 18 new members, informational meetings for Croydon and Claremont Granges, Home Ec. Night at Hampton Falls, several

Peterborough Grange meetings and programs, two Degree Days, VT/NH Night, ME/NH Night, several TeamSpeak conferences, Sunapee Lake Grange, two Deputy Schools, Baker's River State Officer's Night, Cheshire County Pomona, and Merrimack County Pomona.

2009 National Grange

What a blast we had in Grand Rapids at the 143rd Annual Convention of the National Grange. About 15 NH Grangers attended at least a portion of the convention, including talent winner, Mary West of Chichester Grange, sign-asong contestants, Chris Heath of Centennial Grange and Allissa Estes of Somersworth Grange. Allissa also served as NH's Youth Ambassador, and Matt and Lynn Clark were the Young Couple. They all did New Hampshire proud! My husband, Arthur Merrill, served as Chairman of the Grange Law Committee, the duties of which kept him very busy and happy during the session. I enjoyed the duties of the Lady Assistant Steward and also served as Attendant #1 for the Seventh Degree, and shared the stage with Dan Bascom, Priest Archon, and Arthur Merrill. Priest Conductor.

National Grange 2013

Plans for the 2013 National Grange Convention, which will be held at the Radisson Hotel and Center of NH in Manchester, are moving forward. The Northeast Connection has elected me to serve as Session Coordinator, and I have gladly and enthusiastically accepted the challenge of this opportunity, although be it with a bit of trepidation. We will want to show off the admirable qualities of our state and our people and make a memorable convention for everyone - just in case it's another 100 years before National Grange convention comes to our state again. Much work lies before us, but I have no doubt that the NH State Grange will work together in bold and creative ways like it always does whenever a new opportunity is presented. Congratulations to Hannah West and Kathy Yardley for having their submissions for the convention theme and logo, respectively, chosen to be used to promote the convention. We will be finalizing the logo design in cooperation with the National Grange Communications Department sometime this winter.

To date, our State Grange has made two annual payments to the National Grange's Convention Assessment Fund. Each State Grange is being assessed \$1 per member per year for a total of five years. This money is being used to create a permanent fund within the National Grange Foundation, the income of which will be used to pay the portion of convention expenses that the National Grange absorbs. The State Grange Executive Committee has asked the Pomona Granges if they will assist in collecting/raising these funds as a service to their district's Granges. Some Pomonas have worked very cooperatively in this endeavor, while others have opted to allow the Subordinate Granges to handle it themselves. Regardless of how it's done, our Executive Committee is grateful for the financial support when reimbursing the State Grange for this expense. Having said that, I must alert you that another, separate assessment will be placed on the State Grange by the Northeast Region for the coming three years.

Fifty cents per member, per year of each of the seven regional State Granges, is being requested by the Northeast Connection in order to accumulate the funds needed to cover the estimated \$31,000 of expenses that are the responsibility of the host region. The Executive Committee has not yet addressed how this money will be raised by the State Grange, so your helpful comments will be welcomed by them, I'm sure.

Incidentally, the regional board has elected the Treasurer of the host State Grange to serve as the Treasurer for the regional board until and through the 2013 session, so keep that in mind when you are electing officers later today. The duties of our State Treasurer, for the next three years, will be expanded beyond the confines of our own State Grange treasury.

National Grange Name Protection Issue

Since 2008 there have been in excess of 24 separate major issues which required attorney action to defend our trademarked Grange name. Most of these have been successfully resolved, some by our challengers ceasing legal action and acknowledging our ownership of the Grange name and others with a license to use the Grange trademark being granted by the National Grange. National Grange has made many cuts and implemented cost saving actions while not eliminating basic services to our Granges and members. When a way to reduce costs without reducing quality has been found, they have done it. Earlier this year, the law firm that has been handling our legal efforts to protect the Grange name assured us that we are approaching the end of the current struggles and after we win this series of battles we will finally be back to a relatively low-cost maintenance mode within the budget. However the negative side of his assurance was that it might take up to another 18 months to reach the finish line and he estimated legal costs of at least \$150,000 during that period. The Executive Committee also met with National Grange Legislative Director Leroy Watson, who is coordinating the staff and volunteer efforts to better manage and control our trademark protection costs. Brother Watson's written report to the Committee showed that since implementing new cost containment strategies earlier this year; our monthly legal bill for April was 30% less than our bill for January. Brother Leroy Watson noted in a written report to the National Grange Executive Committee this year that we are probably at or near the limit of cost savings that the many strategies introduced by the National Grange staff thus far.

However, even with our 15% courtesy discount and our aggressive cost containment strategies, our estimated legal costs for trademark protection are projected to be the largest single monthly expenditures for the National Grange, outside of payroll and building maintenance, for the remainder of this year. They are working on ideas to try to get additional revenue generated, some of which will take place at the National Grange Convention next month.

All Granges should understand that **they** are the ones who use the Grange trademarks in a commercial manner. They raise money to support their halls, community service projects, educational efforts, and legislative programs. Due to

the information gathered during the Tyson Foods portion of the name protection fight, we know that a minimum of 7 to 8 million dollars are generated annually to benefit the projects and activities of the nation's Community Granges just from food related fund-raisers.

National Grange has expended its operating reserve and no longer has the resources to carry this fight without generating new or additional revenue. It cannot be assumed that the best case scenario is what will happen this year and that name protection efforts will not continue to disrupt the budget into 2011. For those of you who attended the meeting with the National Master in the spring, you have a good idea of what the situation is, as Brother Luttrell explained all this, and more, in great detail and he answered each and every question posed by the audience that night.

Granges and members across the country donated over \$67,000 during the last two years for name protection. The reality is that most Granges have not donated anything. Your National Grange Executive Committee does not want to cut any basic services or concede this fight to those who would use our Grange name for their own commercial profit and then potentially harass local Granges with legal challenges for selling products under the Grange name - but they need our help. A donation or a fund-raiser with the proceeds dedicated to this fight would make a huge difference. The half of my earnings in Saturday's Pig Kissing Contest that I can designate to any Grange charity will go to the Legal Defense Fund, as will that of a couple of my fellow competitors, but I hope many more NH Grangers will do their part in financially supporting this important endeavor. Incidentally, National Grange did cut the funding for National Reps to attend State Sessions in 2010. Many thanks to Gilman Grange #1 for generously offering to sponsor our National Reps this year, and we are delighted to have Phil and Maureen Prelli visiting with us from the state of Connecticut.

Five Priorities

The Five Priorities of the National and NH State Granges are to:

Increase active membership and participation at each Community Grange – Net Gain in Membership Awards go to the following Granges: Blow-Me-Down, Cocheco, Dorchester, Grafton Star, Lake Shore, Mt. Pistareen, Rockingham, Tuftonborough, and Watatic. Three Granges enjoyed large increases in their membership as a result of consolidations: Mt. Livermore, Prentice Hill, and Wingold.

Develop new leaders and give them opportunities at each Community Grange – I've observed new leaders gaining experience in Walpole, Eastern NH Pomona, and Hampton Falls to name a few. Hopefully, these new Officers are receiving an appropriate amount of mentoring from their predecessors as they learn the ropes in their new Grange journey.

Revitalization of Community Granges as a State Grange Priority – The Wicwas Lake Grange revitalization efforts took off last month when I had the great

pleasure of obligating eighteen new members and more are joining at each subsequent meeting. Blow-Me- Down was one that benefited from the GRIT training we received from Rusty Hunt a couple years ago, and seems to be continuing along the pathway to success. Ongoing work by several of our trained volunteers is continuing in several other Granges and the demand and need for more teams is growing every month.

Organize New Community Granges – The State Grange voted to add this as a priority at the State Grange level just last year and now Croydon Grange #357 is the second new Grange organized within a two year period. All credit for the creation of this new Grange goes to Membership Development Director, Stephen Tracy. Initial steps have begun in Claremont to see if there is interest to reorganize that Grange.

Re-emphasize and strengthen the family structure through the Junior and Youth programs – We re-established the June Youth Rally as a weekend event, which resulted in many brand new youth members attending their first rally. You will see a number of these new youth members when they open the session tomorrow morning. I am encouraged by the new faces I've seen at some of our State events this year. I have great expectations for future program leaders to provide the tenacious and inspiring guidance required by these upcoming Grange leaders and to use them as a foundation toward rebuilding our State Grange youth program to the high degree of participation and excellence enjoyed in years past.

A big regret of my term as State Master is our failure to organize a Jr. Grange. We **need** to nurture and develop this level within our organization. I am a proud and grateful Junior Grange alumnus and give full credit for my accomplished Grange journey to the education and preparation I received as a Junior Grange member. As in any of today's youth organizations, the major roadblock in having a successful youth/junior program is finding adults willing to be leaders, so we must be diligent in searching for the right people to carry out this important work.

Member Benefits

National Grange continues to add to their extensive list of member benefits and has recently produced a new member benefits brochure. I recommend that a new brochure be designed, which highlights all the national <u>and NH State</u> Grange member benefits, so that it can be used by local Granges as well as revitalizing teams in their work of promoting the Grange to future members.

State Grange Foundation

Under the leadership of Chairman, Jean Abbott, the New Hampshire Grange Foundation is, hopefully, well on its way to receiving 501c-3 status. Approval of the application filed with the IRS is anticipated most any day now. With the aid of Directors, Ken Berry, David Boynton, Marie Hall, and Ruth Holmes, the by-laws of the foundation have been laid out over the course of many meetings during the year. I attended the annual meeting in July and got a sense of the difficult and monotonous job this group has toiled over so diligently and I commend each and every one of the directors for their faithful service to this endeavor. The

Foundation will give a report here tomorrow and you'll be amazed to hear some of the distinguished names they have solicited and added as non-member directors of the foundation.

We do not yet know if the scholarship money that Clarence C. Sprague intended us to receive from his estate is still available, which was one of the main reasons why the foundation was established in the first place, but regardless, the ability of the Foundation to aid our local Granges in their own important projects will become evident soon enough.

Pomona Granges

The National Grange conducted its first Pomona Grange Growth Summit last month in western Pennsylvania. While I was not in attendance, we did send a representation from NH, so we'll have to wait and see what develops from this new focus on Pomonas, both from the state and national levels. I appreciate the efforts of the few Pomona Masters who are truly making an effort to reach out to the Granges within their district, and to the Pomona Committee chairmen who are embracing their additional role as a member of their corresponding State Committee. A discussion was held at the summer Pomona Masters' meeting as to whether or not this practice should be continued. The resulting decision was that overall it's a good way to enhance communication between the State and Pomona Granges, but that the Directors should generate more regular communications and involve the Pomona Chairmen with more things to do. It also was noted that perhaps a state committee with as many as eleven members may be just too cumbersome to work efficiently. I look forward to seeing what further developments the next administration may come up with to solve these and other issues.

Industrial Hemp

I was proud and excited to be one of a handful of delegates, at last year's national convention, who brought the issue of hemp to the floor for discussion. The resulting vote reversed the negative policy of the National Grange to now favorably support research, production, marketing, and processing of industrial hemp. The experience serves as another example of how a little bit of education of the facts about hemp can do a lot in the way of debunking the negative connotations that have been imposed on this most beneficial plant, presumably by those who have the most to lose once all restrictions for its production in our country are lifted.

My home Grange has submitted a resolution to this convention on the subject of hemp, to which I would like to give some background. The delegate body of the 136th annual session adopted resolution #7, regarding a petition in support of Pine Ridge Reservation's attempts to grow hemp. Not one comment or question arose from the delegate body before the vote took place. In hindsight, I feel that this was either because our delegate body has become desensitized to the stigma of the word "hemp" and therefore wants to support anything that contains the word, or because you felt that since the resolution originated in my home Grange, therefore, I wrote it and you felt obligated to vote in favor of your State

Master's resolution. Whatever the reason, I want to remind you that YOU are the legislators of our Order and therefore are entitled to your opinion and vote of what is best for the organization. Unfortunately, the State Grange's endorsement of last year's resolution #7 has been used by an individual member in a manner that is detrimental to Antrim Grange, the NH State Grange and the National Grange. I sincerely hope that the lesson learned from this particular incident is that the decisions you make at this meeting have far-reaching importance and impact on the world, so it is essential that all delegates educate themselves to the utmost extent on the issues presented in resolutions and therefore make the wisest decisions while casting votes to establish policy for the State Grange.

Spring Fling

The third annual Spring Fling Grange Month Kickoff Event was held in April and featured a number of workshops on topics varying from geocaching to natural landscaping to good Grange publicity. As adults, we have limited opportunities to experience new information and to broaden our knowledge, so the Spring Fling seems to fill that need for many of us. Among the growing number of Grangers who look forward to this event, we had a carload travel down from Mt. Hope Grange in Landaff; this is a Grange that is rarely represented at a State Grange event, so we did take notice of their attendance this year. Spring Fling receives high marks on its evaluation sheets and seems to have quickly become a regular State Grange event and is expected to be offered again next year. It is especially satisfying for me to hear other members beside myself insist and defend the idea that this event continues to stand on its own merit and not be used as a venue to hold any other committee meeting or event in conjunction with it. Thanks to the Directors and State Officers who pitched in to help in any way that I asked. I join with you all in eagerly anticipating the 2011 Spring Fling program and whatever topics it may offer us!

The Big "E"

Brother Matt Clark was elected chairman of the New England Grange Building Trustees in January and has met this new position with great enthusiasm. He will give a detailed report of the improvements made to the building and the Grange activities during the fair. He will tell you more about the new emphasis on the Grange Day parade, but right now, I would like to thank Gloria Davis, Bob Haefner, Alanna Belville, Lynn Clark and her boys, Larissa Grant, and the five members of Blow-Me-Down Grange who all sported their NH purple duds and marched in the parade on Grange Day. Lynn provided a "float" and Antrim Grange's goat "float" won first place and therefore netted our State Grange's Youth department \$200. You can expect to hear more requests for help and support of this event in 2011. One thing we noticed was missing from our marching contingent was a banner identifying us as the NH State Grange. I recommend that the State Grange procure a suitable banner that can be used for identification purposes in future parades and that its color be complimentary to the purple-attired Grangers who will carry it. I want to thank and recognize my mother, Gwen Yardley for her years of coordinating the Blueberry Pie days at the NH Building at the Big "E". Thanks to

her efforts and the many, many Grangers and friends who have trekked down to the fair over the last eleven + years, the State Grange has raised more than \$16,000 under her direction. Thank you, Gwen for your dedication and diligent labor in the name of blueberries and the Grange! You have set the bar for your successor and I am proud to present you with this State Master's Award for Excellence in honor of your retirement from the position.

Painted Curtains

In 2008, "Curtains Without Borders" and the New Hampshire Preservation Alliance began a survey to locate and document New Hampshire's collection of historic scenery. So far, 130 pieces have been located, 55 of which have been found in Grange halls. One such curtain, which hung until recently in the Starr King Grange Hall in Jefferson, has been removed by the State Grange and is currently being stored at the Antrim Grange Hall. With the Starr King Grange Hall being on the market, the State Grange Executive Committee voted to not include the curtain in the sale of the hall. At first, it was thought that perhaps this curtain would make a nice addition to the stage at the New England Grange Building, but now we realize it's not an appropriate size for that purpose, so we'll have to see what other avenues we can explore in order to find a suitable new home for the curtain.

Compliance to Digest and By-laws

This has probably been the biggest stressor during my term of office. I have been advocating in the two previous addresses the need for us all to familiarize ourselves with the constitution and rules of our Order. Knowing the regulations and abiding by them should be important to us all. Is it not a fact that when our Granges start to fail in the way of membership and attendance at meetings that compliance with our own by-laws is doomed to fail? Whether or not we obey our own rules is a decision, not a result of our circumstances. In the situation where there are not enough active members willing to serve so that the offices of Secretary and Treasurer are filled by the same person, it needs to be recognized that your Grange has decided to violate Grange law, rather than make a more important decision, such as to accelerate efforts to acquire new members. For the record I will let it be known that the Charter of one Grange in our state was suspended during my term of office. The Grange has since met the minimum requirements to be reinstated, but it should be known that one of the red flags which led to this action was the fact that the Grange was not accepting visits from their Deputy. Or what about the Grange that just this year pronounced itself closed, and gifted its community with an extremely generous scholarship, with funds from an account that was nurtured over the course of several decades, but was never disclosed to the State Grange via the Deputy or in any of its own Executive Committee reports? The legality of the decisions of the members of said Grange are questionable, and in the eyes of this State Master, the reputation of that Grange is forever tarnished and the respect and esteem of its members is forfeited.

It should be understood and recognized that the State Master relies upon the Deputies to serve as his/her eyes and ears. Deputies are not spies, but instead

serve as information distributors and gatherers. It's important for the State Master to understand the challenges some Granges may be facing or to learn about the successes of other Granges so that the lessons learned in that success can be shared and perhaps duplicated in more communities. Too many times when a Grange is struggling, the request for aid from the State Grange comes when the situation has deteriorated to such circumstances that the financial and personnel resources available to the State Grange would not be enough to be of assistance. Brothers and Sisters, we need to figure out a way for the Subordinate and Pomona Granges to establish a productive and mutually respectful partnership with the State Grange for the future prosperity and growth of our organization.

Through my experiences as your State Master, I now believe that the Grange is not dying. Parts of it may die here and there, and when they do, the failure rests squarely on the shoulders of those who <u>decided</u> to let their part of it die. I have come to understand that our attitude is also a decision we make. We can decide that we are old and tired. We can decide that the Grange is going to die anyway. We can decide that the community has so many other activities that we can't compete. If you really stop to think about it, it's our brain telling us these things in an effort to protect us and keep us from harm and disappointment. It takes extra effort on our part to overcome those feelings and make the harder decisions that will allow new growth to materialize.

In an effort to refresh our memories and gain a better understanding of the inner workings of our Order, I recommend, once again, that every Subordinate Grange have a portion of the by-laws read and clarified on a regular basis during its business meetings.

Closings and Consolidations

I am sad to report that Ashuelot, Fidelity, and White Mountain Granges have consolidated or closed this year. This is definitely my least favorite part of being your State Master, and I have to admit that my policy for closing Granges has changed over the last four years. Originally, I thought that it was important to try to preserve as many members as we possibly can by consolidating Granges, rather than closing them and providing demits to all the members. However, it's become evident to me that this places too great a burden on the secretary of the receiving Grange and has also been complicated by the new assessment fees based on membership numbers from the previous year's totals, for which the new Grange is responsible, most times despite the fact that there was no compensation to the new Grange covering the additional expenses of the added obligation.

Compensation

While visiting at the Connecticut State Grange session last year, I noted that one of the resolutions adopted was to have their State Grange match the compensation money offered by the National Grange to new and reorganized Granges, (providing they meet certain criteria) up to \$400 for new Granges and

up to \$200 for reorganizations. I would recommend that our State Grange consider offering a similar reward for new and reorganized Granges in New Hampshire.

State Grange Building

I confess to being slow to appreciating the acquisition of the State Grange Building in Hooksett many years ago. At the time, I thought the facilities it offered would limit us in the types of functions we could hold there and certainly appropriate storage space continues to be problematic. Over the years, the building has begun to feel more like home and I think I've spent more time within its walls during my term as State Master than I have in total since we came in possession of it. Many members appreciate the historical value of our museum collection, which continually grows. Since the passing of our very dedicated Brother, John West, and without his continual organizing efforts, it seems that the little piles of artifacts that mysteriously appear now and again in the Museum Room are growing, occupying table space, and are not getting shelved or catalogued properly.

Tomorrow a special committee will make a report to this delegation on the viability of continuing to own this building. Depending on the decision of the delegates, I recommend that consideration be made for creating a new Museum Curator position, said person of which would have supervision over cataloging the museum room displays and thus, being responsible for accepting new items and/or making decisions of how to dispose of the duplicate and obsolete artifacts that materialize there regularly.

Additional accomplishments over the last four years have been the development of our Youth volunteer workers policy, the filing of notices of interest on all Grange-owned halls, a new set of hand-sewn pink State Officer sashes, the two newly organized Granges previously mentioned in this address, the pending formation of a State Grange foundation, the introduction of Rusty Hunt as our National Leadership/Membership Director (he visited us first, after being hired to the position), Spring Fling, and probably too many others to take note of in this address.

To my husband, Arthur, I could not have done this without you. You have been my confidant, you have picked me up when I was down, you have supported me in my decisions and sometimes have gently pointed out when I was wrong and needed to be corrected. I owe you so much for all the errands you do, for all the times you took care of the horses (like yesterday morning), and for waiting up for me when I came home from so many late-night Executive Committee meetings. You are my walking, talking Grange Digest, a service which has been invaluable over the last four years.

Mom and Kathy, so many times you have stepped up to the plate whenever I've presented you with my latest hare-brained idea and somehow we've always managed to make it come out okay. The work and effort you have put into this session, especially, has been over the top and I hope you will receive countless compliments from all the members when they see the Fourth Degree and when they attend the Celebration Banquet.

Jim Tetreault, you have been a constant source of support, almost always easily available for a quick phone call and at times, I imagine, you've been a weary sounding board. How many rides have we shared to and from the State Grange Building over the last four years? Your dialogue and company are so greatly appreciated.

Gloria Davis, somehow we manage to overcome the orange vs. gold personality traits that drive each other crazy and maintain a happy co-existence. Thanks for pitching in with all the little odd jobs and thanks for being my faithful airport limo driver!

I hate to start naming names at times like these, because almost always I inadvertently neglect to include a pertinent person or two. So in general, I thank the Past State Masters, State Officers, Deputies, Directors and committee members for your dedication, guidance, and support. No one person runs this organization. It takes each and every one of you and I am grateful for all you have done to promote the welfare of the NH State Grange.

General Deputy Tricia Taylor was called upon for her report.

General Deputy Report

Worthy Master, National Representatives, Honored Guests, State Officers, Delegates, Brother and Sister Patrons:

As I prepared to write this final report I was thinking about the various issues I have talked about in the last 3 years. Auditing the books, having liability insurance, reaching out to our new members to help them get acclimated – particularly if they are taking on responsibilities like the office of secretary. I've talked about GRIT Granges and the need for more members. Am I going to talk about them again? Absolutely.

Our GRIT teams are working with various Granges to help them stay afloat and get stronger. One in particular has recently had great success in gathering new members. Now comes the settling in period when we discover which of those members is going to stick with the Grange and help it revive.

Croydon Grange has been organized through the efforts of the Membership Director, Stephen Tracy. He has also been busy in Claremont building interest. Hopefully we will soon see a new Grange there as well. Although we are still experiencing a loss of membership state wide there are still people joining the Grange and enjoying it.

I am hearing of more and more new members who would like to see the ritual work to find out what it's about. My own Grange is doing one degree a year as our newer members have asked. They are enjoying it as much as we do. Most of us have found that we really do miss the ritual that we grew up in.

I have about the same number of Grange reports that I have had each of the past 3 years. A few of the Granges that haven't reported recently have reported this year, which of course means that somebody else didn't. I am proud to say that 38 Granges reported auditing their books this year. That's 10 more than last year. If we keep plugging away at the Granges who haven't yet been able to get back in the swing of things we will make it. Forty-five Granges report having liability insurance. Again we see a gain. Percentage wise Pomonas are lagging way behind in liability insurance yet they are just as liable as any Community Grange. Five of the 8 Pomonas reporting said they do not have liability insurance. You've all heard me on the subject of liability so suffice it to say this is not an economically healthy habit.

Worthy Treasurer, of the 63 Granges who have reported thus far you will be happy to know that only 15 reported no to filing their incorporation papers and several noted that they still have time. The majority of our Granges are safeguarding their non-profit status by following your instructions. I think you will also appreciate the figures on filing their IRS forms. Only 4 of the 63 Granges report not filing their IRS forms. You are definitely having better luck than I am with compliance.

We do still have some Community Granges that have not paid the National Session Assessment to the Pomona Granges. In some cases the Pomonas are making the payments for the Community Granges. In some cases the Pomonas are unable to cover the payments and are still waiting for the Community Grange payments. All of the Pomonas reported making full or partial payment. Overall there is improvement and that means a lot. Hopefully we can work together to help all of our Granges meet their financial responsibilities in the near future.

Would the deputies in the hall please stand and be recognized? I would like to thank each and every one of you. We've changed your duties, given you new tasks at the last minute, and we appreciate the ways in which you've stepped up to the plate. Thank you.

Worthy Master, thank you for the honor of serving as your General Deputy. It has been a privilege to work with you.

The woes of the Trustees continue to plague us from the past year. It took some time to get our available funds above the threshold established in order to assist our brothers and sisters. When we reached this point the Attorney General's Office allowed us to proceed with our assistance program.

We then proceeded to fund the two applications from the prior year and to process two new applications and paid the annual filing fee for a total of \$1,154.30.

We did not receive any donations this year. The anticipated income for next year is approximately \$1,800.00 after we pay the annual filing fee.

The application for financial assistance and the guidelines were removed from the website. These forms were reviewed, the guidelines were approved by all trustees, yet we are waiting on an approval from two trustees for the financial application form. Once this is completed the forms will once again appear on the website.

We accepted with regrets the resignation of Diane Collins as our Secretary in June and Omer Ahern, Jr. was named Secretary.

The Executive Committee of the State Grange has moved the invested Grange accounts from TD Wealth Management to Morgan Stanly Smith Barney thus leaving our trusts with TD Wealth Management. This did not seem like a wise decision for us, thus we have voted to move our accounts to Morgan Stanley Smith Barney hoping that our maintenance costs will be less. The paper work is in progress.

The Trustees thank you for your patience and understanding the past two years as we went through this transitional period.

INVESTMENT AND SPENDING POLICY NH STATE GRANGE OF THE ORDER OF PATRONS OF HUSBANDRY TRUSTEES OF TRUST FUNDS AND BLAISDELL FUND

I. INVESTMENT AUTHORITY AND RESPONSIBILITY

As stated in the Indenture of Trust entitled "New Hampshire Grange Trust" signed and sealed October 20, 1959 and modified by Merrimack County Court Decree on June 15, 1977 and as stated in the Belknap County Court Decree on June 25, 1973 transferring the Blaisdell Fund from Winnisquam Grange to the NH State Grange, the Trustees of the Trust Funds have the authority and responsibility to "retain, invest in, and reinvest in any real and personal property as they see fit".

II. PURPOSE

The purposes of the following investment guidelines, which are to be reviewed annually by the Trustees of the Trust Funds, are to:

Establish the investment objectives, policies, guidelines and eligible securities relating to any investments owned or controlled by the Trustees of the Trust Funds.

- Identify the criteria against which the investment performance of the organization's investments will be measured.
- Communicate the objectives to the Trustees, Treasurer of the Trust Funds, investment managers and funding sources that may have involvement.
- Serve as a review document to guide the ongoing oversight of the management of the Trust Fund's investments.

III. GUIDELINES FOR INVESTING:

The investment guideline for both funds is to achieve a total return (income and appreciation) of 5% after inflation. The following guidelines apply to the three main investment asset classes:

Equities: Allowable Range- Minimum 50%; Maximum 80% of total assets with target figure of 65%

The equity component of the portfolio will consist of high quality equity securities traded on either the New York, NASDAQ or American Stock exchanges. The securities must be screened for their above average financial characteristics such as price-to-earnings, return-on-equity, debt-to-capital ratios, etc.

It is acceptable to invest in an equity mutual fund(s) adhering to the investment characteristics identified above, as long as it is a no-load fund, which maintains an expense ratio consistent with those other funds of similar investment styles as measured by the Lipper and/or Morningstar rating services.

Prohibited equity investments include: initial public offerings, restricted securities, private placements, derivatives, options, futures and margined transactions.

EXCEPTIONS TO THE PROHIBITED INVESTMENT POLICY MAY BE MADE ONLY WHEN ASSETS ARE INVESTED IN A MUTUAL FUND (S), THAT PERIODICALLY UTILIZES PROHIBITED STRATEGIES TO MITIGATE RISK AND ENHANCE RETURN.

<u>Fixed Income:</u> Allowable Range- Minimum 15%; Maximum 45% of total assets with target figure of 30%

Bond investments will consist solely of taxable, fixed income securities that have an investment-grade rating (Baa or higher) that possess a liquid secondary market.

No more than 5% of the fixed income portfolio will be invested in corporate bonds of the same issuer. As well, not more than 20% of the fixed income portfolio will be invested in bonds of issuers in the same industry.

Prohibited securities include: private placements, derivatives, (other than floating-rate coupon bonds), and margined transactions.

EXCEPTIONS TO THE PROHIBITED INVESTMENT POLICY MAY BE MADE ONLY WHEN ASSETS ARE INVESTED IN A MUTUAL FUND (S), THAT PERIODICALLY UTILIZES PROHIBITED STRATEGIES TO MITIGATE RISK AND ENHANCE RETURN.

<u>Cash and equivalents:</u> Allowable Range- Maximum 10% of total assets with target figure of 5%

Cash and equivalents will be utilized for the liquidity needs of the portfolio whose objective is to seek as high a current income as is consistent with liquidity and stability of principal.

IV. PERFORMANCE MEASUREMENT STANDARDS

The benchmarks to be used in evaluating the performance of the two main asset classes will be:

- Equities: S & P 500 Index- Goal: exceed the average annual return of the index over a full market cycle (3-5 years).
- Fixed Income: Barclay's Intermediate Government/Credit Index- Goal: exceed the average annual return of the index over a full market cycle (3-5 years).

V. REPORTING

Financial statements shall be issued at least quarterly and may be issued more frequently if needed or desired. Statements shall list current investments, their costs, current values and transaction history.

Performance reviews will be provided at least once annually and maybe more frequent if desired by a representative of the investment service to the Trustees of the Trust Funds.

VI. SPENDING POLICY

The spending policy should support the level of current spending while growing the size of current investments to keep pace with inflation and support future obligations.

Each year, the Treasurer of the Trust Funds is authorized to withdraw up to 3½% of the total market value of each invested fund (market value to be determined by using a three year rolling average as of September 30 annually) for each Trust Fund's operating purposes. The dollar amount of any distribution(s) from the investment accounts will be left up to the discretion of the Trustees of the Trust Funds and the timing of any distribution (s) from the investment accounts will be left up to the discretion of the Treasurer of the Trust Funds. All withdrawals are subject to the rules and guidelines presently in effect for each current investment account including the need to preserve the historic dollar values for each account. The current historic dollar market value for the NH Grange Trust is \$40,000 and the Blaisdell Fund is \$9,000.

Any withdrawals of principal require the approval of both the Trustees of the Trust Funds and the Treasurer of the Trust Funds and are subject to the rules as set forth in the Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire as set forth in Title XXVII Chapter 292-B: 5 Uniform Prudent Management of Institutional Funds Act.

Adopted by the NH State Grange Trustees of Trust Funds on June 21, 2010.

State Grange Building Report

After last year's session and the resolution about selling the NH State Grange Building in Hooksett, the building manager became a much more somber and stressful position. Although there was no indication that the resolution had stemmed from anything the building manager had done, the prospect of managing a possibly doomed building was not a happy task, and it was difficult not to be defensive about the whole thing. Each maintenance cost was feared to be the last straw that might convince someone the building should be sold. The possible sale looming over us also caused a delay in plans to use the John H. West Memorial funds which had been earmarked for the State Grange Building Fund. The hope had been to do considerable work on the basement to provide a suitable home for the historical records and artifacts which meant so much to John. The records and artifacts continue to deteriorate until a permanent long term plan is enacted. Unfortunately, attending a workshop given by the NH Preservation Alliance on wet basements was as far as things could go until the future of the building is determined.

Some things had to be done regardless of the hazy future. The first task for the building manager following State Grange session was to get the assembly permit

renewed with the Town of Hooksett. This necessitated a few changes such as lighted EXIT signs and new door hardware for the main hall. Despite the offer of the building manager to do the work himself, the Executive Committee voted to have a professional licensed electrician install the exit signs. A Knox Box was ordered to be mounted outside the building and holds keys to allow the Fire or Police Departments access to the building in an emergency.

Paul and Rhoda Davis continue to do summer lawn maintenance and the Bascoms continue to maintain the plantings around the building. Claire Gagne continues to clean the building on a regular basis and report any issues to the building manager. A new digital thermostat was installed in the spring after several incidents of people turning the heat off completely upon leaving the building. The furnace was cleaned this fall and the smoke detectors inspected. Hannah West has continued with taking reservations for the use of the building and arranging for the pick-up and drop-off of keys. Several groups have used the building for baby showers, birthday parties and other such gatherings. Local Granges, the Rebekahs, the NH Arms Collectors, the NH State Grange Executive Committee, the North East Lecturers and the 2013 National Grange Hosting Committee have all been meeting at the building. State Session Coordinator 2009-2010

Worthy Master, National Representatives, State Officers, Delegates, Brothers and Sisters All:

I can't believe it is time to present my third annual report. Since our Worthy State Master Beth Merrill appointed me to this job a little over two years, I have found this job to be frustrating, mind boggling and also at times very rewarding. Sometimes that is all in the same day.

Last year I had the opportunity to examine a National Grange contract and in the contract it stated how much money is spent at a National Grange Convention. About two weeks after last year's State Session, I called the Ashworth Hotel to find out what we had spent at our convention. The figures are as follows: Accommodations \$11,000, Banquet \$2,500 and individual meals \$1,500. This gives us a total of \$15,000. The figures do not include the gratuities for the banquet or the NH 9% hotel and meals tax as this was not income for the hotel. The hotel contract for the Best Western Sovereign in Keene was signed last year. I was able to renegotiate the price of the rooms. I was able to get the price of rooms lowered by \$9.00 per night. If you are registered here at the Best Western Sovereign for 3 nights you will be saving a total of \$29.43 and that also includes the NH room's tax.

The last time State Session was here at the Best Western was back in 2006. As you may have noticed, the accommodations have been upgraded. The front lobby has been improved as well as an elevator added. The meeting rooms also have had changes made. However when the contract was signed well over a year ago I did not realize that the hotel was still in the process of making even more changes and improvements, nor did I have a clue that we would not be able to use the restaurant facilities.

Over this last year I have had the privilege to work with Laura Washer, Sales Coordinator here at the Best Western Sovereign. We have had many phone calls and e-mails for more than a year now. Laura knows by now that I am one that wants to fine-tune everything so that all of you in attendance are able to enjoy your stay here at the hotel.

I have already fine-tuned the rooming roster many times over the last few months. Some of you have called or sent e-mails for more information. I have also called a few of you to make sure that you receive the proper room and location here at the Best Western.

The contract for the banquet was signed and presented to the NH State Grange Executive Committee in early 2010. One thing that I have started doing is making the meals different each year. I do not want to hear someone say chicken and fish again!

A tour of the hotel was conducted back on August 7th. There were 9 of us present for the tour. I wanted to show everyone what the new rooms looked like now that they had been upgraded. We had to make a fast tour, as the hotel rooms where sold-out that weekend.

Our Worthy State Master asked me to set up a tour of the Radisson Hotel in Manchester and to also include a visit to the Palace Theatre, as this will be the site of the 2013 National Grange Session. The walking tour of Manchester took place on April 14th.

As our State Master knows that I do have contacts in Manchester, it was an easy tour to put together. However, the hard part was to be able to contact the proper persons to make the tour possible. Now I can say that the National Grange 2013 Session part of my duties as the NH State Grange Session Coordinator have now been completed.

At last year's State Session, I provided brochures for a tour to the National Grange Building 50th Anniversary. As there were only 19 Grangers that had send in deposits the tour had to be cancelled last May.

The contract for next year's State Session was sent in this last July. I am pleased to announce that the 138th Annual State Session will be at the Town & Country Motor Inn in Gorham. The dates will be October 27-29, 2011. The room's rates will be \$88.00 for single or double and \$6.00 for each additional person. The rates do not include breakfast and the 9% NH room tax. The banquet contract will be completed in early 2011.

We have not been to the Town & Country Motor Inn since 1992. I would once again like to thank Ann Leger for directing me in the correct direction.

I have also been in the process of trying to find a location for 2012 State Session. This has not been an easy task. I called the Fireside Inn and Suites in West Lebanon and was told that the weekend I was requesting was taken by Dartmouth College, as it will be their homecoming weekend. I was then offered the 3rd weekend. I sent this request to the State Grange Executive Committee and I was turned down as dates were outside the By-Laws of the NH State Grange. I was then asked to look for another location.

The State Grange By-Laws were changed a couple of years ago. However, what I am finding is that the date should have been earlier than October 20th. A

resolution will be presented at next year's State Session to hopefully adjust the date so that the 3rd weekend of October can be used if needed.

So now I am back trying to find an appropriate location for 2012 State Session. I have called three other hotels and have asked them to send me a hotel packet, as that is how I start my process of finding a hotel. After finding out some information I have now rejected the West Lebanon location for the following reasons. The hotel would require the NH State Grange to pay \$1,000 for meeting rooms for the 3-day State Session. The second location I looked at the room rates were too expensive and I was also told that we would have to pay something for the meeting space. The 3rd location found the meeting room to be downstairs and the room would not be big enough to meet our needs.

With the cooperation of the new State Master, I am planning on putting together a survey that will be sent out to Subordinate and Pomona Granges by the end of the year. We would like to find out what direction you think we should be taking to plan future State Sessions.

I will be opening the reservations for the Town & Country Motor Inn in March 2011. The reservations for the banquet will start in June 2011. The 2011 State Session information will be included in the Secretary's March 2011 Quarterly Report. Please ask your Secretaries for this information.

Brochures will also be on the NH State Grange web site. I also hope that many of you are on the NH State Grange e-mail list. This is a great way for you to find out a lot of information about the happenings of the State Grange.

I will remind you that I was brought up before computers and voice mail. Half of the problems with this position are tracking phone calls and e-mails. There has been many a day that I wish neither was ever invented.

As this is Sister Beth's last year as our State Master, I would like to thank her for appointing me to this position. Over the past couple of years I think we have both been on the same soapbox at times. We have had many calls and e-mails over the last few years.

As usual this annual report is lengthy. I do want to keep you informed as to what I have been doing as your NH State Grange Session Coordinator.

Another aspect of the Publicist position is to supply membership brochures and pencils for public events as the small budget allows.

New England Grange Building Trustees Report

Worthy Master, National Reps, Delegate Body, Brothers and Sisters all. The New England Grange Building Trustees held their annual meeting at the Northeast Leader's Conference to hear reports take care of business and elect officers. This year we had a change in leadership with me being elected president, Tom Gautaco, vice president, Jody Cameron, secretary and Jim Owens remained as our treasurer. During the summer we met at the NH State Grange building as it is a central location for all the trustees.

There have been opportunities throughout the year for the NE Grange building to be used. The 4-H used the building for an event they held at the Big E. The Eastern States Expo requested to use the building for an event, but later decided not to as it is not handicapped accessible. The trustees have toyed with the idea of making the first floor accessible by adding a loading ramp to the building.

The trustees have been trying to set up some guidelines for the use of the building, so the person in charge of loaning the building out has something to go by. A by-law committee has been appointed to review and make changes to the current by-laws. The trustees have voted to accept the National Grange by-law

on alcohol, which was sent to each of the New England states as a resolution to confirm our decision, which you will be voting on tomorrow.

The Avenue of States managers have held meetings throughout the year and I thank past president, Scott Davis, for attending in my absence.

The trustees have been making improvements to the building over the last few years. This year we hired someone to come in and strip the hardwood floor on the first level and refinish it. I would like to thank those who traveled down to the building to move everything off the floor before and after the job and for cleaning up all the dust. A new banner was purchased for the needle work display as well as stations to set a safety zone to keep people from touching the work. The junior display was moved to a set of shelves located on the back wall near the fire exit due to the decline in entries and quality of the work. The large peg board was not being used adequately so it was decided to use it in another capacity.

The Fair – The weather this year was warmer than last year and there were only 3 ½ days of rain. The FFA once again used our building this year on Sept. 18th for a meeting and scholarship interviews at which time, 7:30a-11:30a, the building was closed to the public. We provided coffee, cider, milk, juice, and paper goods for their breakfast. We had Ruth Fairman play her keyboard for three days this year as well as Eva Cappelli and the Watershop Band, who performed on the front lawn. Linda Sanderson worked with the University of Vermont to get Germ City to the building. This is an exhibit where kids use a gel on their hands and place them under a light so they can see the germs on their hands and then wash their hands and do it again to see the difference.

Charles Martin from Vermont once again created the quilt to be raffled off. This raffle is by donation only of any amount. There were 1,772 tickets that were given out and a total of \$4,046 raised. I had the honor of presenting the check to the Veterans Administrative Supported Housing located in Manchester, NH. Deborah Krinsky, Chief of Volunteer Services and Active Public Affairs Officer was present to receive the check, as well as to draw the winning ticket which belonged to Cindy Sims of Connecticut.

The laptop was used to show some PowerPoint presentations about the Grange as well as a video from the Watershop Band called, "Fields of Hay", which talks about open farmland being turned into housing developments and business centers.

Grange Day started with a breakfast being provided by the New England Grange building for about 125 people who operate and manage the buildings on the Avenue of States. The Contra Banditos returned for the third year and played two long sets. New York Life Insurance set up on the front lawn and provided child ID booklets, which included a photo taken at that time and basic information about the child. The Massachusetts Farm Bureau and Massachusetts State Grange co-sponsored the Century Farm Awards which were presented at 2pm in the New England Grange building. 103 farms received the award this year and most of the recipients were present. New this year, the trustees voted to host a float contest with prize money going to the State youth fund of the winning state. Being the first year we saw three floats in the parade, two from NH and one from

RI. The goat from NH took first place, and the lighthouse from RI took second place. There were about 50-60 Grangers who walked in the parade. We would love to see more participation from Grangers next year on Grange Day. If you plan on attending Grange Day, all you have to do is participate in the parade and you will receive a ticket to get into the fair for the day.

The Store/Crafts – Estimated about 500 hats were donated this year, so we ran a hat sale for 5 days and still have many left over. We sold out of scrubbies, aprons, slippers, catnip, toys, and crocheted towels and had only 20 dish cloths left. During the last week, we had people making scrubbies on site and they were selling as fast as they could make them. The peg board, from the junior display, was modified to be used as a rack for mittens and scarves which kept them neat and orderly. We also had a display of "Go Green" tote bags and eco bags. The estimated income from crafts this year is \$13,224.76. The jams, jellies, dressings, and relishes sold well this year as usual. We had a few people request to buy an entire case this year. The last three days of the fair, the prices of these items were reduced by \$0.75, to move them off the shelf so we would not have to find storage for them until the next fair. The estimated income from the store is \$14,559.45; add that to the craft income and the total deposit was over \$27,800.

As I stated last year, with the store bringing in money for us we did not ask the states for the assessment fee, and won't ask for it until it becomes necessary. If any member would like to work in the store at the Big E, please let one of the trustees know so we can get you on the schedule. If you sign up to work, we will give you a ticket to get in the gate as well as a parking pass. We run two shifts a day, one in the morning and one in the evening. If you work in the evening and do not wish to travel home, we will put you up in a hotel that we book in advance. You work half the day and you can enjoy the fair the remainder of the day.

Looking forward to the future, there are a few issues that we need to take care of.

- 1 The West Springfield Fire Department has said that all fire alarm systems need to be converted from wired to wireless. This change over could cost as much as \$10,000 and needs to be completed before Dec. 31, 2011.
- 2 The roof needs some work, especially around the chimney, as water has leaked in and stained the ceiling tiles.
- 3 The foundation/basement needs to be repaired and sealed, because when it rains the kitchen area turns into a pool.

This year I had a chance to talk with a gentleman from a piano company who has a booth at the Big E, about possibly working out a deal where they would place one of their digital pianos in our building. This piano would have the ability to play tunes throughout the day, similar to a player piano but also be able to have someone sit down and play it. This piano offers features found in keyboards as well as pianos while feeling and sounding like a classic piano. This could lead to the purchase of one of these units which could be stored in any condition, never has to be tuned, and because of its small footprint, could be transported easily if a state had an event that needed a piano.

There are many opportunities to explore and the trustees are doing their best to take this building and organization into the future. If anyone has any ideas or sees something that should be done, please let one of us know. Respectfully Submitted,

We have had some new ideas that we have put out to the Granges and the response has been slow but steady. A challenge was given to the Pomona Chairman to provide a day of Needle Arts (i.e. quilting, knitting, crocheting, etc.) open to the public to teach, to promote the Grange and increase membership. Joann Brandt of East Rockingham Pomona is the only one that accomplished this so far. Perhaps there is a Subordinate Grange that would like to accept the challenge?

Again, it has been our pleasure to serve as your Family and Community Directors this year. Working with the Pomona Chairmen as the State Committee, we still have new faces this year along with those that have served previously. It has brought out new ideas on our program and ways to continue with new ideas as well as modify some of our older programs. Our current list of active members include the following; Linda Nielson, Joann Brandt, Joan Garland, Rachel Scanzani, Connie Carr, Richard Patten, Florence Perkins, Ann Leger, Dale MacDonald, Norma Neary, and Lena Falconer.

This year we have started to put together bags for the residents of Glencliff home. Michelle Oaks is our liaison with Glencliff and she has asked that we make up bags with toiletry articles for the residents this year. We have purchased full size bottles of body wash to get this started and are asking Granges to participate by donating articles such as toothbrushes, toothpaste, wash cloths, body lotion, etc. This will all be turned over to the new Director. We hope the new department will continue with the items for the stockings for children at the Philbrook Center in Concord. These are for children that cannot go home at Christmas time.

We have numerous linens and other miscellaneous items for the Monadnock Center for Violence Prevention in the exhibit room. A representative will pick them up this afternoon. Please sign the name of your Grange on the sheet on the table as you leave your items so that we may send the list with the items. This is a very worthy cause that helps clients start over when they are victims of violence and need a new start at a new home. We gave last year to a shelter in Portsmouth and hope to continue this at each community where we hold our State Session.

There were 329+ craft items from 9 Granges donated to the New England Grange Building at the Eastern States Exhibition. Our best sellers are always our scrubbies and mittens and they love them there.

The end of the year Home Economics report form needs the number of toys, mittens and Eastern State items, rather than just a yes/no. Based on the numbers listed on the report forms, there were 494+ mittens donated from Subordinate Granges to schools, shelters, nursing homes, etc. Our Mountain of Mittens which has currently 238 hats and mittens will add to this overall total giving us over 700, Last year's total was 600.

We commend the Granges that are involved in the Dictionary Project and the number that are going out to many schools throughout New Hampshire. For those of you that are involved in this, we challenge you to spread out to other communities and give what you can. There are other organizations and businesses that are willing to make donations to help pay for the dictionaries, all you need to do is ask. Someday it is hoped to cover most of the state with these dictionaries.

This year we encouraged all Granges to turn in a Community Service report form. There were 30 Granges that did send in reports, which qualified us to receive award money from National Grange. The top four Community Service winners were:

State Master Beth Merrill called upon David Boynton to give the report of the State Grange Building Study.

Report of the Building Study Committee

Worthy Master, National Representatives, Guests, Delegates and Patrons: Before I present this report, I would like to recognize the members of the Study Committee: Chris Heath, State Steward and member of Centennial Grange; Matt Clark, State Chaplain and member of Prentice Hill Grange; Ida Hutchins, Deputy and member of Baker's River Grange; Andrew Savage, member of Wingold Grange; Mary West Belval, member of Chichester Grange; Rick Bailey, member of Hudson Grange; Claire Gagne, member of Hooksett Grange; Vicki Hussman, member of Harmony Grange; David Wilson, member of Winthrop Grange; and Beverly Woods Wilson, member of Pine Grove Grange.

At the 2009 State Session, Delegates acted upon a resolution which called for the State Grange owned building in Hooksett to be sold. That Resolution was amended to read "Resolved, that a study committee be formed on the aspect of selling the current NH State Grange building and locating a more appropriate facility. The Study Committee to present a written report at the next NH State Grange Session. The Resolution as amended was adopted, and the report is now at hand.

The Committee's study was focused on the following areas:

- 1. Financial- donations and rental income vs. expenses of the building; the impact on the treasury and the impact on other programs, events and activities.
- 2. Use- how frequently the building was used by the State Grange for meetings, events and activities, and for income-generating uses.
- 3. Storage- assessment of the needs of the State Grange and Departments and the adequacy of the space available and condition therein.
- 4. Museum- use of the building as a holding area for items of historic, informational and/or intrinsic value; accessibility for informational and educational purposes to members and non-members.
- 5. Determination of the viability of locating a "more appropriate facility".

Other issues considered include the use of the facility by Hooksett and Pembroke Granges and the impact sale of the building would have on those Granges; financial support provided by individuals and Granges through donations; the intangible value of having a "home of our own"; and the need of the State Grange to have a facility readily available for meetings and activities.

The Building Study Committee collected and evaluated data relative to these areas including financial data from 2000 to 2010, storage requirements, capacity and use of the building for meetings and events. We requested and received Market Analysis Reports from three local Realtors, gave consideration to options for alternative facilities for meetings and events and made inquiries relative to options to provide a more suitable arrangement to protect and preserve historical documents and artifacts.

Based on our analysis of the information collected, the Committee concluded the following:

- 1. It is neither financially feasible nor sustainable for the NH State Grange to continue ownership of the building.
- 2. It is not financially feasible to exchange the current building for another building "more appropriate" and adequate to meet the needs.
- 3. The building does not provide adequate space to accommodate the requirements for the storage of equipment and accessories of the State Grange and the various Departments.
- The building does not provide adequate climate-controlled storage necessary for the preservation of written and printed records and documents with historical significance.
- 5. The building is not being utilized for income generating purposes adequate to offset the expenses incurred.
- 6. The Grange Museum, located in a locked room of a locked building, is not readily accessible either to members or the public, therefore significantly reducing its value as a museum.

These conclusions were reached after study and analysis of the information available, which provided the following facts:

The net expense of maintaining the building has continually increased, while membership and income have continually declined. Withdrawals from invested funds between 2000 and 2010 totaled \$76,000; during the same period, expenses of the building, less donations and rental income totaled \$61,766. There is a direct correlation between the two. The cost of maintaining the building far outweighs the value and benefits of having "a home of our own".

Based on these conclusions, the Committee makes the following recommendations:

1. That the building in Hooksett, owned by the NH State Grange be sold.

- That self-storage unit or units of adequate size, climate controlled as needed, and located convenient to those Officers needing access, be rented on a long term basis (12 months).
- That a plan be developed to provide either permanent or "as needed" arrangements to rent or lease a facility or facilities to provide adequate space for meetings, events and activities of the State Grange and Departments.
- 4. That the State Grange initiate a discussion with the New Hampshire Historical Society Museum staff to develop a plan to create a "New Hampshire Grange" Exhibit/Display/Library at the Society's Museum in Concord.
- 5. That the State Grange initiate a discussion with the New Hampshire Historical Society Museum staff to develop a plan to digitize the written and printed documents with historical and/or informational value.

It must be understood that none of these recommendations can be fulfilled immediately; each will need to be planned and implemented to ensure the best interests of the NH State Grange are protected. However, the sooner decisions are made and the process started, the sooner the goals will be achieved.

The Committee recognizes that many individuals have made financial donations to offset the cost of repairs, improvements and amenities for the building. Those selfless acts and the dedication of the individuals involved need to be recognized in some appropriate manner, while respecting whatever degree of anonymity the donors may expect and deserve. The conclusions and recommendations of the Building Study Committee are not based on personal opinions- they are based on an analysis of the facts. Continually declining membership and continually increasing expenses of the State Grange demand that some difficult choices need to be made, priorities need to be established, and members need to be assured that the financial resources of the State Grange are being used wisely and to our best advantage. Depleting the Invested Funds so that we can have a building "that we can call our own" is not a wise use of our financial resources and certainly not to the best advantage of the NH State Grange.

It cannot be overstated that there are cost-effective and reasonable solutions to accommodate the need for storage space and meeting facilities, as well as the retention and preservation of documents and other historical items. We need to be willing to put aside emotional entanglements, put the best interests of the NH State Grange first and move forward.

Delegates, the Building Study Committee has fulfilled its mandate... the rest is up to you.

To the Committee members, I thank each of you for your willingness to serve on the Committee and to address a difficult and sometimes delicate issue. I certainly appreciate your contributions.

Our policy has been and should be that we expect Grange members and especially officers of our local Granges to live up to the high expectations of their oaths and their installation pledges to preserve the assets of the Order for the benefit of future generations of Grange members. When those expectations are not met, especially in cases of deliberate attempts to deceive both local Grange members and the State Grange by hiding assets and accounts, we will act swiftly and accordingly under Grange law, civil law and, if necessary, criminal law. If your Grange needs to make changes to your Deputy Reports to the State Grange, change any financial records, every Grange will have that opportunity for a 1 year period with no question asked or comments other than a thank you. This Administration will insist on complete financial transparency in reporting for all Grange chapters in New Hampshire
- It will also be the policy of this administration that no Grange will be able to give up their charter without first meeting with a Grange growth team to study the viability of the future of this Grange. In January I attended the Northeast Leaders Conference on Saturday in VT. Since the only committee meeting was Legislative, I attended that. This is where the "return the agriculture committee" resolution came from. Thank you Deb Stone for the ride.

In Sept Jim Tetreault, Arthur Merrill, Matt Clark and I attended the Pomona Summit in PA. We found that all states are struggling with the Pomona situation. The theme we brought home for the Pomonas is "Give us a reason". We need to get back to one of the original reasons for the Pomona and that is 'to strengthen the Subordinates'. We encourage the Pomonas to organize a team and pick a struggling Subordinate and work with them. The discussion in the car on the way back home brought a challenge to me. I am to reorganize three Pomonas-I think they said in three months. It may take me a bit longer.

Last year I started two different awards. One was the "Good Grange Image Award" for a Grange to get the Grange into the community eye. The 2nd Place Grange this year did not sit back and say 'we can't do that'. They worked with what they had. 2nd place goes to Sunapee Lake Grange for their float.

1st place goes to a Grange full of enthusiasm. When a member of their Grange had a house fire the Grangers were there before the fire apparatus to comfort

and to make a 'conga line' removing the member's belongings. The members were there for this member through the cleanup, etc. The insurance representative was amazed at the amount of help the member was receiving. Normally it is the fire victim and the insurance rep alone. The Grange organized a joint meeting with the church in town to have a healing meeting for the member and the community to work out what needed to be done. This Grange also had a float in the local parade. 1st Place goes to Croydon Grange.

Another way to look at Grange image is how we present ourselves when out promoting the Grange. In the southern part of the state we have professionals. In that area we need to consider that in how we dress. Suits may be more inviting to the people of that area. North of the Notches or the North Country where the majority are more blue-collar workers, a more relaxed dress code is in order. In fact a suited person there would be looked upon with suspicion and make prospective members feel uneasy and unwelcome. Basically assess the area you will be working in before stepping out.

This year's Phoenix Award goes to a Grange who has not met in many years and through guidance from their Deputy has taken in 25 to 30 new members, elected officers and has started fundraisers and getting the Grange into the community. This year's Phoenix Award goes to Wicwas Lake Grange.

Other Granges of note for net membership gains include; Cocheco gained 4 members, Dorchester, Blow-Me- Down, and Rockingham all had a net gain of 3 new members.

A new award became obvious to me this year. This award is for a Granger who really took it to the streets and worked on Grange membership. This person worked for a whole year on a Grange traveling about 1 hr each way. This Granger really took the training from Rusty Hunt and worked it proving that what Rusty teaches is good. This person has done us proud. This year's "Atta boy" Award goes to Arthur Merrill for his work on Wicwas Lake Grange.

Due to all the activities and goals in the Sullivan County area more people are talking about the Grange and I have been interviewed by the local radio station and the local weekly newspaper. This helps get the word out that the Grange is here and growing. I have heard from former Grangers in towns that no longer have Granges and they would like a new Grange in their towns. With all this interest and potential growth we need more people willing to go out and work at rebuilding the Grange.
